The average price per barrel for the last year was 23 cents.

The demand for hollow bricks and building blocks for house construction has induced glass manufacturers to put hollow glass bricks on the market, and they promise to be used extensively for novel and artistic effects. The first glass bricks being sold proved a failure on account of their cost, but the hollow glass bricks can be made at much less expense. They are lighter and stronger than clay bricks and are such excellent non-conductors that walls built of them are proof against dampness, sound, heat and cold. The bricks are sealed hermetically when hot and placed in walls with a colorless mortar made of special glass. The bonding strength of the glass mortar is almost as great as the bricks themselves.

The contents of over 5000 holes, represented to have been "home-made" catsup, were destroyed in Kansas City recently by the pure food inspector. It had been purchased from a jobber by a grocer, and the pure food department of the city was attracted to it because the grocer offered it for sale, two bottles for five cents. An analysis showed that a sample contained pumpkin, a suggestion of tomatoes, benzoate of soda and coal tar, and had soured and had evidently been packed for several years. "Home-made" goods are at a discount in Kansas City, at least in the pure food inspector's forces. They prefer the goods which are to be found on the shelves of reputable dealers, bearing the name of the manufacturer who are proud of them.

Samuel L. Clemens (Mark Twain) owns a 200-acre tract of land near West Redding, Conn., and he will have a house in the form of an Italian villa erected thereon. Situated on the top of a hill in the center of a tract of 200 acres, and surrounded by low cedar trees, the general effect will be that of a piece of Italy transplanted into the United States, for the cedar trees resemble the cypress trees of Italy. The house will be built of stucco, with an Italian tile roof and will have a pergola surrounding it. A feature of the new home will be the large music room, which Mr. Clemens has arranged for the special use of his daughter, who is now making a concert tour of the United States. In this room will be placed a large pipe organ, which has been heretofore in Mr. Clemens' Hartford home.

DRESS OF THE ESKIMO.

Made by the Women From the Skin of Northern Animals.

The chief material of the clothing of the Eskimo is the skin of the reindeer, which is used in various stages of preparation or tanning. Fine, short haired summer skins, especially those of doe and fawn, are used for making dress garments and underclothes. The heaviest winter skins furnish extra warm jackets for cold weather. The white spotted skins of the tame Siberian reindeer are especially valued for full dress jackets.

The skins of the white mountain sheep, white and blue fox, wolf, dog, ermine and lynx are sometimes made into clothing. Underjackets of elder duck skins are often pressed into service. Seniskin dressed with the hair on is used only for breeches and boots, and for those rarely. Of late years drilling and calico have been introduced into the makeup of some of the minor garments.

The dress of the men consists of a loose hooded frock without opening except at the neck and wrists. This reaches just over the hips and very rarely to mid thigh, where it is cut off square and usually confined by a girdle at the waist. Under this garment is worn a similar one of lighter skin and sometimes without a hood. The thighs are clad in one or two pairs of tight fitting knee breeches, rather loose, but fitted to the shape of the leg. They are very low in front, but are much higher behind, sometimes as high as the small of the back. They are held in place by a girdle or thong around the waist and are usually fastened below the knee over the boots with a drawstring.

On the legs and feet are worn, first, a pair of long deer skin stockings, with the hair inside, then slippers of tanned seal skin, in the bottom of which is spread a layer of whalebone shavings and outside a pair of close fitting boots, held in place by a string around the ankle, which reaches above the knee and ends with a rough edge covered by the breeches. Dress boots often and in an ornamental border, with drawstring just below the knee. The boots are of reindeer skin, with white seal skin soles for winter and dry weather, but in summer waterproof boots of white whale skin are worn. Overshoes of the same material, reaching just above the ankles, are sometimes worn over the winter boots.

The women wear tight fitting deer skin pantaloons, with the hair next the skin, and outside of these a similar pair made of the skin from deer legs, with the hair out, and having soles of seal skin, but no ankle strings. The women's pantaloons, like those of the men, are fastened with a girdle just above the hips. It appears that they do not stay up very well, as the women are continually hitching them up and tightening their girdles, like some old sailors.

Until they reach manhood the boys wear pantaloons like the women, but their jackets are cut just like those of the men.

The well to do Eskimos generally own several complete suits of clothes and present a neat appearance when not engaged in dirty work. The poorer classes wear one suit for all occasions until it becomes shabby. New clothes are seldom put on till winter. The outer frock is not often worn in the light, or hot moon, being usually taken off before entering the room.

At present there is no such thing as an Eskimo tailor, for the women of each Eskimo household usually make the garments of all the members of the family. Not only this, but the Eskimos are extremely conservative in the matter of changes in the style of their garments and respond very slowly to the modernizing influences in this particular which have reached their neighborhood.

Convict Regiments.

At the beginning of the eighteenth century the British army had a bad reputation at home, and it was very difficult to get recruits for it. For this reason it was officially proposed to find the men by an impressive falling on "any sturdy beggar, fortune teller or the like like, unknown, suspected fellow in the parks; or, if there be none such, then any one that has already been in a goal or before a justice of the peace for his idle, disorderly life." The advice was acted upon. Debtors were released from prison on promising to join the army or the navy, criminals were pardoned on the same terms, and persons with no visible means of subsistence were marched off to death and glory. Japan Sail For British Columbia.
Honolulu, April 2.—Arrangements have been completed for the transportation of 300 Japanese coolies from here to San Francisco on the Pacific Mail Company's steamer Korea, sailing about April 5th. They will be transferred at the California metropolis to one of the coasting steamers and taken to British Columbia.

The coolies are immigrants, who recently arrived from Japan, and after finding that they could not be landed at San Francisco, friends hit upon the scheme of sending them to British Columbia, where they expect to find it an easy matter to get across the boundary line. If this plan succeeds the influx of Japanese to this coast will again be started.
