

## A LITTLE OF EVERYTHING

Mrs. Pater, wife of S. A. D. Pater, now serving a term in the Multnomah County Jail for complicity in the land frauds, paid a visit to Klamath Falls and requested that her husband be pardoned. No decision has been announced.

Edward Murphy, a painter who was employed upon the new business men's club, at Memphis, Tenn., in course of erection, climbed to the roof of the building and, pouring a gallon of benzine over his clothing, set fire to himself. Efforts made to rescue Murphy were without avail, and the young man was fatally cremated. He probably was insane.

A trivial fracas on the streets of Woodburn, resulted in ex-recorder J. J. Hall being arrested and charged with an assault upon John W. Cook with a dangerous weapon, which proved to be an umbrella. Marshal Riddle separated the combatants. Justice Hayes placed Hall under \$10 bond to appear Monday morning. The trouble grew out of matters pertaining to the late election.

Twelve Japanese women, coming to America on the Shinano Maru, were married on board the Japanese liner after their arrival in Seattle. These women came ostensibly to wed husbands who had been promised them before they sailed from Japanese ports and the immigration officers refused to allow the women to land until they had been married according to the customs of this country. Almost as soon as the Shinano Maru had her lines out the marriage ceremonies began and continued at short intervals until a dozen of the Japanese women paired off.

Adam C. Rhein, of Chicago, 50 years of age, shot and fatally wounded his father-in-law, William Rommel, and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Minnie Rommel, and then killed himself. Rhein and his wife quarreled and she left him, going to the home of her parents. It was reported to them that she had commenced proceedings for a divorce, and he decided to kill his wife. He placed three revolvers in his pockets and went to the house in which the Rommels lived. Mrs. Rhein saw him enter, and ran out of the back door. Rhein fired a shot twice, but missed her. The other shooting followed. At the hospital to which Rommel and his wife were taken it was said both will die.

Almost with his last breath Percy L. Wells, a civil engineer of Waltham, Mass., arose from his death bed at the Grand Central Hotel in San Francisco, just as he was about to sign his will and dashed his head against the wall with such force that he died in a few moments. Wells was about 24 years of age and had been in Guatemala for two years engaged in railroad work. He arrived in San Francisco April 2 in the last stages of consumption. He became crazed with grief when told he could not live to reach his home and see his mother and sister before dying. He sent for an attorney to draw up his will and every effort was made by physicians to keep him alive until the document was prepared. A few minutes before it was ready Wells suddenly arose from his bed and buried himself head foremost against the wall.

Klamath Falls Express. An authentic dispatch was received in Yreka Friday afternoon by Secretary Bolton that the Western Pacific Railroad (The Gould system) has just closed a deal whereby the McCollum River railroad becomes a part of that system. The western end of the road will be extended to connect with the Nevada, California & Oregon railroad which the Gould system also owns, and which runs from Reno, Nevada, to Madeline, Lassen county. This road connects with the main line of the Western Pacific at Ouba in Beckwith pass. This will give Siskiyou county another direct and competing line with the East and will be of immense advantage in the development and growth of the country.

The Oregon & California Transportation Co. is making good in the matter of bringing passengers to this city from Pockama. Last Thursday forty-three passengers landed at the terminus of the Klamath Lake railroad enroute to this city. They were well cared for at Pockama Thursday night and Friday morning seven stage coaches brought the passengers to Keno and a six-mule team brought the baggage belonging to them, arriving at Keno in time to take the steamer Klamath for this city, where they arrived about 8 o'clock in the evening.
