The Medford Ice & Storage Co.'s plant promises to be one of Medford's leading business concerns. This company is putting forth every effort possible to place their industry upon a good and substantial basis which is indicative of the fact that there is not a business to be established today to let go of tomorrow. They have acquired sufficient land south of town to meet all requirements for years to come, they having secured 640 feet frontage on the Southern Pacific right-of-way, a good part of which will at this time be occupied by their building and shipping platforms. The building which the company is now working on will be 58x68 feet in size and two stories high. In this building they will install a fifteen ton per day modern ice manufacturing plant.
