### Other Points of View.

An Oakland, California, dispatch says: Joaquin Miller intends soon to desert his home at Fruitvale and take up his residence in Oregon. The aged poet says his mining ventures have resulted so successful that he has concluded to enter the political arena and his purpose in removing to Oregon is to establish residence there and make an effort to land in the United States senate. Miller expects to leave for the north in a few days, when he will set industriously to work to build his political fences with the view of becoming a figure in national politics.

Lane county farm lands will never again be so cheap as they are today. Within the past ten days transfers of farm property have aggregated fully \$100,000, and numerous deals are on for other transfers. The scramble for Lane county property of all kinds is begun in earnest—Eugene Register.

C. C. Daniels, of Grants Pass says the Courier, has just received a patent for a street railway tie which has all the indications of being of practical value in the railroad work. The tie has the advantage of being more indestructible than wood both as to the lasting quality and the protection against fire. It is made of sheet steel which gives it springing tendency not found in cement or cast iron. The main advantage is the actual prevention of the spreading of rails, which is responsible for so many of the recent railway wrecks. Mr. Daniels has received many propositions from various parts of the United States from manufacturers who wish to secure the right to manufacture the tie and from people who wish to secure the state or district rights for its sale. It has attracted the attention of the heads of the S. P. Co. Mr. Daniels has not yet finally decided on the manner in which he will put his patent on the market.

Society is very strict in Japan about the little matter of hairdressing, and woe be to the woman who neglects to abide by the prevailing custom. Not alone in the richer classes, but among the poorer people as well, the eligible woman, the widow who wishes to marry again, and the widow who does not, was always distinguished by the way in which they dress their hair.

Last Tuesday's Oregonian tells an interesting story of the betting on the Portland election, fully \$50,000 being put up. It says among other things: "At 8 o'clock in the evening the Oregon money was swept off the board. A pool of \$1900 Lane money was then deposited with Schiller. This money was said to have been put up by W. G. McPherson, Dr. Harry McKay, Governor George E. Chamberlain, Max Fleischner and Fred Miller. All but \$855 of this money was taken with a rush. Two bets reduced the sum to \$555, and it remained there until at 10 o'clock it was wiped out." Our governor is nothing if not sportive when it comes to election, if the above statement by the Oregonian is correct.

The most startling innovation of years is taking place in the Land Office and the Patent Office. There are two places where there is an immense amount of copying of records done, and up to date it has all been done by hand, partly from a desire to keep on the rolls many of the old clerks who were fit for no other duty, and partly from fossilism which was loath to change an old system. Now however, the records are to be copied in typewriting instead of manuscript.

It is said that it will effect a saving of about fifty per cent in money and 60 per cent in time. Many of the old clerks it is thought, will have to go, and this will be a hardship, but it will expedite the business of the Interior Department vastly.

The census bulletin issued last week shows that during the year just passed \$320,107,000 worth of shoes were manufactured in the United States. This is an increase of 21 per cent over the production of 1900. The reports which have been sent to the census bureau show that the next year will have a marked increase over this year. This great increase is said to be due to more extensive advertising.

The post office department at Washington has sent out instructions to all postmasters for special weighing of mails from July 1 to December 31, 1907. This includes first class, four kinds of second class, third and fourth, franked and penalty matter, each kind separately. This makes considerable extra work for postmasters.

A remarkable project for municipal improvement is reported from Berlin. The plan is to widen by twenty feet the narrowest part of the well known Friedrichstrasse, second only to Unter den Linden, and to replace the present insignificant shops and houses by magnificent galleries and hotels and the like, making the street one of the world's finest thoroughfares. This of itself does not carry a vivid impression, but when it is added that the scheme involves an outlay of \$37,500,000 the scale of the projected improvement is indicated.
