STATE HAPPENINGS

Owing to scarcity of help, the Salmon cannery is swamped with strawberries and at closing time Saturday, had on and a considerable quantity that will spoil before Monday. Unless more help can be secured, there will be difficulty in handling the cherry crop and in anticipation of this, the cannery reduced its price for Royal Anus from 5 cents to 4 cents and discontinued all purchases of early cherries.

Crawfish burrowing into the banks of the power canal of the Gold Hill Canal Co., caused a 2-foot break yesterday morning and as a result their entire system was placed out of commission. When the water was out of the canal hundreds of carp were found in the pool and the boys from town soon found a source of amusement in catching them. Several catches of 40 or 50 were made.—Gold Hill News.

Merton, the 6-year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Archie Cooper died Saturday afternoon at the home of his parents near Pilot Rock, from the effect of being kicked in the toes by a horse. The animal's foot split open his nose and fractured the front of the skull so that a portion of the brain oozed out while the wound was being dressed by the physician and in this terrible condition the boy lived almost four days. The horse was in the yard where this child and others were playing when the boy ran up behind the animal and was kicked.

A message was received Thursday says the Grants Pass Courier, by George Calhoun from Roy Kremer, stating that his father, Dr. W. P. Kremer, was dead and that the body would be taken to Wilbur, Douglas county, where burial would be made on Saturday with the funeral services conducted by the Masons. CITY WATER PROBLEM SOLVED.

Pure Water at Less than Present City Rates

(By Shorty Garnett)

To the Public—I have a well 18 feet deep, nine feet across at the bottom making a basin to hold about 700 gallons of water. In the attic of my house 23 feet from the ground, I have a 400 gallon galvanized tank. I have a double acting Maud S. force pump connected to a one-fourth horse-power electric motor, the motor connected to city wires, the same that light my dwelling. This outfit cost outside of the well less than \$100. By keeping tab on the cost of running I fill my 400 gallon tank in 20 minutes, or I get 1925 gallons of water for 10 cents worth of electricity and get pure water. My range, tank, sink lavatories and bath are connected with the 400 gallon tank, which is much cheaper than city water. Call and see Shorty Garnett, he has it
