Three Persons Fatally Crushed in Wreck of a Santa Fe Passenger Train Near Trinidad, Cal.
Los Angeles, Cal., June 18.—In a head-on collision between local passenger No. 15 and a switch engine at Hobart station, on the Salt Lake road, yesterday, twenty-eight passengers were injured. All were bruised or cut by flying glass, no one being fatally hurt. The scene of the collision was at the junction of the Salt Lake lines to Long Beach and San Bernardino, and the local train was in-bound when the accident happened.
Both engines were badly wrecked and the coaches jammed together. The switch engine was pulling out on the main line, when the passenger train came in sight. The crew of the switch engine are held responsible for the wreck, as it is claimed they had no right on the main track at the time.
Engineer Edward Lynch of the local was thrown from his cab and badly cut and bruised, while his fireman, W. H. Smith, escaped with only a few scratches. Conductor Olson was standing on the steps of one of the coaches just before the engines came together. He jumped and saved his life.
Train Leaps Rails.
Trinidad, Cal., June 18.—Eighteen passengers were injured, three fatally, in a wreck yesterday of east-bound passenger train No. 8 on the Santa Fe near Earl, twenty miles east of here.
Fifteen were more or less cut and bruised, but not seriously. The wreck was caused either by a defective brakebeam, or spreading rails. The baggage car, smoker, chair car, two tourists and one standard Pullman left the rails. The smoker and baggage cars were demolished and the others badly damaged.
Four Perish Trying to Save Swimmer.
Seattle, June 18.—Five people were drowned yesterday afternoon in Lake Sammamish, four sacrificing their lives in an effort to save that of Antonio Myer, a boy 13 years of age.
The dead: Mrs. E. Myer, Antonio Myer, Lizzie Myer, Ida Myer, Mrs. John Herter.
Antonio Myer had gone bathing in the lake off the Mayer homestead. He was caught in an undertow. His sisters rushed to his assistance and were carried down. The mother, followed them. All the bodies were recovered except Antonio's. Lake Sammamish is of great depth and its waters have a seaklike undertow.

Widow Woman Into Truckee River.
Reno, Nev., June 18.—Miss Ella Mottlander, a former employe of the Western Telegraph Company here, who came from Waverly, Texas, was pushed off the Truckee river bridge a few miles west of here Sunday morning by an unidentified man, and her body was recovered after it had floated three hours in the water. An attempt will be made to fasten the crime on the man who was with Miss Mottlander. She had been staying at the home of Mrs. W. R. Rayder.
