#### Klamath County News.

**Klamath Republican.**  
Jas. Murphy and J. S. Seeds have been declared insane and were this week taken to the asylum for treatment. Both of them are afflicted with epilepsy. Mr. Seeds is well-known here and several attempts have been made to place him under the care of the state but he has always resisted so vigorously that he has successfully escaped. Murphy was one of the men injured in the stage wreck a couple of weeks ago.

The first auto party of the year reached this city Monday and attracted a good deal of attention. It was in charge of Joe Heesig. The party consisted of J. A. Marsh and wife, Julius Gobel and Jack Fleming; the latter the chauffeur. They came here from Hot Springs and after a brief stop for a chat with Geo. T. Baldwin, with whom they were acquainted, proceeded on to Fort Klamath. Here they will abandon their auto and go to Crater Lake horse back and on snow shoes. The machine used was a 40-horse-power Arrow, and no difficulty was experienced on route.

Klamath Falls is to be a coupon station. That is you can get through tickets to any point in the United States from this city, and have your baggage checked through. For the present however, tickets to Portland and Los Angeles are all that will be placed on sale until the agent here familiarizes himself with the work, but if any one wants a through ticket to other than these places, it will be secured for him and his baggage checked accordingly. This has been accomplished through the efforts of Mr. Abbott and Capt. McIntire. Klamath Falls is the only station of the main line where this is done, such places as McCloud, Grass Lake, and Jacksonville being compelled to secure their tickets after they reach the main line stations. It is a big concession for Klamath Falls and one that is heartily appreciated by the people of this section.

A few weeks ago an examination was held throughout the United States for a junior clerk for the Reclamation Service. Among those entering for such examination were Miss Curran and Miss Hogue of this city. The result of the examination was received in this city last Saturday and it was found that the two young ladies secured the highest average in the United States, Miss Curran being first and Miss Hogue second. They are receiving the well-deserved congratulations of their many friends. As soon as a vacancy occurs one of them will be given the opportunity of accepting the appointment.

**Klamath Falls Express.**  
The headgates of the government canal were partly opened the first of the week and water turned into the ditch for use in irrigating.

J. G. Pierce mailed to the Fort Klamath Chamber of Commerce a check for \$253, the amount subscribed by Klamath Falls parties towards improving the navigability of Wood river. The amount was raised by Mr. Pierce by circulating a subscription among the business firms. The opening of Wood river for small boats will establish water connection between this city and Fort Klamath and will be of mutual benefit to both places.

The Crater Lake company was organized at Portland a few weeks ago by Will G. Steel and E. D. Whitney with a capital stock of \$250,000. The articles of incorporation give the company considerable latitude as to the various kind of business in which it may engage, but the chief object of the company is to exploit the scenic attractions of the Pacific Northwest. Tuesday a deal was closed whereby the new company acquire possession of all of the property owned by the Klamath Lake Navigation Co., excepting the town lots. The steamer Klamath and all of the water front owned by the Navigation company has been purchased by the new concern and will be utilized in connection with the tourist route that the company contemplates operating.

Ed. Wiggins, who has for several months made Klamath Falls his home, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace T. Nicholas Saturday afternoon. He waived examination and was held to await the action of the circuit court, the court fixing his bail at \$1,000. Wiggins is charged with forging a check in the sum of \$16 on M. H. Wampler and cashing the same at the Owl saloon on Friday evening. The forgery was detected shortly after the check was cashed and the officers notified. Wiggins tried to make his escape, but was captured in East Klamath Falls by Sheriff Oberchain, Deputy Sheriff John Shallock and Policeman E. B. Ramsby.

Frank Thomas, a Yreks Indian, was brought to this city Tuesday evening and lodged in the county jail to await a preliminary hearing on the charge of horse stealing. He is charged with taking a horse from the stable of Geo. Morine, residing near Bonanza, early Monday morning. The authorities were at once notified and deputies began searching for him. He was arrested Tuesday and brought here by Geo. Morine. He was not caught with the horse in his possession, having left it in a stable about three miles from Bonanza. There was practically no evidence against Thomas and he was given his liberty yesterday without any hearing.

The June term of the circuit court convenes on the 17th and, while the docket contains a long list of cases, there will be but a few important cases come to trial. The only criminal cases likely to come up are the state of Oregon vs. Mike Krtino, charged with assault upon a young girl and the action against Ed. Wiggins for forgery. A long list of cases appear on the docket under action at law, but none are of more than ordinary importance. There are also a large number of cases in equity, among them eleven divorce cases. Several of the cases appearing on the docket were already dismissed and will not come to trial. The coming session of the court is likely to be a short one.

**GALLAGHER NOW ACTING MAYOR**  
JUDGE LAWLOR GIVES SCHMITZ PERMISSION TO CONFER WITH ATTORNEYS.  
Indicted Railroad Men Appear in Court on Charge of Bribing the Board of Supervisors.

San Francisco, June 18.—Mayor Schmitz was formally removed from office by the Supervisors of this city at their meeting yesterday afternoon. Supervisor James Gallagher was named as acting Mayor in his place. This is the first step taken by the officials of the graft prosecution in the execution of their plan to restore good government in San Francisco. The ground on which Mayor Schmitz was removed is that owing to the incarceration in the county jail following his conviction on a felony charge he is no longer able to perform his public duties.

Gallagher will not hold the position of acting Mayor for more than a few days. The resignation of a certain member of the Board of Supervisors will make room for the appointment of a responsible citizen who will take Gallagher's place as acting Mayor.

This course, which has been under discussion for several days, was definitely decided upon at the meeting of the graft prosecutors yesterday. It will be put into execution immediately. Mayor Schmitz secured from Judge Lawlor an order releasing him from the County Jail today from 11 to 4 o'clock for the purpose of consulting his attorneys and transacting other business.

It is expressly stipulated that he shall not transact any public business. The cases of Patrick Calhoun, president of the United Railroads, Thorewell Mullally and Attorney T. L. Ford and William M. Abbott, charged by Grand Jury indictment with having bribed Supervisors in connection with the overhead trolley franchise, came up in Judge Lawlor's court on motion to set aside the indictments.

Owing to pressure of business in the court because of the trial of Ralph Huntington for murder and other matters, the hearing of arguments in the railroad men's cases were postponed. Further investigation into the fight trust is to be made this week by the Grand Jury. Indictments will be returned against several of the trust members.

Each of the Supervisors was paid \$500 for exclusive permits for prize fights, according to evidence already submitted to the Grand Jury. The Grand Jury will also investigate the Home Telephone Company franchise matter.

**Ripley Quits Panama Commission.**  
Washington, June 18.—Joseph Ripley has resigned his position as one of the consulting engineers of the Panama Canal Commission to accept a more lucrative position in this country. Ripley was a member of the International Board of Consulting Engineers, which met in Washington two years ago to determine the type of canal to be constructed across the isthmus of Panama, a board which has since passed out of existence. He also was assistant engineer on the isthmus until Chief Engineer Stevens resigned, and has lately been appointed by Colonel Goethals in designing the details of the great locks for the canal, a work for which he was regarded as peculiarly fitted because of the success attending his design and construction of the Soo locks.

**36 Persons Killed in Earthquake.**  
Valparaiso, Chile, June 18.—Late reports from Valdivia state that thirty-four persons in all were killed or injured by the recent earthquake. The region affected by the shock extends from Valparaiso to Magellan straits and from the Pacific Coast to Neuquin in Argentina.

**Crap Game Discovered in Jail Chicago, June 18.**—A dice game in the county jail was discovered by Assistant Jailer Sweeney. Sweeney was passing through one of the corridors when he saw the game in progress. It was in charge of a man named Kelly, a "trustee" under former Jailer Whitman.

**Wooden Bridge Collapsed.**  
Madrid, June 18.—A wooden bridge over the river Manzanara, which flows through the city, collapsed Sunday, precipitating more than 100 pedestrians into the stream. All were rescued alive, but more than a score were seriously injured.

#### ORCHARD CASE POSTPONED.

Judge Wood Postpones Case in Order to Proceed With Haywood Trial. Caldwell, Idaho, June 18.—Harry Orchard, the confessed murderer of former Governor Steunberger and eighteen other men, was brought yesterday to the scene of the crime which finally landed him within the clutches of the law and taken before Judge Wood at the County Courthouse, where his case was set for trial. The Haywood case at Boise was adjourned to enable Judge Wood to come to Caldwell and enter an order formally adjourning Orchard's trial for the present term of court.

The date of Orchard's trial will not be fixed until the cases against Haywood, Moyer and Pettibone at Boise are disposed of, Orchard being the State's principal accusing witness against the Western Federation of Miners' officials. Orchard was taken back to the penitentiary at Boise.

**WANT MISS GOULD'S AID**  
REQUESTS FOR GIFTS RANGE FROM FALSE TEETH TO A \$1,000,000 CUBAN COLONY.  
New York, June 18.—According to a statement made public today, the requests for gifts sent to Miss Helen Gould aggregate nearly \$2,000,000 a week. They range all the way from the asking for \$15 for a set of false teeth to \$1,000,000 to start a colony in Cuba. In the week referred to Miss Gould received 331 requests for money outright. Out of these 183 left the amount to her good will and discretion. Miss Gould was asked in that week for \$5,000 to help form an anti-saloon league in Idaho. She received forty-three requests for aid for churches, twenty-seven for educational institutions and twenty-six for libraries. More than thirty were for help for charitable institutions. Four persons, presumably young women, wanted Miss Gould to help them buy trousseaus. Eleven persons wanted pianos and twelve wanted Miss Gould to buy their inventations. Following are some of the other wants:  
Bibles, bicycles, a farm and three cows, one invalid's chair, enough aid pillows to supply a regiment of soldiers, one set of teeth, five sewing machines and fifteen railway tickets.

**Say We Are Kissed to Death.**  
Minneapolis, Minn., June 18.—Kissing is a bad thing for the race. It is resulting in disease and death and therefore must go. This fact has been brought into the blaze of light before the National Conference of Charities and Corrections meeting here.

It fell to a German to place a public stigma on the gentle art of kissing. Dr. S. A. Knopf, a noted scientist who has been lecturing before the conference on the care of public health has pilloried osculation in any and all forms. Dr. Knopf has a scientific contempt for sentiment. He has coldly debarred any and all forms of kissing. Dr. Knopf says kissing causes consumption and many other diseases.

**Burned Baby With Carbolic Acid.**  
Los Angeles, June 18.—Mistaking a bottle of carbolic acid for another containing olive oil, Mrs. Charles Reichlin wrapped her 10-day-old son in flannel which has been saturated with the acid. The baby's screams revealed the mistake that had been made, and the child hurried to a hospital. Prospects for its recovery are slender and physicians say the child will be horribly disfigured for life.

**Settle Boundaries of Republics.**  
Bogota, Colombia, June 18.—The Assembly, which has just closed its session, has adopted some important laws, chief of which were those that will settle questions concerning the boundaries between Colombia and Brazil and Ecuador.

Under the administration of President Reyes, Colombia has made great progress. Civil wars have ended and foreign capital is seeking investment in mines and railroads.

**Transports to Have Wireless.**  
Washington, June 18.—A report received by the chief signal officer of the army regarding the testing of the wireless telegraph apparatus installed upon the transport Thomas shows that the apparatus worked satisfactorily. Communication was established on the coast when the vessel was 700 miles at sea. Similar systems are to be put upon the transports Logan, Sheridan and Sherman.

**FINDS HUGE SUN SPOT**  
ST. LOUIS SCIENTIST MAKES DISCOVERY AND PREDICTS WIND AND ELECTRIC STORMS.  
St. Louis, Mo., June 18.—A sun spot, announced to be the largest discovered in many years, has been found on the east line of Old Sol by the Rev. I. N. Hicks, the famous astronomer of this city, who predicted the Galveston tidal wave, St. Louis cyclone and the recent tornado and hailstorm. The spot was first discovered last Saturday morning and was then some distance from the east line. The sun appeared to be in a state of terrific eruption, the lines showing an area which seems to be under a tornado-like whirl. The spot is easily discerned by the naked eye through a piece of colored glass. The big spot, the top of which is heart-shaped, is dangerous, according to Mr. Hicks, who says that throughout the storm area of the United States the public may look for terrific electric storms, accompanied by high winds. These will reach the country between Wednesday and Friday, when the spot crosses the meridian of the sun.

**THE SPOT WILL BE DISCREASABLE TO PEOPLE IN THIS COUNTRY UNTIL NEXT SATURDAY.** If it is strong enough to brave the rotation of the sun it will again appear about twelve days from next Saturday and again cause atmospheric disturbances.
