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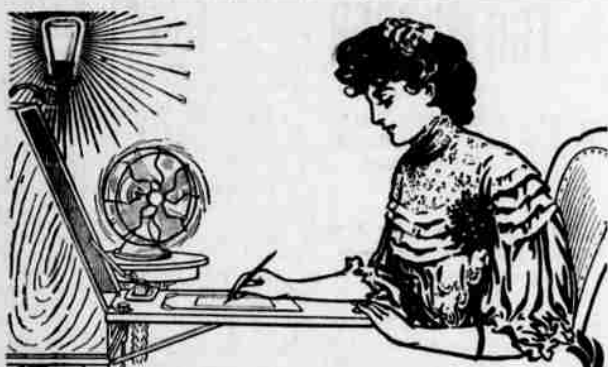

The Peary graft—by which the school children of Oregon were asked to contribute toward the expenses of another attempt to reach the north pole—didn't meet with any large and enthusiastic response. The school children of Oregon are perfectly satisfied to let the pole remain undiscovered, and if any body wants to fool around among the ice bears and Esquimaux let them put up their own money. The total contributions from all parts of the state have been \$77.37. Marion county put in \$7.75. The lowest sum from any one district was .05 and the smallest—where anything at all was given—was 5 cents.

"Numerous advertisements, offering for a remuneration to locate settlers on railroad lands, appear in the daily papers. The Oregonian has frequently advised caution on the part of intending settlers on these disputed lands. The elements of uncertainty as to final possession seems so great as to bid to warrant the investment of very much money in one of these 'claims.' It is noticeable that a number of locators who in the past have exhibited no hesitation in locating settlers on some very poor lands are keeping out of the present game. If the railroad indifference, which is now so pronounced, is warranted, a verdict in their favor may be expected. If otherwise, the matter will drag through the courts for many weary years, and in the end may result in the only profit which will accrue from the present craze going to the locator."—Portland Oregonian.
