William Wilson Keutner died at his home, corner of Main and Granite streets, in Ashland, Friday, June 28th, in his 79th year. For months he had been in feeble health. For days the watchers at his side saw the light of life growing steadily dimmer until the early hours of Friday morning when it flickered out and the spirit of one of Ashland's oldest and best known citizens took its flight. Mr. Keutner had been a resident of Ashland since 1890. For nearly half a century he had lived here, following for many years, and until he retired from active work in 1900, his trade as a wagon maker. Of jovial nature, he always had a pleasant word, and was ever ready to crack a joke with his friends. A man of gentle, kindly and sympathetic nature, and of earnest industry, he was a good citizen, friend and neighbor whose virtues are worthy of emulation. Mr. Keutner was a native of Illinois and was born in Columbia, in Monroe county of that state, November 27, 1828, of German ancestry.

### Death of Mrs. James Burch.

The following from a Nebraska paper refers to a lady who was quite well known in this vicinity. The summons of death came to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Souther on Monday evening, June 3rd, 1907 at 7 o'clock, when their daughter Mrs. James Burch, died of consumption. As previously reported on several occasions, the deceased came here from her home in Medford, Oregon, about six months ago, on advice of her physician, in hopes that a change of climate might improve her health, but evidently the terrible plague had progressed too far to be checked.

Mrs. Burch was born in Lamont, Ill., Sept. 20, 1867. With her parents she came to Wahoo, Neb., when 7 years of age. Five years later the family moved to their present home near Platt Center. At the age of 22 years deceased was married to Mr. Kollo Kingry, two sons being the issue of this marriage. Mr. Kingry died at Medford, Oregon, some eight years ago. Deceased was married to Mr. James Burch about six years ago, since which time, with her husband and who sons, two survive her, they have made their home at Medford, Oregon. About four years ago Mrs. Burch contracted a severe case of pneumonia, from which she never recovered, the ailment passing into consumption.

Mrs. Burch was a kind mother and a devoted wife. During her long siege of wasting illness she bore her lot in patient resignation.

Funeral services were held from St. Joseph's church Wednesday morning and the remains were given back to earth in the Catholic cemetery.

## STATE HAPPENINGS

Hood River, Ore., June 27.—The highest price ever received for fruit land in Oregon was obtained today, when C. Dethman sold a 20-acre orchard of five-year-old trees for \$20,000. The property was purchased by J. B. Redford, of Des Moines, Ia., who will move to Hood River and go into the business of raising fruit. The purchase does not include anything but the land and water rights, as there are no buildings of any description on it and is a straight price of \$1000 per acre. The orchard purchased by Mr. Redford is set to Spitzenbergs and Newtowns, which will bear partially this year for the first time.

### CITY WATER PROBLEM SOLVED.

### Pure Water at Less than Present City Rates

(By Shorty Garnett)

To the Public—I have a well 18 feet deep, nine feet across at the bottom making a basin to hold about 700 gallons of water. In the attic of my house 23 feet from the ground, I have a 400-gallon galvanized tank. I have a double acting Maud S. force pump connected to a one-fourth horse-power electric motor, the motor connected to city wires, the same that light my dwelling. This outfit cost outside of the well less than \$100. By keeping tab on the cost of running I fill my 400 gallon tank in 20 minutes, or I get 1925 gallons of water for 10 cents worth of electricity and get pure water. ### Jumped to Death.

The rear truck of the last car of the second section of passenger train No. 16, a day coach, slipped off the rail just as the train was approaching Clawson station, four miles south of Ashland last Sunday night at 8:40 o'clock and the wheels bumped along the ties for two or three hundred yards before the train was brought to a standstill. Just before the train was stopped, Rev. Charles L. Engle, a Baptist evangelist who was a passenger from Sacramento en route to Portland, becoming frightened, climbed out a car window and just as he jumped the car swerved and he was thrown under the wheels and ground to death. The car stopped within a few feet of where the mangled body lay across the track. It was brought to the railroad headquarters at Ashland where Rev. F. N. Baker, the pastor of the Baptist church in this city, was called to identify the remains. Rev. Engle, who has a family residing in Portland, conducted service in Ashland last winter after the holiday season. He also held meetings at Talent and valley points and afterward went to Arizona to try the climate for a bronchial trouble. Mr. Baker had a card from him at Santa Barbara and it is supposed he was en route back to his home in Portland where his wife and three children reside. They were apprised at once of the husband and father's death. Rev. Engle was aged about 42 years. Coroner Kellogg came up from Gold Hill to hold an inquest before the body was shipped to Portland.

A jury composed of S. J. Evans, P. Provost, F. G. Williams, D. L. Minkler, J. B. Leach, and S. M. Rhodes sat on the case before Coroner Kellogg Monday afternoon. The railroad company was represented at the inquest by Attorney W. M. Colvig, and Supt. Abern was also present.—Ashland Tidings.
