It has been solemnly declared by eminent scientists that kissing spreads consumption. For the next six months, commencing July first, every kind of matter that passes through the United States mails will be carefully weighed according to class, and a record kept even down to a single ounce. At the end of six months the weights of the mail in the different post-offices will be sent to the department at Washington and from that the total amount of mail handled in the United States will be obtained. This is done in order that the basis for paying the railroads for transporting the mails may be figured out.

The law against allowing noxious weeds to flourish in fence corners and on roadsides should be strictly enforced. This is especially so in regard to the Canada thistle, which can be seen growing luxuriantly along the highways in some portions of the county. This weed is especially troublesome, and it is only by continuous and unrelenting warfare that it can be conquered. It hasn't become the pest here yet that it is elsewhere, but a few years of neglect will give it such a start that it will be almost impossible to eradicate it.

The lid is on in Vancouver, Prosecuting Attorney James P. Stapleton has issued the order that will result Sunday in the closing of every place of business within the city limits with the exception of hotels, livery stables, drug stores and undertaking parlors. Notice was being served by the sheriff and the police on every business man in town to the effect that from midnight Saturday until midnight Sunday they shall sell no goods of any description. the pressure of the water from the wells is ample at the shore level the head diminishes so quickly with increase in elevation that no flow can be obtained along the higher banks above the shore, where the water is most needed. The common method of obtaining it at these higher levels is to use the force developed by the artesian flow to operate hydraulic rams, which in turn raise the water to the heights desired along the bluffs above the rivers and inlets. Thus it may be said that the artesian wells pump themselves.
