Klamath County News.

Klamath Falls Express.

Secretary E. I. Applegate has been
officially notified that Secretary Gar-
field would visit the Klamath project
about the middle of July.

Lou Williams accidentally shot and
killed the delivery horse belonging to
Orlander & Stille last Monday evening,
near the Winema boat landing. He
was extracting the shells from a 30-30
rifle when one exploded the bullet
striking the horse in the head and
causing almost instant death.

The work on the Reno canal is
going steadily forward and it is likely
that within a few months the work
will be far enough along to supply
Moore Bros. with water for power
purposes. The reclamation service is
working most of its force on this
part of the system. Nothing definite
can be ascertained regarding the
Clear lake dam construction. How-
ever, it is very probable that the
officials will advertise for bids on this
work so that all preliminary arrange-
ments will be made this year.

Mrs. A. E. Sargent, who was in-
jured in a railroad accident several
weeks ago, while on her way to San
Francisco from Klamath, has been
removed from the hospital to which
she was taken to the home of some
old Klamath friends in San Francisco.
While Mrs. Sargent is not yet able
to walk, there is sufficient improve-
ment in her condition so that her
daughter, Mrs. Will S. Worde, feels
that with the personal care she can
now give her mother, she will be able
to return to Klamath Falls with Mrs.
Sargent in a few weeks.

Geo. W. Looney struck a flow of
artesian water on his ranch a mile
north of the Wood ranch near Ft.
Klamath this week. Water was
struck at a depth of 190 feet and flows
8 feet above ground. The water from
this strike is clear and pure, while
the water at the Wood ranch has a
slight sulphur taste. The water at
both places has a temperature of 40
degrees.

J. C. Evans cut up Frank Morine
and Joe Hettinger Tuesday night at
the Morine hotel at Bonanza as the
result of a dispute over some doors
and windows Evans hauled over from
Hogue river. The row commenced by
young Morine striking Evans and
knocking him down. When Evans
got up he drew a knife and striking
at Morine with it made a slight cut
across the latter's breast. Joe Het-
tinger, who was standing by stepped
between the contestants and received
a blow on the arm from Evans' knife
cutting the flesh to the bone. Evans
was bound over to await the action of
the circuit court.

Klamath Republican.

Ed Wiggins was taken to the peni-
tentiary last Saturday, where he will
begin serving his two years' sentence
for forgery. Sheriff O'Brien and
W. B. Barnes had him in charge.

The contract for the roadbed
through the marsh, reference to which
was made in last week's Republican
has been signed by the Southern Pa-
cific, and Mr. Mason is making
preparations for starting work at
once. This will complete all of the
work in the marsh, and will be
finished December 31. The work from
Dorris to the point where Mr. Mason's
contract ends will be pushed with all
vigor this summer and unless unfore-
seen obstacles arise the California
Northeastern will reach this city next
spring.

Bishop O'Reilly, of the Baker City
diocese, in which the Catholic con-
gregation of this city is located, will
arrive in this city next Friday and
will remain until Monday morning,
when he will go to Lakewood, where
he is to deliver the Fourth of July
oration. His purpose in coming here
at this time is to dedicate the Church
of the Sacred Heart and administer
the sacrament and confirmation, both
of which ceremonies will occur next
Sunday morning, services commencing
at 10 o'clock.

Fourth of July will see the inaugu-
ration of the first street car service
in this city. Manager Beall of the
Huena Vista Company has turned
over to the Fourth of July Committee
the street car that has just been re-
ceived by his company with the in-
structions that it is to inaugurate the
service on the Fourth, and accord-
ingly arrangements are being made
to do so. It is admittedly a distinc-
tive event in one's life to ride on the
first car ever operated in a city, and
therefore a good deal of wire pulling
may be expected by those seeking the
honor. In order to prevent any dis-
crimination the committee has
decided to issue souvenir tickets
which will be sold for \$1.50 each.
These tickets will entitle the holder
to ride on the first trip made by the
car, and will entitle those partici-
pating to truthfully state that they "rode
on that car the first trip it ever made
in this city." R. M. Richardson will
act as motorman, engineer, pilot or
something of that sort, and Dr.
Martin will be there with that
pleasant smile and polite bow of his

"Fare, please." That it will be an
event worth participating in goes
without saying.

TRANSFORMED IN SLEEP

Riverside, Calif., June 20.—Not
since the strange case of "Leonie A.
and Leonie B.," which was presented
to the scientific world a few years
ago by Dr. Charcot, the celebrated
French psychologist, has there been
such a study in dual existence as that
shown by Mrs. C. E. Richards of
Riverside. In many respects the case
of Mrs. Richards is without a parallel
in history, doctors and
scientific men alike are completely
baffled; they do not even attempt an
explanation.

Falling into a deep trance-like sleep
which lasted two nights and a day
and from which it was impossible to
rouse her, she awoke a different indi-
vidual, with new tastes and desires,
and with absolutely no remembrance
of her former self.

For several months Mrs. Richards
had not been well, although nothing
serious seemed to be the matter. One
evening recently she went out driving
with her husband and, seeming much
fatigued upon her return went to bed
earlier than usual. When she failed
to awaken at the usual hour next
morning her husband went away to
his business without trying to arouse
her.

When at noon he found her still
sleeping he was alarmed and tried in
vain to awaken her. Finally Dr. R.
H. Martin of Riverside was called in
and all efforts to arouse the young
woman were equally futile. On the
morning of the second day her hus-
band was anxiously watching her
face when the eyelids suddenly
opened. When he spoke to her,
however, he was alarmed by her ex-
pression. For some minutes she was
unable to speak but finally in a far
away voice she asked:

"Where house is this, and how did

lection of the past, the husband of

first for his kindness and considera-
tion, she soon fell deeply in love with
her own husband.

Mrs. Richards is a pretty, intelli-
gent woman of 30, with brown eyes
and great masses of reddish brown
hair. Her manner is simple and
glucose and it would be hard to be-
lieve that she was not telling the
truth. Besides she herself does not
seem to realize how strange her case
is.

"It was like being a little baby and
beginning all over again, only that I
knew how to talk," she says, "but I
think I shall regain my memory after
a while. And if I do not what differ-
ence does it make? I am contented
and I am well, and I am looking for-
ward to a great happiness."

Repeated efforts have been made by
neighbors and relatives to discover
whether she really has forgotten all
about the past, as she seems to have
done. But these have been without
avail. To all intents and purposes
the Mrs. Richards of today and the
Mrs. Richards who sank into the
trance-sleep are two distinct
individuals.

DARROW MAKES STIRRING PLEA

ORCHARD BITTERLY SCORED BY
HAYWOOD'S LEADING
ATTORNEY.

Addresses Jury in Which He Says
Orchard is a "Cheap Soldier of
Fortune" and a Villain.

Boise, Idaho, June 20.—"The real
murderer of Governor Steunenberg,
his confessed slayer, cannot hide be-
hind this defendant, William D. Hay-
wood."

"That he killed the Governor, as he
related, undoubtedly is true; but his
motive was personal revenge, and
he was carrying out the edict of a
'master assassin.' We will show you
before our side is completed just
what actuated Orchard's crimes. We
will show you he for years was the
intimate of detectives of the Anti-
Owners' Association, also that he
never was the close personal friend
of Haywood, as he asserts."

"He killed Governor Steunenberg
for revenge and revenge alone. We
can prove to you that he told a dozen
people of his utter hatred of the man
he claimed robbed him of his com-
petency and made him a hopeless,
wandering vagabond."

"Orchard's testimony is utterly be-
yond belief, yet this creature would
try to save his craven neck by offer-
ing up as a sacrifice men who helped
him when he needed financial aid."

It was Clarence Darrow speaking,
and his words resounded through the
county courtroom as he opened the
case for the defense in the Haywood
murder trial yesterday. Darrow is a
remarkable jury orator, and his ex-
coriation of the arch fiend, Orchard,
was bitter in the extreme. He minced
no words in accusing him of out-
raged Judas Iscariot, and declared
his testimony utterly unworthy of
the credence of any honorable man.

He bitterly resented the imputa-
tion that from the inception of the
Federation of Miners it was part of
a conspiracy to kill, to control poli-
tics, set aside money with which to
hire lawyers to defend its acts and
to engage in other criminal practices.

"The Western Federation of Min-
ers was born right in the cells below
you," continued Darrow. "It was
born while Ed. Boyce and other lead-
ers were held there as prisoners. Mr.
Hawley, now chief counsel for the
State, was its first attorney. The
purpose was to organize the men for
the benefit of the working men, their
widows and orphans."

"The union has been interested in
passing the 8-hour law in Montana,
Utah and Colorado and has hired
lawyers to defend it. It also has
tried to elect judges who look upon
the laws from the standpoint of the
man with the pick and shovel. We
took an interest in politics, but never
entered into a criminal conspiracy. Our
members are not angels. Angels
don't work in mines. They are the
mine owners."

"The organization and been in ex-
istence, he said, for ten years before
the accused became prominent.

"It has been a fighting organiza-
tion from its inception, and if it does
it will be fighting," said Darrow.
"We won't apologize for any of its
acts. It has had to fight the mine
owners' association from the start
and it has done it. Men who attended
meetings were discharged, black-
listed and made tramps. In some in-
stances the president of the union
has been refused food in a town at
the behest of the mine owners. Ar-
rests came thick and fast, but in 99
cases out of 100 the men have been
refused the grace of a trial."

"One of the chief means to de-
stroy the union by the mine owners
has been the hiring of men of the
Pinkerton Detective Agency, with
McFarland at its head. They have
made detectives of officers of the
union, so when a strike occurred they
could urge violence and crime
and incite the members to unlaw-
fulness."

In 1892 Harry Orchard was in the
Cour d'Alene country, carrying a
union card for months.
Jack Skimins, with 1,000 others,
was sent to the bull pen in the Cour
d'Alene in 1892, and lay there sev-
eral months, suffering all sorts of
indignities. Colored soldiers tied
him to a post and ran a bayonet into
his breast. Orchard was a cheap
soldier of fortune, a show-striker
gambler, who never degraded him-
self by working many days at a time.
"I do not like to take any of Or-
chard's hard-earned fame from him,
but even though we show he was not
the greatest murderer of the age yet
we will console him by showing he
is the greatest monumental liar that
ever lived. He lied about the Bunk-
er Hill explosion just as he did about
the Bradley matter."
