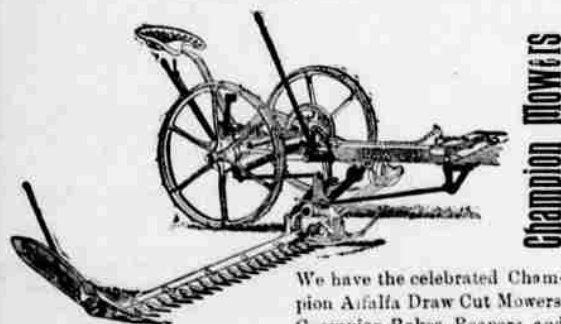

This was the last game of the season, as Medford had defeated allcomers and the boys have scattered to the mountains and elsewhere. Miles going to Butte and probable Isaac join the Seattle team. Cooper will remain here and become a permanent resident.

## Other Points of View.

Two hard jolts have been given to the divine right of kings. Corcoran's ruler is unceremoniously fired and Kaiser Wilhelm has to pay for a new automobile out of his private purse.

Again the railroads are facing the problem of more traffic than they can handle. Thus has the prediction of the Harriman gang that Roosevelt's policy would ruin the country been verified.

Small matter is this effort of "the interests" to find their man for next year's nomination. It is wasted. Roosevelt's successor is going to be chosen by the ten million men on the farms and in the workshops of the Nation.

Again this country takes a starting forward step in one of the arts that refine mankind. What European nation, effects or otherwise, ever named forty brass bands comprising 1500 musicians, marching in an Elk's parade and all playing "The Girl I Left Behind Me" at the same time.

Two more Japanese sealing schooners have been seized in Alaskan waters, but as they were taken inside of the three-mile limit there's an excellent prospect for the United States to get out of the scrape without paying damages. If this should prove true it will be an extraordinary contrast to the usual result of United States sealing seizures in those waters.

The attorney for the defense in the telephone bribery case in San Francisco enters the plea that Mr. Glass should not be convicted for the acts of the entire telephone company. Certainly not. Just convict him for his part of the bribery, and then convict the rest of the company for what it was guilty of in the matter.

One of the great advantages of a local fair, such as the apple and cherry fair and the horses and goat show, that have been held recently in Oregon, is relatively small expense. The preparatory work is done largely by volunteers, the prizes are offered by local business men, who see an advertising value in the enterprise, and the buildings required for the exhibits are small and need not be specially constructed and maintained for the purpose.

Good-natured rivalry among citizens of Oregon, in public improvements, is likely to prove a very live factor in stirring some of the towns to action. A community does not care much for the prodding it gets from its own citizens, but when the jabs come from a neighbor they hurt. Eugene and Salem, for example, have been boasting of street-paving enterprises for some time, Salem having started the movement. An incredulous neighbor suggested that they are paving streets with their mouths. Now Eugene has started actual work and takes occasion to remind Salem of the fact in language rather decisive. The Capital City won't enjoy being prodded by a smaller town enjoying much less state patronage.

## FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

Ashland Tidings: The county court has entered into a contract with C. H. Vaght, of this city for the building of the new hospital on the county poor farm near Phoenix, and work upon the structure will be rushed.

The remains of the late Hugh F. Barron, a pioneer of this section of the state, which were placed in the Kingsbury cemetery near his home, will now have their resting place in the Ashland cemetery. A massive sarcophagus of Oregon granite is being placed in position there, as a family memorial this week.

Jacksonville Post: Articles of incorporation of the Blue Ledge Extension Copper Co., were filed with the County Clerk yesterday. The incorporators are W. C. Green, H. A. Therolf and F. C. Page, all of Medford. The capitalization is \$250,000, with 1,000,000 shares at a par value of 25 cents a share. Principal place of business, Medford.

Attorney Earl Rogers, whose name figures in the reports of the court proceedings in the graft prosecutions at San Francisco, particularly as chief counsel for the officials of the United Railroads, Patrick Calhoun et al. in defending them against the bribery indictments, is a son of Prof. L. L. Rogers, who was president of the Ashland Academy about twenty-five years ago. Earl was a lad in the school here and will be remembered by the older residents of Ashland. He has lived at Los Angeles for years where he is recognized as one of the leading men of the bar.

A picnic and fishing excursion to Eagle Point and return via the R. R. V. Ry and the P. & E. is scheduled for Sunday, July 28. Train leaves Jacksonville at 7:15 a. m. and connects with P. & E. train leaving Medford at 8 a. m. The returning train will leave Eagle Point at 9 a. m. and 5:15 p. m., connecting with the R. R. V. train for Jacksonville. Round trip tickets will be sold from Jacksonville to Eagle Point and return at \$1, and from Medford to Eagle Point and return 70c. Children under 12 and over 5 years of age will be charged half fare, under 5, free.

Gold Hill News: Work on the cinabar prospects in the Ramsey canyon will be resumed about the first of August, according to advices received in Gold Hill the forepart of this week. This property has recently changed hands and is now held by a Portland company, with S. W. Steffen at the head. The property has long been conceded to be one of the richest cinabar prospects in the country and the ultimate development will prove this. In some of the ore samples that have been recently brought from the mine, quicksilver, in its purest form is shaken from the rocks. The new company will put on a much larger force of men than has ever been employed before and will install machinery that will aid in pushing prospective work as rapidly as possible.

J. E. Kirk and son have taken a two year's lease on the Corporal "G" mine on Sardine creek, from Mrs. Nina Smith, of this city, and Monday placed a crew of men at work. They will construct a new wagon road to the base of the hill and will build a chute for transporting the ore down the hill to the Lucky Bart mill, where it will be milled. Mr. Kirk will begin at once on an up-rail on the old workings of the mine and expects to be taking out ore from the start. They milled about ten tons from the Corporal "G" for Mrs. Smith the forepart of this week and produced very satisfactory results. Last week they milled about eighteen tons of ore from the Lucky Bart and secured a brick of gold weighing 21 ounces. The lease that Mr. Kirk has taken on the new property does not affect his lease on Bart—and he will keep on working as in the past.

## Railroad in Lake.

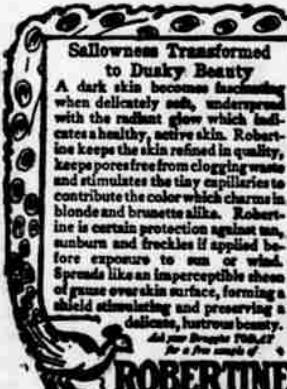

## CITY WATER PROBLEM SOLVED.

Pure Water at Less than Present City Rates

To the Public—I have a well 18 feet deep, nine feet across at the bottom making a basin to hold about 700 gallons of water. In the attic of my house 23 feet from the ground, I have a 400-gallon galvanized tank. I have a double acting Maud S. force pump connected to a one-fourth horse-power electric motor, the motor connected to city wires, the same that light my dwelling. This outfit cost outside of the well less than \$100. By keeping tab on the cost of running I fill my 400 gallon tank in 20 minutes, or I get 1925 gallons of water for 10 cents worth of electricity and get pure water.
