Ashland lodge, B. P. O. E., and the families, friends and best girls of the members, participated in an excursion to Coquille Sunday. A special train left Medford at 7:30 o'clock carrying 110 people from Jacksonville and Medford, sixty of the number being from this city. At Ashland over 250 more were taken on, bringing the grand total up to 365. At Coquille the day was pleasantly passed and the party returned at about 9 o'clock in the evening.

Wortman & Gore closed the deal Saturday by which they became the owners of the old Laramie property on C street opposite the post office, the consideration being \$6000. They will likely erect a building thereon sometime in the near future. No piece of property in the city is a better illustration of the increase in values that have come about during the past few years. Four years ago the property could have been purchased for \$1200. Less than two years ago, Karnes & Ritter bought it, paying \$2,000 for it. In April this year A. A. Davis became the owner for \$3,500 and now he has sold it for \$6,000, an advance of over 50 per cent in four years. There isn't a town in Oregon that can show such advances in price of property.

FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

Ashland Tidings:
Frank Dodge, the popular and efficient Southern Pacific telegrapher at Glendale, made his bachelor calls upon relatives and friends at the old home in Ashland, Friday, leaving on Saturday for Elly, Klamath county, where at the home of the bride's father, W. W. Finley, a well known Sprague River valley stockman, he is to lead to the marriage altar, Miss Cora Finley, a worthy and accomplished young lady, who has many friends in Ashland, where she formerly resided, being also a niece of Mrs. C. K. Kim of this city. The young couple will at once take up their home at Glendale.

Several months ago savings banks were incorporated for both Ashland and Medford by F. L. Myers and others, with a capital stock of \$50,000, also fifteen or twenty other savings banks in different parts of the state. The organizations were never completed, however. People have wondered who the Myers people were, etc. The Pacific Bank of Portland says Mr. Myers' institution in San Francisco was closed by the board of bank commissioners, and declares that for Mr. Myers to come into Oregon and organize fifteen or twenty banks, with an alleged parent institution in Portland, the German-American Bank, it considers a species of unmitigated call.

While attempting to board an out, going freight train, leaving Roseburg, Robert Murray, a brakeman employed by the Southern Pacific company, had a narrow escape from a serious accident and possible death. The caboose was one of the old type, being made from an old box car, and had to be entered from the side, by means of a hand rail and a stepping rod. Swinging forward Murray caught the hand rail but failed to reach the step and fell in such a manner that his legs extended under the car. With quickness born of the instinct of self preservation, the scrambled from beneath the caboose but in so doing his shoe was caught, by one of the wheels and a couple of his toes were severed from his foot. Grant Harrison, was the unfortunate victim of a serious accident last night, and that it did not result fatally is not fault of an auto driver, who was driving from Gold Hill to Medford at one o'clock last night. Mr. Harrison who had been at Medford, hauling a load of Chester Parker's household goods to him, was returning, and just this side of Tolo, suddenly met an automobile. The horses, frightened by the sudden flashing of the lights of the machine, ran into a ditch and threw Mr. Harrison out, causing a compound fracture of the leg. In his efforts to hold his team, he was kicked by one of the horses breaking two of his ribs and shattering his thumb, on his right hand. He managed to hold his team climbed into the wagon and drove into town, a distance of about four miles. Dr. Kelsey was called and dressed the wounds. The bloody wagon and harness tail of great nerve in his efforts to get himself home and his team to a place of safety. That Mr. Harrison escaped fatal injuries is miraculous as the team he was driving were young colts and have not been worked a great while. The driver of the automobile never even slowed his pace when he saw the damage he was causing. When a man so far forgets the rights of others as this there should be no protection from the law for them. Wagons and teams are entitled to a portion of the road as well as the machines and unless these rights are recognized serious results will follow.

The storm of Monday evening was without doubt, the worst that has visited this section in many years, and while no damage was done to crops in this vicinity, yet considerable damage was done to buildings and electric light and telephone poles by the wind and lightning. The first flash of lightning put the Condor Company completely out of business for the night, by setting fire to the sub-station. The fire company was called out but owing to the danger of live wires were unable to do anything, until the power was cut off at Gold Ray. No damage was done beyond the burning of the transformers. In the Fools Creek district, most of the damage was done by the wind. The roof of the bridge at the Duffield place was blown off, trees were uprooted, and the telephone line running to the Champion Dredger was damaged to quite an extent. At Rock Point considerable damage was done to small buildings and there was a heavy fall of ball. The power line to the Millicone mine was damaged slightly, but the lines in the city, operated by the Canal Company were not damaged. They shut off their current during the heaviest part of the storm. The storm seemed to be general all over the county.

Central Point Herald: Young & Pankey have finished their logging contract on Rogue river and have safely delivered the drive at the boom of the Condor Water & Power Company at the Gold Ray dam. Their contract was with the Condor company and was for 500,000 feet of lumber in the log delivered at the dam. This drive fully demonstrates the feasibility of driving Rogue river and should have a tendency to cause other mills to go in on the river in the valley to supply the local demand as

well as for export.
