Other Points of View.

The University of Michigan has inaugurated a department dealing with municipal problems, claiming that it is through municipalities that great reforms must begin.

With men behind the guns at the Golden Gate able to hit targets at 3000 yards six times out of nine shots, certain high-blown Astorians may take notice that their descent upon California, save in a peaceful way, would be a matter of some difficulty, says the Bee.

A bookkeeper at Bellingham is short in his accounts to the extent of \$7,000. His salary was \$100 a month and he spent about three times that amount during the same time, trying to maintain a high social standing. No surprise should be occasioned over his downfall.

John Armstrong Chandler, once the husband of Amelia Rives, is a lunatic in New York and a sane man in Virginia, according to the courts of the two states, and he has important business interests in both. Harriman Coming.

Ashland Tidings: E. H. Harriman, the "little wizard" of Wall street and the greatest railroad power in this country, will on his coming trip to the Pacific Coast visit Pelican Bay Lodge which, persistent rumor insists, has lately been acquired by the Southern Pacific Company, if the reports of his subordinate officials in California, the installation of telegraphic communication to the lodge and extensive furnishings of the lodge itself mean anything.

Saturday rush orders were issued for the making of a line of telegraph from the railroad line at Thrall to Pelican Bay Lodge by the way of Klamath Falls, and this line is expected to be ready and in working order by Thursday, or within three or four days time from the issuance of the orders.

Superintendent of Telegraph A. E. Roome and General Foreman Carmichael were at Thrall Saturday, and Line Foreman G. H. Hedberg, of this city, was called over there, who installed batteries, and two of the main wires between Portland and San Francisco were cut in on.

The telephone wires between Thrall and Klamath Falls have been leased temporarily by the railroad company, and telephones have been installed at Thrall so that the wire may be used by Manager Abbott and the people there at the same time it is being used for telegraphic purposes.

In addition to this, a gang of workmen were put at work at Klamath Falls this morning to string wire from that place to Pelican Bay Lodge, a distance of about 25 miles. There will be no trouble in covering the distance at that end of the line, as the wire will be strung on trees for a part of the way, and ten miles a day will be covered.

A carload of office furniture from New York billed for Pelican Bay Lodge was received by railroad officials last week which came via Weed. All this preparation is in anticipation of a few days' stay at the bay by Harriman, who will carry the railroad financial center of the country with him, it seems, on his trip to Pelican.

It is expected that within a short time Mr. Harriman, accompanied by his telegraphers and stenographers, and other officials of the Southern Pacific company, will make appearance at the Lodge. Press reports say that on his coming visit to the west, he will not touch Oregon at all, so that as he will evidently come up through California, the news agencies may either be mistaken or else take Klamath county as a part of Northern California.

Crisis in Water Users' Association

It would appear to a disinterested person that the Klamath Water Users Association is rapidly approaching a crisis, and unless a halt is called there is likely to be something doing in Reclamation Service circles that is not down on the program, at least so far as the general public knows, says the Klamath Herald. At the meeting of the board of directors of the Association held last Saturday afternoon and evening it was very evident that the majority of the board were not at all satisfied with the progress of work on the project, and what might be termed "drastic" measures were undertaken. It appears that the figures relative to force account work given out by the Reclamation Service officials are not satisfactory, and W. A. Dazell, cashier of the First National Bank, has been requested to act as what might be termed auditor for the Association and ascertain the exact cost of the work. It has been stated that the work on the Klamath canal is costing 50 cents, 50 cents and 50 cents, according to classification, which is claimed to be about half of the figures of the b'd received for the work. On the other hand people familiar with such work are confident that it is costing much more, and there you are.

Another thing that is causing more or less discontent is the charge of \$1.50 per acre for irrigating water this season. The board requested that the money be not collected until it was decided to what purpose it was to be applied. It is contended by some that the payment should apply on the payments assessed to the land, while it was held by others that it should go into the maintenance fund.

PEOPLE OF THE DAY

President of New York Life. Darwin Pearl Kingsley, who was recently elected president of the New York Life Insurance company, is a son-in-law of the late John A. McCall, and has been connected with the institution for many years. He succeeds Alexander E. Orr, who accepted the presidency on the retirement of Mr. McCall a couple of years ago. Mr. Kingsley is fifty years old. He was born at Albany, N.Y., on May 3, 1857, and graduated from the University of Vermont in 1881, having worked his way through college. He went to Colorado, taught school and did news-

paper work for awhile and in 1880 was elected auditor of Colorado, an office which carried with it the duties of superintendent of insurance. In 1880 he entered the New York Life as inspector of agencies. In 1892 he was transferred to the home office as superintendent of agencies. He was elected third vice president in 1898 and first vice president in 1900.

Mr. Kingsley will receive a salary of \$20,000 a year, or more than double the amount he has been drawing as vice president.

Mrs. McKinley was one of these, and the others were Mrs. Sarah Polk and Mrs. Julia Dent Grant, widows of Presidents Polk and Grant. Not only did congress allow them to send their mail matter without postage, but all postal packages addressed to them were carried free.
