### Klamath County News.

#### Klamath Falls Express.

Fred Smith states that about twelve acres of barley on the Thomas ranch, seven miles out on the Merrill road, was washed down last Saturday by an overflow from the K lateral. Most of the grain will be a total loss as it cannot be harvested. Grain on the Henry Law ranch was also damaged by the overflow. It seems that men employed in floating the poles for the reclamation service telephone line shut down the check gate in K lateral at the Thomas ranch in order to raise the water so that the floating of the poles would be facilitated, and then forgot to again open the check gate. The water flowing in from the main canal backed up against the check gate until it broke out a portion of the lateral embankment and found its way into the barley field.

Some few weeks ago the city of Klamath Falls purchased a street sprinkler paying therefor in the neighborhood of \$700. The outfit was turned over to T. C. Norris who agreed to supply a man and team to operate the same and get his pay by popular subscription. Mr. Norris has done excellent work since he took charge of the sprinkler, but the wages paid such service should command more than the \$700. Mr. Norris decided to give up the job and since then dust is again king of the city. A movement is on foot to have the subscription increased so that Mr. Norris will be justified in continuing the excellent service that he has heretofore given the city.

H. G. Wilson, superintendent of the Klamath Indian reservation, and E. L. Swartzlander, his chief clerk, arrived here late Monday night and have since been engaged in paying the Indians \$23.88 due everyone of them from the \$25,000 recently received as the first payment on the 600,000 acres of land exiled from the reservation when the boundary was established. Superintendent Wilson and his clerk have offices in the store of the Clerk Store Co., and are now paying the Klamath Indians who do not reside on the reservation.

Much has been said and written about this money being received by the Indians, but perhaps few understand how the Indians come to receive this amount of money. A brief history of the transaction follows: According to the terms of the treaty with the Indians certain points were established and imaginary lines between these points formed the boundary of the reservation. When these lines were surveyed an error was made and thereby 600,000 acres of land belonging to the Indians according to the terms of the treaty were excluded from the reservation. This land was taken up by white men under the public land laws so that when the error was discovered and the Indians claimed the lands, it would have caused serious complications to attempt to eject the settlers on the land, consequently the lands by an act of congress were purchased from the Indians at \$6.36 cents per acre, the total amount being \$3,937,007.20. The Indians have received \$25,000 as a cash payment on these lands and this sum has been divided equally among 1046 Indians and each received \$23.88. Part of the money will be used in buying cattle for the Indians and in improving the reservation and \$350,000 has been put out on interest which will be annually received by the Indians.

Street car service to the Upper Lake was inaugurated Tuesday. A definite schedule has not as yet been arranged. For the present cars will be placed on the sides of the cars announcing when the trip will be made. This extension will undoubtedly result in a considerable increase in the receipts and ought to prove quite attractive to those who might desire to make a flying trip to the Upper Lake.

The city was thrown into a fever of excitement Tuesday evening when the whistle at Moore Brothers' sawmill sounded a fire alarm. It was quickly realized that a fire at this point would result in a great conflagration and be a serious blow to the industrial welfare of the city. Every one seemed to be actuated by the desire to render assistance and no alarm that has been sounded recently brought out so many people as did this one, and every man was bent on giving all the help he could in propelling the hosecart. The employees at the mill, however, worked like beavers and the blaze, which occurred in the boiler room, was nipped in its incipientcy, and was under control before the first hosecart crossed the bridge. Moore Brothers had just completed the laying of a main to their mill to provide protection against fire.

Before many more days pass around the stage for Pokegama will resume its old schedule and leave this city for the railroad at 4 o'clock in the morning. For the past several weeks it has been leaving at six o'clock in the morning. The leaving at the latter hour was made possible by arrival of No. 16 at Thrall several hours behind schedule time, on account of the break-down of the ferryboat Hecatia. Repairs on the boat, however, are nearly completed, and when this is done then 16 will arrive about on time. Dime rumor again has it that the boat will go back on the Keno run, but the old lady has handed this out so often that no one is going to believe her until the goods are delivered. It would be a great blessing

to the traveling public if such an arrangement could be brought about.

The Steamer Winema was blown ashore and tipped over Wednesday afternoon, while on the return trip from the Landing and Odessa. The accident was due to a cyclone that came down the Williamson river with such speed and fury as to make it impossible for the captain to turn his boat so as to take it head on. The passengers climbed to the upper side of the boat as she went over, and were later taken off by a launch. Until the Winema is righted the run to the Agency landing will be made by the Buena Vista.

## FARM-FIELD AND GARDEN

### HARPOON HAYFORK.

Outfit That Works Satisfactorily in Medium Sized Barns.

For the benefit of those who have a small quantity of hay to make and feed that circumstances will not warrant the expense of an elevator I give a sketch of an outfit which, with the harpoon fork instead of slings, may be used to haul hay in medium sized barns about as well as with the slings, but of course, not so rapidly. This outfit for ordinary barns, as described by a writer in Rural New Yorker, consists of not more than 125 feet of three fourths inch rope, thirty-five feet of three-eighths inch rope, four pulleys, one floor hook and a harpoon fork. A pulley is fastened to barn near post and to one side of harpoon fork; pulley fastened to about third rafter from

end of barn, near peak, and over mow in which it is desired to put the hay. The door pulley is fastened with hook in floor at one side near the door or to post near floor. If in the door be sure the hook reaches the sill. At the left is pulley which is strung on rope between pulleys. To the ring in center pulley is fastened fork, trip rope attached. The forkful of hay will draw slightly against the side of mow, and it will be necessary to nail three or four boards with top ends fastened to the beam for the hay to draw against.

### The Vegetable Garden.

Size is, and always must be, a desirable quality in vegetables, but when it is obtained at the expense of succulence, flavor and other good points then striving after it becomes a distinct loss instead of a gain, remarks Gardening. One of the commonest vegetables is, of course, the cabbage, and it is the rule in almost every garden to grow large heads and let them develop into great, white, hard monstrosities as big as a football. What a difference there is between the flavor of these and a new little green cabbage just beginning to turn yellowish white at the heart a great many people do not know because they have never tried the latter. For storing away in winter and for turning into all kinds of prepared cabbage the white hard heads are all right, but any one who has a garden and knows the tender green cabbage as it should be will be likely to let the cabbages all grow that way.

Beet root, again, is never so good as when the roots are about two or three inches in diameter, and the large tough roots obtained by sowing early on heavily manured soil are fit only for cattle feeding. A few rows of beets sown now will produce excellent roots either for use in late summer and autumn or for keeping through the winter, and these are far better in color and flavor than large, coarse roots. Asparagus is often sought for with thick stems, blanched for nearly their whole length of a foot or so, but where is the comparison between them and the nice crisp shoots with green tops just bursting? The one is coarse and insipid in flavor, the other delicate and tender. Besides, the small ones are easier to grow.

Many other instances could be given. On the other hand, there are some varieties that may be good and yet large. We do not hold a brief for small and badly cultivated produce. Far from it. There is nothing worse than vegetables grown slowly on poor soil, as they are always tough and crude in flavor, nor would we decry size in most kinds if quality at the same time is kept in mind.

### Wood Pigeons in Colorado.

All tillable sections of Colorado can produce good crops cheaply. In the irrigated alfalfa sections alfalfa pasture will produce 500 to 1,000 pounds of pork each year from an acre. The grain feed for these sections is barley, and in 1906 the average yield of barley in the Fort Collins district was over 4,000 pounds per acre, sufficient to produce over 800 pounds of pork. Barley produces a specially fine flavor in pork. So does alfalfa, and the two combined make a choicer flavor than either alone.—Kimbball's Dairy Farmer.

### Corn and Potatoes.

This work of cultivation should be followed until the corn or potatoes get to be too large for the purpose, and by this time the weed growth should be destroyed, the soil in the best condition and the crop flourishing. Says a writer in American Cultivator. Sometimes a few coarse weeds will start up late.

These should be destroyed at once and not allowed to go to seed.

In connection with the handle, in close reach of the user's hand, is a small lever. By grasping the latter and forcing it down a connecting rod raises the lid of the pot, the lid being hinged to the edge of the pot close to the handle. There is absolutely no danger of burning the fingers or hand. Another advantage is the fact that any liquid in the pot can also be drained off quickly and with ease.

### Princeton's New Social Plan.

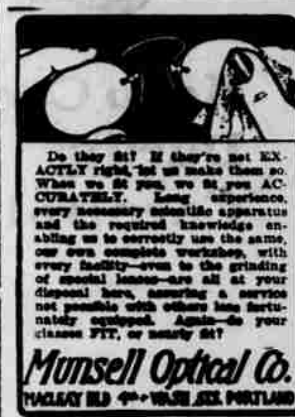
The plan of President Woodrow Wilson, who has instituted a radical reorganization of social life at Princeton university, is one that will be studied with deep interest by the other big institutions of learning. He will abolish the clubs and have an equal number of students from each class chosen in what he calls a quad. His suggestions have been adopted by the board of trustees and will soon be put in operation.

"It is our purpose," said President Wilson, "to draw the undergraduates



together into residential quads, in which they shall eat as well as lodge together and in which they shall, under the presidency of a resident member of the faculty, regulate their corporate life by some simple method of self government. For this purpose it would be necessary to place all future dormitories in such relation to those already erected as to form close geographical units. Every undergraduate would be required actually to live in his quad—that is, to take his meals there as well as to lodge there." President Wilson is a native of Virginia and fifty-one years old. He has been the head of Princeton since 1902.
