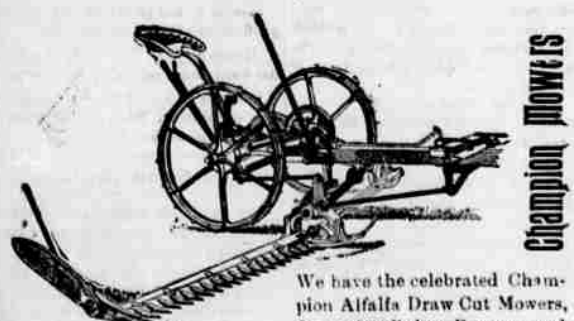

Other Points of View.

Because the telegraph companies and their employees have a dispute over hours and wages, the whole American people are hampered more or less in their work and business. Those who regard government ownership of public utilities as the solution of these difficulties will find more listeners if these constant strikes, walk-outs and lockouts continue.—Eugene Guard

They say they will not endure the restrictions of the game law which was framed by the influence of city sports and rod and gun clubs to protect the Chinese bird. They are beginning to regard them as domestic fowls, as they are getting so tame as to come and eat with their poultry. Central Point Herald:

Mr. Graham is probably the pioneer of this industry in Oregon and he has found the pumice land on upper Rogue river to be particularly adapted to the growth of this valuable root. He already has some 3000 plants growing and will put in more as fast as he can procure the plants. Ginseng is highly prized by the Chinese as a medicine and is said to sell in the Celestial Kingdom for more than its weight in gold, and the production of the plant in this country where the conditions are right is highly profitable.

Jackonville Post: Hain Klam, the brilliant artist and cartoonist of Southern Oregon, was in this city the first of the week putting up a handsome advertising notice in the office of the U. S. Hotel. Mr. Klam is especially gifted in his profession and with some day make a record for himself that will be envied by the best of them. He has original ideas in advertising that alone should make him a fortune, and that together with artistic ability, sets him away ahead of the average advertising man. Some of his work at the Medford Casual never was equalled in the advertising world.

A clam shell, petrified with the clam inside, was picked up from the bottom of Mr. Sparks' well on Sparks' Heights, almost 2200 feet above sea level this week by Mr. DeVore. The well is twenty-five feet deep. Another shell was found in the well at a depth of twelve feet by Mr. Sparks. Since the finding of these shells a number of boys have stated that star fish and other sea shells have been picked up on the hills above Jacksonville.

Ashland Tidings: A new bank, to be known as the First Trust and Savings Bank of Klamath Falls, is soon to be launched at that place. The articles of incorporation are almost ready for filing. The capitalization will be 250 shares of the par value at \$100 each, and the incorporators are: G. W. White, J. W. Siemens, George T. Baldwin, George R. Lindley, George P. Lindley, W. L. Vawter, E. Dutton.

The State Railroad Commission is in receipt of a reply from General Manager E. E. Calvin to a letter inquiring into the status of passenger train No. 16, of which so much complaint has been lodged on account of its continued lateness. Mr. Calvin lays the blame on the extra heavy traffic on the east side line of the Sacramento river, which is traversed by this train, all efforts to relieve the congestion having been unsuccessful to date, but since the transfer boat Solano has been put in good repair and the track conditions upon the east side line have been rendered safer for fast running he hopes to put the train into Oregon on better time in future.

The Siskiyou county authorities have exonerated brakeman F. C. Alton of any blame for shooting the negro blind baggage tourist, Frank Taylor, on train 11 near the state line recently. The negro is recovering from the wound which was at first thought to be fatal. Witmann, Taylor's companion, whom the latter also assaulted with a knife, is held at Yreka, yet, as a witness against the murderous negro.

Valley Record: The Executive committee of the Ashland Commercial Club in a communication called the city council's attention Monday night to some matters of importance in regard to Ashland creek canyon road and the forestry service in relation to Ashland reserve. The council took the matter up and directed Recorder Eggleston to address M. J. Anderson, acting forest supervisor in charge of Siskiyou and Ashland reserves, of the city intention to always keep open and maintain the Ashland canyon road and the disposition of the city to cooperate with the forestry service to build a highway through the Ashland reserve to Cinnabar springs for visitors and tourists but at the same time protecting the watershed of Ashland creek from the deleterious effects of campers. The forestry service is preparing to provide Forester W. G. Kropke with a telephone system through Ashland reserve and it will be constructed immediately.

A message would go to the nearest cousins and friends and a supper be cooked. It might be only rice and bacon, but it was good to hungry men. declares Charleston's historian, Mrs. Ravenel. The dance and the feast would continue until the stars grew pale.

Often those merry makings were disturbed by the enemy, but there was always a negro or two on the watch, and the harsh note of the screech owl or the cry of the whippoorwill would give the alarm, then "partings in haste," a rush for the horses, a sharp scuffle, a hot pursuit and perhaps a prisoner taken.

The young men had odd adventures. One young fellow betrayed himself by his appetite. He was pressed and had taken shelter at Mrs. Motte's place, on South Street. She called him in as a suspect and, pushing it against the wall, told him to keep quiet until the enemy had gone and she could release him.

Unluckily he heard through the open window his hostess giving directions to the cook about the chickens which were to be dressed for the dragons' dinner. He could not bear to be left out and thrust his head from the curtain and cried out, "Keep the giblets for me!"

The soldiers heard, and he was at once caught and carried off to repeat at leisure of his indiscretion.

DOUGHERTY ISLAND.

It is the Most Remote and Desolate Spot on Earth.

Which is the loneliest, most desolate and most inaccessible island on the face of the globe? Many people would doubtless choose for one of the Crozets, in the south Atlantic ocean. And yet Hog Island, the westernmost of the group, is by no means an undesirable place of habitation, abounding as it does in berries and rabbits, penguins, seals and sea elephants.

Hog Island, in the same seas, is far more isolated as well as more barren, but it possesses, as does Hog, a shelter hut for castaways, and it is visited by whalers occasionally. So, too, is South Georgia, but it has no shelter hut, and as it is right out of the track of shipping any one unlucky enough to be cast away thereon would stand a very poor chance of ever getting off alive.

Bouvet Island, in the same seas, is visited even more rarely, and on the last occasion when a ship touched there five corpses were found frozen on the beach, grim mementoes of some unrecorded tragedy of the sea. Doubleday Island, in its turn, is still lonelier and more inhospitable than Bouvet.

But probably the palm in this direction must be ascribed to Dougherty Island, on which, so far as is known, no landing has ever been effected. It has only been sighted twice in a century and is officially described in the admiralty sailing directions as "the most remote and isolated spot on earth."—Pearson's Weekly.
