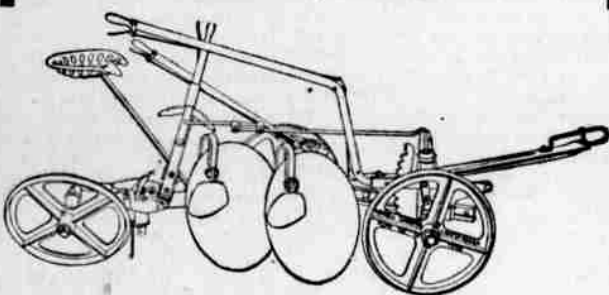

Central Point Herald:

Dick Reese, the veteran stage driver, has quit the Butte Falls line and is spending a few days in town looking around for a business opening in which to invest. There are rumors afloat that Cupid, the little rascal, has been aiming his arrows in Mr. Reese's direction and that wedding bells may ring in the near future out toward Eagle Point.

Mrs. F. A. Adams, of Merrill, was the guest of Mrs. J. Merritt for a few days during the week. Mrs. Adams was formerly Miss Martha Cardwell, and at one time was a teacher in the Central Point schools and was also a former postmistress at this place. She left for her home Sunday morning.

Gold Hill News: The Bowden Mining property on Blackwell Hill which has been in a state of inactivity so long, has been sold by the sheriff of Jackson County to J. T. Neilson of this city. Mr. Neilson has been interested in the mine in the past and now after becoming its sole owner it is a matter of conjecture whether Mr. Neilson intends too carry on the work of development himself or dispose of the property to a company who will complete the work begun by the late Bowden Mining Company. The mine which is a quartz proposition produced some very good ores, but for some reason the company never fully developed it, and for some time the mine has been standing idle.

Miss Emma Penninger, the six-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Penninger, received quite a painful wound Tuesday afternoon while playing with some companions, on the south side. She was playing near a fire, in which some rubbish was being burned, when a cinder cap exploded, striking her in the face, burning and lacerating it quite badly. Dr. Chisholm was called and attended her. The wound was quite painful, but she is getting along nicely at present.

Jacksonville Post: At a regular meeting of the common council of Jacksonville held last Tuesday evening, a petition signed by a majority of the business men of the city, praying for the removal of the arch, owned by the Condon Water & Power company, which adorns (?) the corner of California and Third streets, was read and the Condon people were notified to remove the arch. No other business of importance was transacted.

The sheriff's office has received advice from the attorney-general to the effect that the new tax law, enacted at the last legislature, will not go into effect, so the same procedure as heretofore will be gone through with. That is property upon which the taxes are not paid will be sold at a sheriff's sale and the delinquent tax list will be published in some county newspaper as has always been the law. The new law lacks several features to make it practicable, and it certainly would have been decidedly unpopular.
