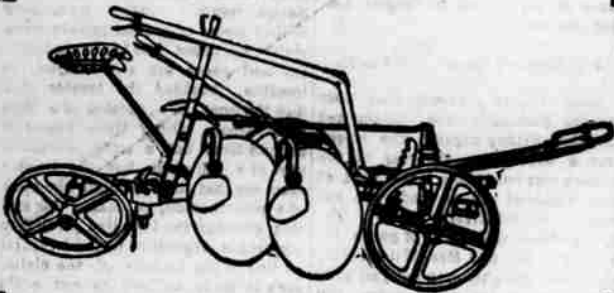

W. B. Glafke, a member of the Board of Governors of the Portland Commercial Club has put before the Club some intensely interesting figures on the poultry and egg business, for general circulation throughout the state. One hundred carloads of eggs alone were shipped into the State of Oregon during the past twelve months. These would average the year round, \$2000 per car. Oregon growers supply the chief demand for turkeys, ducks, geese, and chickens, but four times the present production would find a ready home market while in eggs we might multiply by ten and still the price would pay as well as any product grown either on the farm or in the orchard.

The La Grande Commercial Club has taken advantage of the fact that the passenger trains stop there from ten to fifteen minutes while changing engines, baggage, etc., and have erected an exhibit building and before the trains reach the depot an announcement is made that all who desire to do so can get off and look through the exhibit hall. A lecture is delivered to the passengers. Twice a week the ladies distribute flowers to each and every passenger and place beautiful bouquet each table in the dining car accompanied by a card "Compliments of La Grande." On some occasions they have distributed prizes to every passenger, and placed prize jelly on each table in the dining car, accompanied by cards bearing: "Compliments of La Grande. FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

Gold Hill News:

Benjamin S. Owings, a farm hand employed on the DeRoboam ranch, near Woodville, committed suicide, Thursday morning, by hanging himself. Owings, had for the past nine or ten years been an inmate of the insane asylum, at Salem, but was released about eighteen months ago. He had been employed at the DeRoboam place for the past two months, but during the time had never shown any signs of malady returning. Yesterday Mr. and Mrs. DeRoboam went to town and in the evening, upon their return, found Owings' body hanging to the rafters of the wood house, where he had hanged himself. He was 55 years old and had been a resident of this section of the country for a number of years prior to the time he was sent to the asylum.

An illustration of the diversity of the soil in this section is being given by the Sitka Bros., of this city. These gentlemen, who for the past several years have been operating a brick and tile plant across the river, are now having the same ground, consisting of a ten acre tract, set to Du Combe pears. Men, well versed in horticulture, have examined the ground and they say that it possesses all the properties that are peculiarly adapted to the raising of this special variety of pears. These gentlemen will retain about two acres of the ground with which to continue the manufacture of brick and tile. They estimate that this amount of land will be sufficient to continue their operations for a number of years as the brick and tile clay lays in strata to a depth of nearly twenty feet. They are now having the ground cleared for their orchard as soon as the proper time arrives will plant the trees.

Operations will again be resumed at the Tin Pan mine, on Galie creek after a delay of several months. O. O. Beaud, of Denver, Colo., arrived in Gold Hill last Saturday to take charge of the affairs at the mine. The company will at once dismantle the mill that is now on the property and will install a new ten-stamp mill. The mill that is now on the property was installed early this spring, but has by a thorough test proven inadequate and as a result will be torn down. The Tin Pan mine is one of the best properties in this district and under efficient management will be a paying proposition. It has a large ore body and the assays show good values.

Alex Martin, Sr., visited in Ashland yesterday for a short time en route to Jacksonville to attend to business matters, after which he will return to his home at Oakland, Calif., having been spending the summer months in Klamath county and elsewhere in a pioneer of Jackson county, and made his start in worldly wealth in the blacksmithing business in Jacksonville in early mining days.

The Grants Pass Commercial Club has a balance on hand of about \$500 after handling the receipts and expenditures of the recent successful district fair in that city. The total receipts of the fair were \$2905.45, including the \$1200 state appropriation, and it is likely the fair will be made an annual event regardless of the Jackson-Josephine district, the Observer says.

Ashland Tidings: The fine building erected for the Commercial Club is now plastered, and the interior finished. Mr. Hartman is putting up a 3,000 gallon tank near the building. The height will be about 42 feet to give ample pressure to supply water any place in the new building. It will also be used for irrigating. The tank is to

be filled with water by a ram located in a spring not far distant from the tank.

Ashland Tidings: Michael Ganey, well known in Jacksonville, who was committed to the state insane asylum in 1901, died at that place last week.

At the public sale by Referee W. A. Patrick, Saturday of real estate of Phillip Mullen estate, the lime kiln property on Wagner creek comprising 240 acres was sold to Schumate and Ossenbruge for \$2110; Elmer Coleman bought for \$300 a forty acre tract near the above. A small triangular piece of land in Ashland, corner of Mechanic and Main streets was bid in by the city for \$60.

As a result of a conference, ministers of Coffeyville will announce union scale of prices for the conduct of funerals and will appoint a committee to start a movement toward securing a state wide adoption of the scale. Coffeyville ministers will charge five dollars for every funeral conducted, other than for members of their own churches.

Early in the week, a supernumerary minister was called to a little town near here, to conduct a funeral. He paid his own carfare hired a livery team, and then had to buy his own supper, when he got back to the village after the funeral. The meeting of the ministerial association was called at once and the union funeral wage scale adopted.
