Not to be outdone by the treasurer and county recorder, Judge Dunn and family spent Sunday driving over this end of the valley, but we think he was paying closer attention to the condition of the roads than to any thing else, for that is one of his hobbies—and that just suits the taxpayers.

I. B. Macdonald is enjoying a visit with his brother from New York, who spent a few days here a couple of years ago. This trip he will see much more of the country as he is quite interested in the products of this valley since paying ten cents a piece for Oregon apples in the Eastern Hub.

S. K. Adams is developing an industry here, that bids fair to be both profitable and far reaching, namely: The manufacture of sorghum molasses. Mr. Adams has taken up the work scientifically and has proved that a syrup can be obtained from the cane grown on certain lands here that equals the best Orleans molasses, and from the way orders are coming in he will be sold out about as fast as he can make it. Strict attention to a good plant and cleanliness certainly must have a lot to do with the flavor of the product, for we never before tasted such delicious molasses. The juice as it comes from the mill is tested for sugar content and strength and is passed through a half dozen strainers then through two settling tanks and is then filtered through fine muslin before reaching the evaporating pan there, as it slowly passes over the 60 feet of copper plate, all the time steadily boiling, all of the vegetable matter is skimmed off then the juice is tested once more before it is again filtered into the finishing vat, here again a skillful man is kept constantly skimming and watching as the heat must not vary nor the skimming cease till the point of perfection is reached, when the vat is removed from the fire and contents allowed to cool before drawing off into barrels, etc. To us the whole work was very interesting and the finished article a joy at meal time, for the consumer can feel sure that he is getting something free from adulterations as the watchword is "cleanliness" from first to last. The output is from seventy-five to a hundred gallons per acre and is sold under the name of "Rock Drip".

High Wages in Klamath.

In order to secure and keep laborers at work on the Keno Canal of the reclamation project, the scale of wages has been increased to \$3 per day of eight hours' work. Until October 1 the scale was \$2.50 per day, but recently the contractor who is building the grade for the Southern Pacific across the tule lands of Lower Klamath Lake, Archie W. Mason, raised wages on that work to \$2.75 per day. As the scale on government work is the basis of wages on all other labor in the Klamath Basin, it means that common labor is receiving probably the highest scale here of any place on the coast outside of the large cities.

Employment agencies in Portland and San Francisco are sending men to Klamath Falls to increase the number of men on the canal work to the number it is the intention of the engineers to work throughout the

greater part of the winter season.
