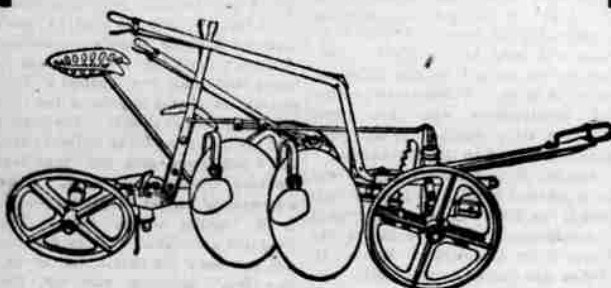

—Postmaster Woodford informs us of a new postal regulation regarding postage to foreign countries which will prove convenient to many people, who have correspondents in countries outside the United States. Heretofore it has not been practicable to enclose a stamp for reply or stamped envelope to a correspondent in foreign country for the obvious reason that the stamp wouldn't be good there. Neither was it possible to enclose silver to pay for a reply for the same reason. Now the government commencing October 1st, issues an international reply coupon, good in all countries subscribing to the international agreement. One can buy a reply coupon in the United States at a cost of eight cents, enclose it in his letter to his correspondent abroad, and this coupon entitles the recipient to a five cent stamp, or its equivalent in the postal currency of the country in which he lives, for the purpose of replying to the letter.
