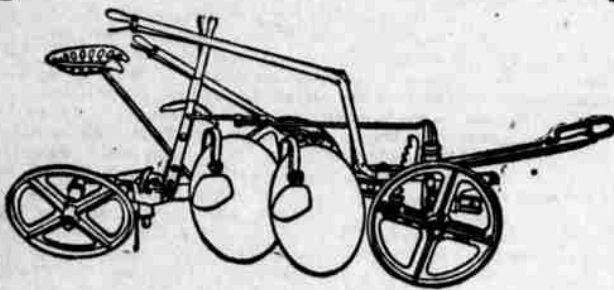

Secretary of the Treasury Cortelyou in an address before the New York Mercantile Association the other day, paid tribute to the heroic work of bankers, financiers and business men in advertising a widespread panic in the country; and calls upon the people now as the crisis passes to do their part. Said he: "It is a time when every citizen should assume his share of the burden. The hoarding of money, the execution of unnecessary harsh requirements in business dealings, retard our return to normal conditions. The hoarded money should be put back in the banks and the execution from bankers and merchants should be proportioned to actual business necessities. To do otherwise is not only unpatriotic but unwise. I believe that if this money of the country, wherever hoarded, were at once put back to fulfill its functions in the channels of trade, there would be within 24 hours an almost complete resumption of business operations. I doubt whether we can in any way estimate the loss that has fallen upon those who have, either from selfish or misguided motives, thus drawn their money from places of more than reasonable safety to put it where it has been lost through robbery or fire or other misfortune."

—The postoffice officials have ordered a closed pouch mail service on freight train 221 between Roseburg and Ashland to connect with trains 11 and 12 at the former place. This is a poor makeshift and will not at all satisfy the demands of the people of Southern Oregon whose service has been so badly demoralized by the discontinuance of trains 11 and 12 through this region. Train 221 is called the fast freight but it is so irregular as to its time that it is scarcely to be depended on to help the situation any.

—Two hundred and thirty new people found homes in Oregon every day from September 1st to October 31st as a result of the colonist one-way tickets, and through the help of the newspapers the population and wealth of the state has been enormously increased. The exact number of tickets sold as reported by Mr. William McMurray, General Passenger Agent of the Harriman Lines, for 1907, was 13,753. For the same time in 1906 it was 8890, an increase of 4863 of about sixty per cent. This of course does not include tickets sold to Oregon over the Canadian Pacific, Northern Pacific, Great Northern, or any other roads whose tickets came around by way of Puget Sound. The Oregon Development League has made the colonist rates the chief feature of its work. The Portland Commercial Club circulated 400,000 leaflets with this low rate its central feature, and probably no advertising ever done by any state in the Union has shown better results. The rates will be on again during March and April, 1908.

Ashland Tidings:

The S. P. Company will meet its October pay roll with San Francisco checks payable in clearing house currency and the banks of Ashland to be prepared to meet the pay checks which will be sent to employees here within a few days and which aggregate from \$15,000 to \$20,000 monthly, have drawn on San Francisco for clearing house certificates so that some of the new style currency may be expected to be in circulation in Ashland shortly.

Miss Maud Wilhoit, while employed at the Electric Laundry, last Tuesday, caught her left hand between the heavy steam rolls of a big mangle and it was drawn in and the flesh badly burned to the wrist. No bones were crushed and it is thought that the young lady will suffer no permanent disfigurement from the painful accident, though it will be some months perhaps before it entirely heals.

Ashland's annual city election occurs this year on December 17th, and the council will issue the notices in connection therewith at the adjourned session to be held next Tuesday evening. As yet little talk has been heard in connection with the election and candidates therefore. The officials to be chosen include mayor, treasurer, recorder, two councilmen in the first ward and one each in the second and third wards. It is not likely that the primary nominating system will be called into requisition but the nominations made as usual by petitions, which are required to be filed together with the acceptance of candidates not less than five days before the election. Petitions must contain the names of not less than 25 legal voters of the city.

Gold Hill News: President M. M. Dodge and Secretary C. G. Smith, of the Pacific Coal Co., and K. E. Doan, General Manager, were in Gold Hill Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. While here they made a trip out to the company's coal lands in the Meadows district. This is the first time these gentlemen have made an inspection of their holdings in this section and they feel confident that under development they will have one of the best properties on the coast.

W. L. McClure, this week, traded his saw mill on Morrison creek, to Doc Vroman, for the latter's residence property in this city. Mr. McClure secured an excellent piece of property containing nearly three acres and a good house, in excellent condition. The saw mill was formerly a part of the Peter Wilson estate and was sold to Mr. McClure by the administrator of the estate Mr. Vroman will place the mill in running condition at once. He has contracted about 800 acres of timber land adjacent to the mill and expects to be cutting lumber before the first of the year. Doc says he has been in every kind of business except a sawmill or running a steamboat and that he expects to give the lumber business a thorough test before retiring. Now if some one will slip up behind Doc, when he is asleep and hand him a steamboat, he will probably be satisfied.

Central Point Herald:

Dave Grim is justly proud of the big cougar skin which he brought home from a hunt in the Evans creek country recently and is having it dressed and made into an elegant rug with which to adorn the Grime home. Mr. Grim was with a hunting party consisting of B. F. Peart, Jas. Shields, L. E. Van Vleet, Fred Cornutt and Mr. White and was camped near the Lewis ranch on Signet creek. He and Mr. Shields were hunting for deer when he ran onto the big cat, which had been enjoying a nap under a spreading fir tree. As the beast raised its head

Dave shot it and though the shot was fatal the beast died hard. It went into the air about ten feet and the hunter was glad to be out of reach of its claws before the death struggle was over. It measured 7 feet and 9 inches and its weight was estimated at more than 200 pounds. Besides the cougar the party brought in three deer, Mr. Peart bagged three big fat coyotes. Cougars and coyotes are quite plentiful in that section and Mr. Lewis, who has a ranch there, lost a large number of hogs and other domestic animals from their depredations this season.

BOOK PLATES.

They Came Within Fifty Years After the Invention of Printing. It was within half a century from the invention of printing that book plates were introduced as identifying marks to indicate the ownership of the volume. Germany, the fatherland of printing from movable type and of wood cutting for making impressions in ink on paper, is likewise the home land of the book plate.

The earliest dated woodcut of accepted authenticity is the well known "St. Christopher of 1423," which was discovered in the Carthusian monastery of Huxheim, in Silesia. It was to insure the right of ownership in a book that the owner had it marked with the coat of arms of the family or some other hereditary device. Libraries were kept intact and passed from generation to generation, bearing the emblem of the family. The first book plate in France is dated 1574; in Sweden, 1575; Switzerland, 1607, and Italy, 1623. The earliest English book plate is found in a folio volume once the property of Cardinal Wolsey and afterward belonging to his royal master. The earliest mention of the book plate in English literature is by Pepys, July 16, 1688. The first known book plate in America belonged to Governor Dudley. Paul Revere, the patriot, was one of the first American engravers of book plates and a designer of great ability.—Journal of American History.

THE FLYING FOX.

Curious Inhabitant of the Forests in Eastern Australia.

The flying fox is a very curious inhabitant of the forest near Moreton bay, in east Australia. It lives in flocks and moves generally toward the dusk of the evening, and the noise produced by the heavy flapping of the so called wings is very singular. The flocks like quiet places, where there are large araucarian pine trees, with an underwood of scrub and creepers. The foxes hang in vast numbers from horizontal branches of the pine trees. When there is a clear space among the trees an enormous number of the animals may be seen, and their noise can be heard, for directly they see anything unusual they utter a short bark, something like the sound made by young rooks. Often every branch is crowded, and the young foxes are seen either flapping their wings and holding on with their hind feet and with their heads downward or snarling and fighting for places.

Suddenly the whole take to flight and flap their furry, winglike sides and wheel around like heavy birds. Many fly with their young holding on to them. The creature is not a true fox, and there is a fold of skin which reaches from the fore to the hind legs. This is called the wing, and it enables the pteropus, as the animal is called, to float and turn in the air.
