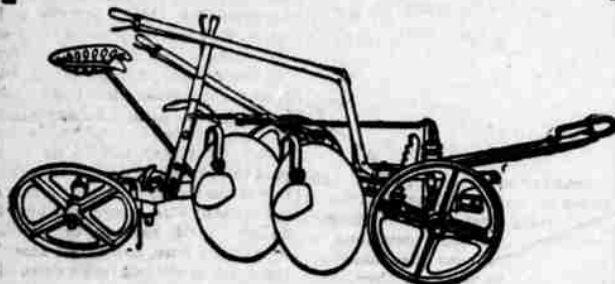

Diversified Farming

A former Oregon farmer who was persuaded to return to Western Nebraska in order to engage in "diversified" agriculture as well as the intensive kind, reports to the experiment station that his crop for 1907, so far as yet garnered, consists of an acre of baked potatoes, 50 bushels dried peaches and apples, 25

acres parched corn, one acre of roasted peanuts, and if the weather continues dry he also expects to harvest two acres of melon preserves. All these crops will be necessary for home consumption, so that he will have nothing for export except perhaps a few bushels of chine bugs and grasshoppers, and a score or two of jack rabbits on the hoof.—Ashland Tidings.

What Would You Call Them?

There was one very peculiar case on the ranges of Elko county, Nevada, this year that is worthy of particular mention. In this case there were four sections of land involved. Two of these four sections were owned by cattle companies and were so situated that two corners met. Between these two sections were two railroad sections, leased by sheep men. The four sections met in a common center and formed a square. The sheepmen wished to drive their sheep from one railroad section to another, but in order to do so they had to drive the sheep over the common center and thus trespass on land of the cattlemen. FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

Central Point Herald.

Mr. Blinger De Vore and Miss Julia Hanson, two young people from Canyonville, were quietly married at Jacksonville Monday. They had been stopping here for a few days and left for their home Wednesday morning.

John Clark met with a painful accident Sunday morning which will doubtless teach him a lesson that all married men must learn sooner or later. While splitting kindling wood a stick struck Mr. Clark on the lip, knocking one tooth out and loosening another. The lesson for Mr. Clark is to turn over all such intricate household duties as splitting kindlings to Mrs. Clark. Therein lies the only safeguard to mankind. Who ever knew of a woman hurting herself while splitting wood?

W. H. Norcross refused an offer of \$35,000 for his orchard last Saturday and informed the would-be purchaser that his price now is \$50,000, or \$1,100 per acre. The orchard has 12 acres in full bearing, with some 20 acres of young trees coming on, and the crop this year will pay 10 per cent interest on \$50,000. Less than a year ago Mr. Norcross was asked to put a price on the property and when he placed it at \$25,000 some of his neighbors declared that he was crazy for asking so much. Now he is of the opinion that perhaps he was a little off for asking so little. He is not anxious for anybody to take him up at \$50,000, for he asks, “Where could I invest that amount of money in an absolutely safe proposition that would bring me in 10 per cent per annum?” And when the entire place is once bearing that rate of interest will be doubled and trebled several times.

Ashland Tidings.

The closed pouch “mail service” from the north on freight train 221 is worse than a makeshift. Wednesday last the train made an unusual record and reached here close to its schedule time (5:30 o'clock) but six letters and a package of yeast comprised all the mail for Ashland, the Portland morning papers and all other mail for this city being left behind for some reason. The “Oregonian” of Monday had a leading editorial setting forth the injustice being done the people of Southern Oregon by the present train service of the S. P., both as to passenger and mail traffic.

To an amount approximating several thousand dollars, the new clearing house certificates, issued from San Francisco, have made their appearance in Ashland. Although circulating to a limited extent about town, the major portion of them will be used in exchange for railroad pay checks. A dispatch from Roseburg states that the railway employees there strenuously objected to accepting the certificates in exchange for their checks, and have demanded cash from the company, but no such condition exists here. In common with others, the railway people are accepting the certificates with good grace and making the best of the situation until the financial skies brighten up a trifle.

Gold Hill News.

Messrs. Stickel Bros. have taken the contract of clearing out and repairing the Bowden ditch for Messrs. Nelson and McClure, and are now at work upon the same. The ditch has to be cleared out, the flame repaired and one section of the dam will have to be restored. It will require about two weeks to complete the work.

The stamp mill at the Millionaire mine is now complete, with the exception of the electrical connections, from the power lines. But no attempt will be made to operate the mill until the financial flurry is over. The mill is one of the most up-to-date in Southern Oregon. It is a Nielsen

two-stamp mill, and has a capacity of about 15 tons of ore per day.

The new machinery having arrived for the new stamp mill at the Tin Pan mine, a great hindrance to the work being done by the company is removed. The building is ready to receive the mill, and in a short time the drop of the stamps will be heard. It is the company's intention to mill the ore on the dump at once, believing that in this way they can form an opinion as to expenditures for development, that the property will justify. The company has done considerable work in the past, in an attempt to determine the value of the mine. They have something over a thousand feet of working tunnels, and contemplate the expenditure of more money for development, if conditions will warrant it. This property has been known of for a number of years; it has produced some good ore and has the earmarks of a mine. There is ore now blocked up, but whether there is enough to warrant the building of an extensive mill as is now in process of construction, or not, is open to question. It would seem to the practical mining man that the mine should be proved before an expensive mill was provided. However, if indications count for anything, the future of the mine will be a bright one. When the present plans are carried out the Tin Pan will be one of the best equipped mines in Southern Oregon. The work, both in the mine and mill, has been done in a thorough manner. The natural conditions surrounding the mine is ideal, both in the matter of location and timber. It will be necessary to pump water to the mill during a part of the year, but this will not entail a great expense.
