### Accidentally Shot.

The body of William W. Erb, one of the best known farmers and stockmen of Ashland precinct, was found November 20th cold in death in front of the door of the woodshed at the mountain ranch of Geo. W. Owens, about 25 miles east of Ashland in the Dead Indian country. The body was lying face down in a pool of blood and there was a bullet wound, showing that a ball had pierced the body below the third rib and ranged upward lodging under the arm about the shoulder. Beside the body was a 25-35 rifle. Accident is believed to account for the tragedy.

The find was made by Ben Howe, an employee of Mr. Owens, on his arrival from the valley late in the afternoon.

It seems that Mr. Erb, with his neighbor, William Lettiken, went over the mountain Tuesday morning to gather Mr. Erb's stock and bring it into his valley ranch. Mr. Erb has a mountain ranch in that vicinity, but they made their headquarters at the Owens' place which was convenient and was unoccupied at the time. According to Mr. Lettiken's statement they separated in the morning, and when he left the ranch to cover certain territory in search of stock, Mr. Erb was watering his horse and had not started on his rounds. Lettiken returned about 3:30 in the afternoon and went straightway into the house to build a fire, being numb with cold, the weather being stormy with snow falling. There was plenty of wood in the house so that he had no occasion to go to the shed for more. He had been there for about half an hour when Ben Howe came in from town and made the discovery of Mr. Erb's body.

Mr. Erb was at Lindsay's in the forenoon and was helped with a bunch of stock toward the Nell ranch, whence he apparently returned to the Owens place about noon. The gun it seems is one he had left at the Owens ranch while out there earlier in the fall.

Coroner Kellogg was notified and he instructed Undertaker Will Dodge to take charge of the remains and bring it to Ashland, the family of the deceased being anxious that his body be brought in at the earliest possible moment. G. W. Owens accompanied the undertaker and they will return probably late Thursday night, and inquest will be held here by the coroner.

Mr. Erb, who was about 50 years of age, had lived most of his life upon the farm a mile or two southeast of the city, and was well known and most highly respected. He was prominent in the Masonic fraternity and a member of Ashland Lodge No. 3, A. F. & A. M., and of Siskiyou Chapter No. 1, R. A. M.

He leaves a wife and one grown-up daughter, who is at present postmistress at Bly, Klamath county. Mr. Erb and Mr. Lettiken have long been the best of friends, and the latter can account for his friend's death only as being the result of an accident, while at the same time Mr. Erb's knowledge of and long experience with firearms rather precludes this theory. As far as is known here was absolutely no reason for Mr. Erb taking his own life.—Ashland Tidings.

### Railroad Commission Takes Action

Acting upon their own motion, Railroad Commissioners T. K. Campbell and Oswald West have filed charges of inadequate passenger service against the Southern Pacific and ordered that a hearing be had before the commission. The date will be fixed after the railroad has filed its answer.

The complaint sets forth that the commission has investigated the passenger service and finds that there are sufficient grounds to warrant a hearing to determine whether such service is unreasonable and inadequate.

The commission routes that only two passenger trains are run south from Roseburg, these being scheduled at two hours and fifty minutes apart at Roseburg and two hours and fifteen minutes apart at Ashland. The latter train makes but three stops between these two points, thereby restricting patronage at most stations to one southbound train each day.

### Editor Whips two Men.

Merrill, Nov. 23.—G. R. Carlock is nursing a painful knife cut in the arm, Ernest Woolford is bound over to the circuit court on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon and W. P. Rhoads is nursing a badly battered face as the result of an altercation in this city last night.

The affair was the culmination of bad blood which had existed between Carlock, who is principal of the Merrill school and editor of the Merrill Record, and Mr. Rhoads, one of the directors of the school, for more than a year. Several small matters aggravated what was considered a grievance between these gentlemen, all growing out of their connection with the school. Last evening the school had an entertainment in Houston's opera house and the old grievance was broached. One word led to another until the two men came to blows in the crowded hall. Carlock being much the larger of the combatants he soon had his adversary down and out. At this juncture Woolford, who had made his home with Rhoads for the past year, concluded to take a hand and proceeded to kick Carlock in the face. Carlock then turned his attention to Woolford and was getting the best of him when the latter drew a knife and made a slash at the former's heart. Carlock threw up his hand to ward off the knife thrust and received an ugly cut in the right arm almost severing the muscle and tendons from the arm above the elbow. This cut caused Carlock to completely lose the use of his arm and he might have received a good drubbing at the hands of the two men had not friends rushed in and stopped the fray. Today Carlock was fined \$10 for assault on the person of Rhoads and Woolford was bound over in the sum of \$500 to appear in the circuit court, town recorder H. H. Anderson acting as justice in the absence of any regular justice of the peace. Woolford's bonds were immediately secured from friends and he is now at liberty.

Carlock was formerly a resident of Jackson county, and taught in the Talent schools. He is an athletic chap and was a football player of no mean ability. Rhoads was also a former resident of this valley.
