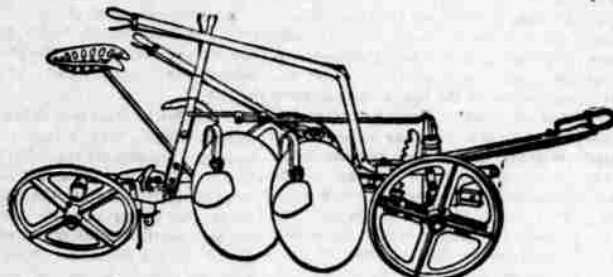

FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

Ashland Tidings.

Mr. and Mrs. Willard Satchwell who were married at Albany, Thursday, November 21st, at the home of the bride's aunt, Mrs. McErlane, have been visiting relatives in Ashland. The bride was formerly Miss Alpha Stearns of this city, and the groom is also a former Ashland boy and a brother of Kay Satchwell of this city. They leave tomorrow for their future home at McMinnville, where Mr. Satchwell is employed as a telegraph operator.

The verdict of the coroner's jury in the Engvall case was rendered Monday afternoon too late for insertion in the last issue of this paper. As heretofore stated, the jury was composed of Messrs. H. L. Whitely, C. H. Pierce, Henry White, P. Provost, C. H. Cappellar and Wm. Sebebie. They made a careful and painstaking investigation of the matter, having taken abundant time in which to go over the ground with the officers and obtain the utmost information from both officers and others. As a result of their deliberations they rendered a verdict that the deceased came to his death from a pistol shot fired by an officer while in the discharge of his duties, and recommended that the state take no further action in the matter. Under the circumstances and in the light of testimony presented, this verdict was the logical outcome of the investigation of this unfortunate affair.

At noon today the body of Mrs. Dunbar, wife of G. T. Dunbar, a Southern Pacific locomotive engineer, of this city, whose disappearance from her home at the corner of Main and 4th street, Tuesday evening, had mystified and alarmed her friends and family, was found in the icy waters of Ashland creek, about 150 yards above the electric light central station. The body was lying under a fall in the creek made by a dam at the head of the railroad company's water system, and from its appearance had been in the water for some time. The find was made by Geo. Wilber and Ed. Crawford, who were among the many searchers who had been at work since yesterday morning. It is supposed that she was laboring under an aberration of the mind, wandered from home, and while still in this state of mind drowned herself. Mrs. Dunbar came here a few months ago with her husband from Sacramento and had quite a local reputation as an artist. She was aged about 34 years.

Central Point Herald.

Almost 10,000 pounds of dressed turkeys were shipped from this station Sunday and Monday for the Thanksgiving day dinner tables of San Francisco.

E. E. Brewster has resigned his position with the Central Point Creamery and with J. D. Graham & sons and will engage in the creamery business at Williams, Josephine county, under the firm name of the Graham-Brewster Cream Company. The firm has leased a fine dairy ranch comprising several hundred acres and expect to handle from 75 to 100 cows of their own right along. The building for the plant is now under course of construction and the machinery has been ordered from the East. They expect to have the plant running within a few weeks.

The fruit shipping season has about closed and up to the present there has been shipped from this station 34 cars of fruit as follows: Pears, 14 cars; apples, 10 cars; melons, 3 cars; dried prunes, one car. This is considerably less than the shipments from this place last season, the melons alone falling short 20 cars and the apples 35 cars. The apple crop was lighter than last year and besides this the Eagle Point and Table Rock crop

heretofore shipped from here were shipped via the P. & E. road. The season was an off one for melons, the weather being rather too cool for the best results either in growing a fine quality or in marketing. The pear crop, however, was heavier than last year, the crop from Mr. F. H. Hopkins' orchard making 14 cars as against 11 cars last year.

Ashland Tidings:

Coroner Kellogg was up from Gold Hill Friday, inquiring into the facts connected with the death of Mrs. Dunbar, who was drowned in the waters of Ashland creek, but did not deem it necessary to hold an inquest.

C. L. Hammerley, the man who forged a check on the Bank of Ashland for \$15, and had it cashed by L. P. Orr, the druggist, and was apprehended at Danamuir, had a preliminary examination in Justice Eggleston's court, Friday, and was bound over to answer to the circuit court. He is now in the county jail for safe keeping.

A big brown bear which has been feeding upon the fruit in Miss Nellie Russell's apple orchard near Steinman, was caught a few days ago and will commit no more orchard depredations. The captors were John Taylor and John Heagle. Bruin measured 6½ feet from the tip of his nose to the tip of what stands for a bear's tail.

Earl, the young son of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Ragg, was drowned in Klamath river at Teters Landing, Saturday afternoon, about 3 o'clock. He had gone out in a skiff with a young man named Stonebrake to meet the Canby, and in a collision with the steamer the skiff was upset, throwing the occupants into the river. The boy was drawn underneath the barge the Canby was towing and drowned before aid could be rendered him.

The remains of young Engvall, the Scandinavian, were interred in Mountain View cemetery last Friday afternoon. Services were held at the M. E. church, conducted by Rev. Van Fossen, and quite a number were present, not out of idle curiosity, but as a mark of respect to the unfortunate youth. Undertaker Stock states that there was no intention of burying the remains in the potter's field; neither are there any further developments in the case. The young man had a cousin in Port and who was unable to be present at the funeral, and it has been ascertained that in far-away Sweden a poor mother is yet to be informed of her son's tragic fate.
