

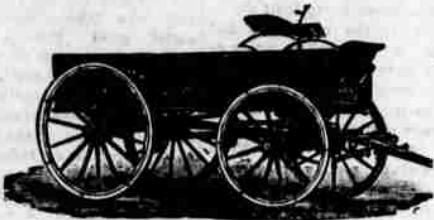

Will Try Motor Car.

Portland Oregonian: An automobile equipped as a gasoline motor car for railway use is the latest device for trial in the interurban service in Oregon. A car of this kind has been fitted up in Portland and will soon be shipped to Southern Oregon, where it will be operated between Medford and Eagle Point on the Pacific & Eastern Railway. The car will be given a trial in Portland. It is expected that it will afford a convenient and satisfactory passenger service between the two Southern Oregon towns.

The rebuilt automobile is now stored at a Portland garage. It was originally a 10-horse power touring car. The tonneau has been remodeled so that the seats run lengthwise of the machine and will accommodate 15 passengers. The wheels have been adapted to travel on rails and the rebuilt automobile is now a first-class four-cylinder gasoline motor car.

It is 12 miles from Medford to Eagle Point, and over this stretch the new car will make two round trips daily. The grade is not heavy and it is thought the motor will be much more satisfactory for passenger traffic than the combination train now run. It will probably be given a test trip to day.

FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

Gold Hill News: Miss Esther Murphy returned from Medford Sunday evening to resume her duties in the Gold Hill school after the Christmas vacation.

Mrs. Robert Cook, wife of Robert Cook, a well known pioneer of Jackson county, died at her home in Grants Pass, where she has been living for some time. Mrs. Cook has been ill for some time and death was not unexpected. She is survived by her husband and a number of children, who live around Gold Hill.

George McKinney, a brother of Rufus McKinney, of this place, and who was a resident of this locality for a number of years, met with an unusual death at Atlanta, Elmore county, Idaho, last week. He had secured a position as mail carrier, and started out upon his first trip upon snowshoes, but before he reached his destination, he was frozen to death. Several days elapsed before his body was found. He was also a nephew of Judge G. R. Hammsley, of this city.

The funeral of James Horn, who was killed at Weed, Calif., on Dec. 31st, was held in this city last Saturday afternoon. The death of this young man, who was a son of Mr. and Mrs. D. Horn, of this city, is fraught with mystery and though his friends and relatives, of this city, have made many efforts to ascertain the real facts, they have been unable to do so. He met his death from gunshot wounds in the abdomen, there being four wounds plainly discernible, and which the California authorities pronounced as being self inflicted. But to people who have known the young man from boyhood, this story seems rather incredible, as his nature was not a morbid one, and he would hardly have taken such a horrible method of self-destruction. There are many circumstances that point directly to the fact that a hand other than his own fired the shots. A large number of friends of the young man assembled at the Rock Point cemetery last Saturday afternoon to pay their last respects. A short sermon was delivered at the grave by Attorney Joseph L. Hamersley, of this city.

Ashland Tidings: Montgomery, the S. P. switchman for whom a warrant was sworn out at Ashland Monday by S. P. Officer Horgan on a charge of larceny, was apprehended at Sisson, Calif., whither he had gone from here, but refuses to return to Oregon without a requisition which is now being secured from the proper authorities. A number of articles including some valuable footwear which is believed to have been abstracted from freight in transit on the railroad was found in Montgomery's belongings, and the railroad officials propose to probe the case to the bottom, as there is continual complaint by merchants and others of the loss of goods by them in transit.

O. O. Helman, one of our leading local poultry growers, received an order for White Leghorn cockerels from Petaluma, Calif., and shipped the same by express Tuesday. The fact that fine poultry stock grown at Ashland is in demand for breeding purposes in one of the biggest poultry breeding and egg producing centers of the United States, which distinction Petaluma has, certainly is a feather in the cap of our local growers, and speaks well for this as a poultry country.

The delivery of the Shasta Grocery, driven by Jesse Scribner, met with a disaster yesterday morning, on Liberty street, near the Boulevard junction. A bolt in the pole fastening strung away, frightened the team and it ran into a pole, the driver being thrown out and run over by the

wheels of the wagon, escaping, however, with slight injuries. One of the horses, a valuable animal, turned a somersault and struck upon its neck which was broken in the fall, resulting in instant death.

Ashland Tidings:

The Jackson County Ministerial Association held its regular quarterly meeting in Ashland today. The gathering was held at the Congregational Church and ministers were in attendance from different points in the county.

The ordinance adopted by Ashland's new council last week to enforce prohibition of the liquor traffic in this city for the year 1908, in accordance with the edict of the voters at the December polls, is more drastic than any heretofore drawn and adopted in this city during previous regimes. In addition to the prohibition of saloons at tipping houses, the storage of liquors in stores or buildings is prohibited, this feature being particularly directed against the possible attempted operation of "blind pigs" after the new order of things goes into effect at midnight next Wednesday. Drug stores selling intoxicants upon physicians' prescriptions are required to keep a book to register such prescriptions, with the names to whom issued, etc.

LAFACADIO HEARN.
