Mrs. Ed Andrews, who has sung the soprano solos in "The Creation," in the past sang "The Marvelous Work" with the chorus with a brilliancy and abandon that elicited high praise. Mr. Gore, having studied oratorio conducting under the celebrated and venerable George F. Root, is well qualified to secure excellent results with chorus. Now with this array of talent coupled with the talent of the other choruses, and with those not connected with religious organizations one can readily see the kind of a choral union which might be organized. Will not our Medford leaders in chorus work take the matter up?

HUNGRY MEN SEEK WORK

St. Louis, January 15.—Hungry and out of work, 800 thinny old men marched through the snow and cold to the city hall yesterday, seeking Mayor Wells, in order to make application for his assistance in securing employment.

James Eads How, a philanthropist and son of a prominent family, who proudly styles himself a "hobo" led the procession, and the Welfare Association, of which he is the founder and benefactor, formed the nucleus of the army.

While the hungry hoide lined up in the city hall grounds, a committee representing the "army" waited on Mayor Wells. Mayor Wells assured the men that he would do all in his power to give them employment. "I cannot give you charity work," said Mayor Wells, "under present conditions, the only thing I can do is to divide the work now being done for the city and give part of it to you. This met with the approval of the committee, and after its departure, Mayor Wells instructed Street Commissioner Travilla to prepare an ordinance calling for an appropriation of \$10,000 for street work.
