

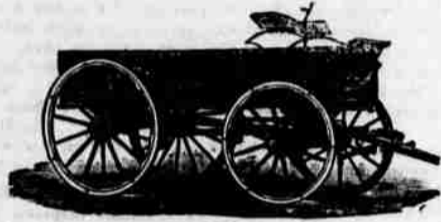

Asbland Tidings:

The peace and quietude that ordinarily prevails about the main building of the State Normal school has been disturbed two nights the past week by a supposed burglar. Sunday night one of the young lady students heard strange noise in the furnace room and when she bravely investigated the situation routed out a prowler who made his escape. It was believed that the intruder was some hobo who sought the furnace room as a comfortable lodging place for the night, but Tuesday night someone cut a screen in an effort to effect an entrance into the apartments of Prof. Joy and wife who are located in rooms adjoining the furnace room on the basement floor of the building.

Freight train No. 221 and its closed pouch mail service got held up somewhere along the line yesterday and was passed by train No. 15 due some six hours later. However, mail was not exchanged and it was afternoon before the closed pouch mail arrived. Today the performance was repeated and the mail carried by the freight train did not reach here until afternoon, though due at 5:30 a. m. This may be a "satisfactory" service at some points in Southern Oregon, but not at Asbland. The Sunday morning papers reached Rogue River valley points at 2 o'clock this afternoon, less than two days after publication.

A Salem report in yesterday's Portland Telegram says: The railroad commission made order today discontinuing the investigations of the complaint against the service of Southern Pacific passenger trains Nos. 11 and 12, operating between Roseburg and Portland, with a view to ordering an extension of the train service farther south to Asbland. This action is taken because the people south of Roseburg, upon whose petition the complaint was made and for whom hearing was had at Asbland several weeks ago, failed to produce sufficient evidence in the opinion of the commission, to warrant an extension of the train service farther south than Roseburg. This order practically disposes of the case altogether.

Gold Hill News: Gradually one by one, the mines that have lain idle so long, either on account of litigation or other reasons, in this district, are being placed in shape for operations. The latest one to resume operations is the Maybelle, in the Blackwell district. On account of litigation the Maybelle has been idle for a long time and by a decision of the court the property was sold at receiver's sale and the mill and other buildings were torn down and moved away. W. E. Pearson, of Portland, has been in Gold Hill for the past two week making preparations to do some extensive development work upon the mine. He has a crew of men now at work and expects to be milling ore by the first of February. The ore will be hauled to the Nelson & McClure mill for treatment. The Maybelle has always been considered one of the best properties in this district and the commencing of development work upon it is but another proof of the prosperous future that is in store for Gold Hill and her mines. Mr. Pearson left for Portland Tuesday evening, where he will remain for a few days upon business.

The repairs for the Nelson-McClure stamp mill, formerly the Bowden, has arrived and are now being installed. The mill will soon be ready for operations. The new owners have spared no expense in fitting up this mill and when completed will be one of the best in the district.

Central Point Herald: Isaac Constant Magruder, son of Mrs. Margery Magruder, died at the family home Saturday evening, January 11, 1908, of pneumonia, aged 27 years and 17 days. Deceased was a native son of Central Point, having been born and spent practically his entire life in this town. Never of a robust constitution he easily succumbed to the attack of disease when it came, and passed away as above stated. His widowed mother, three brothers and three sisters, are left to mourn his loss. The funeral service was held at the residence Monday afternoon, Rev. T. M. Jones officiating. Interment was made in the Central Point cemetery.
