Klamath County News.

Klamath Falls Express:
 The 1907 tax roll will be turned over to the sheriff Monday. The total taxes to be collected this year foot up just \$143,542.16 against \$104,108.85 for last year. The city taxes to be collected amount to \$9,038.72.
 Among those taking the teachers' examinations this week are Madama. Kirkendall, Edith Newton, C. E. Lambert, Misses Rachel Applegate, Sarah Griffith, Ruby Nichols, Lulu Wilkerson, Nellie Wood, Messrs. John Irwin, Trus DeLap, Tiedale Griffith, C. E. Mulkey—Clapp for county papers, and Byron Hall and the Misses Edna Callahan and Anna Conn for state papers.
 So confident of success are those in charge of the examination of the outlet of Tule lake that a company has been formed making a proposition to the reclamation officials that the government furnish the necessary tools and the company agree to work one year. At the expiration of that time, should they succeed in draining the lake sufficiently to reclaim any great amount of land the government to reward them, about 20 in number, with 100 acres each of the land reclaimed. Should they fail their time and labor is to be free. Whether the proposition will be accepted is to be seen.
Klamath Falls Republicans:
 Capt. Ivan D. Applegate arrived in the city Thursday from his home in Oakland, Calif., Mr. Applegate will remain here a short time looking after his sheep interests.
 R. K. Smith attorney for the Klamath Water Users Association, filed three suits Thursday for the collection of assessments from members of the association. The suits were brought against J. M. Lipton, Mrs. Frances Lee and Louis Fannestiel. This is the first attempt made through the courts to force the payment of delinquent assessments, but it is stated that the papers in several other suits are being prepared. The action is in accordance with the decision of the directors at their recent meeting, to enforce the collection of all assessments. Those who have showed a disposition to pay up will be given sufficient time to do so, but in cases where all notices of assessment have been entirely ignored or where parties for any reason have absolutely refused to make payment, suit will be brought at once. It is understood that Mr. Ady will allow a suit to be brought against him in order to give him an opportunity to bring charges against some of the transactions of the Reclamation Service. This is the only way he can get the matter into court. He has paid the assessment on part of his holdings, but it is believed to be his intention to refuse to do so on the balance.
 The mail service for this city has at last reached the limit. For the past year kaleidoscopic changes have been the order of the day, and no man knew from one day to the next when he would be able to receive and send out mail. Each change seemed to be for the worst, but it remained for the government to make the final dash into the field of error and leave this section where it's mail is in a plight far worse than ever before. Monday morning a new schedule was inaugurated. When the Klamath Lake railroad changed its schedule so that its trains left Pockegama in the evening at 6 o'clock, the mail contractors asked that their schedule be changed so they might leave here at 7 o'clock in the morning. After sufficient red tape had been unwound the order came from Washington directing that the mail leave there at 10 o'clock in the morning allowing a ten hour schedule to reach Pockegama. It was assumed that a change had been made in the departure of the train from Pockegama, but not so, the hour of leaving that station being 6 o'clock, eight hours after the mail leaves this city. This did not allow of sufficient time for the stage to reach Pockegama and the result is that the mail remained here until Tuesday evening—24 hours after it should have left that point.
