# FROM COUNTY EXCHANGES

**Ashland Tidings:**  
 Machinery from the Central Point Creamery is being hauled to Ashland, having been purchased by D. Peroni of the Ashland Creamery. The Central Point plant ceased operations recently having been unable to secure a sufficient supply of milk to make it profitable.

**Improved Mail Service.**  
 Salem—There is a strong probability that the new train schedule of the Oregon Electric will result in improved mail service for Salem. It will carry mail each day.

**New Engineer on Rainier Project.**  
 Rainier—The Water Commissioners have hired Orrin Backus, a civil engineer of Portland, to complete the work left unfinished by Engineer Chase, who received a paralytic stroke a few weeks ago.

**Julius Wallande Brutally Murdered.**  
 Silver Lake—That Julius Wallande, who disappeared December 27, was brutally murdered, is indicated by the nature of wounds in his body, which was found Friday in the creek near Silver Lake. Wallande's skull was fractured and his head had been pounded.

**Whirled Around Revolving Shaft.**  
 Coquille—George Goodrich, who works in a sawmill at this place met with a bad accident last week. In stepping over an iron shaft his clothes were caught, and he was whirled around and bruised. Four ribs were broken on the left side and his head was badly hurt.

**Chamberlain to Run for the Senate.**  
 Salem—Governor Chamberlain has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for United States Senator in the primary election next month. The announcement was issued at Corvallis, while the Governor was en route to Yaquina, where he will investigate the oyster beds maintained by the State at that point.

**Fulton Amends Aldrich Measure.**  
 Senator Fulton has introduced an amendment to the Aldrich currency bill to make it unlawful for any National Banking Association to loan or advance money to its president or its directors and officials, and providing that the accepting of such loan will subject the guilty party to a fine of \$5,000 or imprisonment for one year or more.

**Becomes Suddenly Rich.**  
 Clatskanie—Fred D. Murphy, a young unmarried man who has followed the occupation of a logger around this place for the past six years, has received notice from his old home at Cork, Ireland, that by the death of a rich maiden aunt in Dublin he has fallen heir to an estate of \$15,000 in money and a mansion valued at \$75,000 in that city.

**No Dipping Needed in Spring of 1908.**  
 Pendleton—With 60,000 infected sheep in the county two years ago, effective dipping has reduced that number until today the Sheep Commission finds there is not a scabby sheep in the county. The entire State is also practically free from scab and the commission has issued a proclamation declaring dipping for the spring of 1908 unnecessary.

**Umatilla River Swollen.**  
 Pendleton—Warm rains followed by a chinook wind and then more rain is taking the snow off the mountains at a rapid rate. The Umatilla river is higher than it has been any time this year, and though the water is rising rapidly, it is still far from dangerous. The rains are being hailed with delight by the farmers, as the season has been exceptionally dry.

**Umatilla Dry to Try It Again.**  
 Pendleton—Local opinion will be an issue in the June election in Umatilla county. Delegates of local option workers from every precinct in the county met Friday and formulated a plan of campaign. The county local option was defeated four years ago by 300 votes, but temperance people believe there has been great change in sentiment and that the movement will now carry.

**Sheepmen Change Plea.**  
 Pendleton—Three of the Washington sheepmen accused of bringing their flocks into this state last spring without giving due notice to the state or county sheep inspector, have changed their plea of not guilty to guilty, and were given the minimum fine of \$100 each and costs. One of the remaining cases will be tried as a test case.

**Debate New Timber Cruise.**  
 Hillsboro—The County Court will have several pieces of timber land in the north end of the county recaptured for timber estimates, as there is a great deal of dissatisfaction over the cruise of Nease, hired last spring by the county to do the work. Respectable citizens make affidavits that there are tracts which have no timber in which Nease returned large estimates.

**The heaviest payment of taxes ever made by a single taxpayer in Benton county was that of the Southern Pacific railroad last week. The total was \$18,237, and was made in gold currency.**

With only about two weeks remaining in which to file petitions for nominations, not a single candidate for the Legislature has yet formally declared his intention of running in Linn county.
