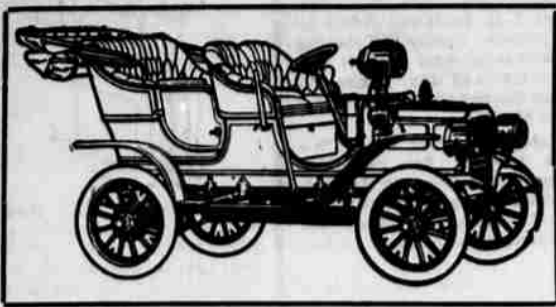

LONE HIGHWAYMAN RIFLES MAIL CAR

DARING ROBBER ASSUMES ROLE OF INSPECTOR ON THE GREAT NORTHERN MAIL TRAIN.

Rides Over 100 Miles to Spokane, Going Through Registered Mail at His Leisure.

Spokane, Wash., March 16.—Assuming all the airs and authority of a veteran postoffice inspector, a daring highwayman boarded the Great Northern westbound Oriental Limited train just as it pulled out of Bonner's Ferry, Idaho, early Sunday morning, and holding the two mail clerks at bay at the point of a revolver, locked one of them in a clothes closet and tied the other to a chair with ropes, after which he rode a distance of 109 miles into Spokane, spending three hours and 40 minutes rifling registered mail, loading and unloading mail sacks along the route and puffing complacently at a cigar the while.

The lone robber dropped off the train at a railroad crossing inside the city limits, carrying with him it is believed, much valuable plunder in a satchel. Just how much he obtained is not definitely known. Mail Clerk Benjamin Stumpf and John W. Nystuen, who were held at the mercy of the robber, tell a remarkable story of their experience. Locked in the small closet, hardly two feet square, the latter almost fainted from suffocation after the train had pulled into Sand Point, 34 miles west of Bonner's Ferry, and rapping on the door pleaded with the robber to allow him some fresh air. The bandit responded willingly and leaving the door ajar about an inch, secured it with a piece of rope. Twice later on the way into Spokane the robber ceased his work of rifling the mail sacks to go to the door of the closet to inquire as to how Nystuen was feeling.

When Stumpf remonstrated with his captor that the cords which bound him were cutting his wrists, the gentle robber generously loosened the fetters and made every effort to make things as comfortable as possible for his victims.

While ripping open the registered sacks the pseudo-inspector cut one of his fingers and many of the pieces of mail were blood-stained. Blood-hounds were put on the trail of the robber, taking the scent from one of the bloody packages, and followed a trail several blocks through the residence district to a carline, where the scent was lost. It is believed that the highwayman boarded a car and rode downtown.

When the train reached Spokane, John Nystuen, one of the postal clerks, was found locked in the clothes closet, where the robber had put him, while Benjamin Stumpf, the other clerk, was helpless under the table with a jumper drawn over his head and his arms tightly bound. It was then that the story of the robbery was first learned.

EVANS PRAISED BY SECRETARY.

Metcalf Sends Congratulations to Commander of Battleship Fleet. Washington—Secretary of the Navy Metcalf has wired the following telegram of congratulations to Rear Admiral Evans and his men:

"The navy department congratulates you and your officers and men of the Atlantic fleet upon your arrival at Magdalena Bay in exact accordance with the itinerary and also upon the efficiency of the ships at the time of their arrival."

Secretary Metcalf has announced that the department has decided to send the battleship fleet around the world, thus undertaking the greatest feat in naval history.

The start westward will be made from San Francisco July 6. This would appear to indicate that the ships will not go to Puget Sound.

John R. Walsh Convicted. Chicago—John R. Walsh, former president of the Chicago National Bank of this city, who was convicted of illegal use of the funds of the institution, has been denied a new trial by Judge Anderson in the United States District Court and sentenced to serve five years in the Federal Penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth.

2,500 Men Killed by Troops. San Francisco—Machine guns operated by the Government forces of Chile in a great conflict with strikers at the nitrate beds and in the city of Iquique, laid 2,500 men low, most of these being killed, according to advices received here by the Norwegian steamer Christian Bora, arriving disoast from Chile.

IDAHO LAND FRAUD CASES.

Charges of Ruick's Misconduct Are Sustained by Federal Court. Boise—United States District Judge Whitson, of Spokane, who last fall sat in place of District Judge Detrich in the proceedings in connection with the indictments against John L. Wells, Frank Martin, and others, returned by the Federal grand jury here, has rendered a decision sustaining the second of two pleas in abatement filed and argued before him by the defendants. This is the plea in which District Attorney Ruick was charged with misconduct before the grand jury that returned the indictments.

The other pleas filed by specific defendants, one claiming that the statute of limitations barred prosecution and the other that immunity was procured because of testimony given by defendants before the grand jury, are overruled. The effect of the ruling is to throw all of the cases resulting from the grand jury investigation of March, 1907, relative to alleged timber frauds, out of court.

The defendants were John L. Wells, Patrick Downs, John Kinkaid, Louis M. Pritchard, William Sweet, Albert E. Palmer, Horace S. Rand, Frank Martin, James T. Barber and Sumner G. Moon. Senator Borah was indicted with these, but stood trial and was acquitted.

UNION MEN STRIKE.

Denver & Rio Grande Shopmen Quit Work.

Denver, Col., March 17.—Fifteen hundred men working in the Burnham shops and others of the Denver & Rio Grande went on strike yesterday in response to an order from W. G. McQueeney, representing the machinists' national organization. Manager A. C. Ridgeway, of the railroad, had refused to make any concessions in a conference.

"The strike will ultimately spread to every road in the Gould system and affects roads all over the United States," said Mr. McQueeney. "There is every indication that the struggle will be a long one and fought hard on both sides."

The strike is the result of an order posted by the road a month ago abrogating all contracts with the unions. Since that time numerous conferences have been held by the men and the company, but it was impossible to reach an agreement.

Miners in Riot at Fairbanks. Fairbanks, Alaska, March 17.—Members of the Western Federation of Miners engaged in a riot yesterday. They molested and threatened men going out on the train to the creek to work and prevented railroad men loading baggage on the train. The Deputy Marshal was hurriedly called and found it necessary to club the rioters in maintenance of the law.

Public Printer Resigns.

Washington, March 17.—Public Printer Charles S. Stillings yesterday tendered his resignation to the President, and it has been accepted. Mr. Stillings' successor has not yet been named. Mr. Stillings declined today to discuss the matter for publication.

China Frees the Tatsu Maru.

Hongkong, March 17.—The Japanese steamer Tatsu Maru, which was seized by the Chinese customs authorities at Macao for carrying arms and ammunition alleged to be intended for the use of Chinese revolutionaries, was released today.

HAPPENINGS AT THE NATION'S CAPITAL

LILLEY WINS BOAT FIGHT—NEGROES TO BE RESTORED TO PLACE IN ARMY.

Lands of the Northwest to Be Surveyed—Millions for Coast Defense—Guard Child's Food.

The opinion prevails generally that Representative Lilley of Connecticut has already produced sufficient evidence to warrant a thorough probing of his charges that the Electric Boat Company of New Jersey used improper means to influence legislation in its favor.

The congressional committee, which was appointed by the speaker to investigate the Lilley charges, promised the latter that if he showed that there were good grounds for his accusations, the committee would call witnesses.

According to Lilley's present plans he will ask that Isaac L. Rice, president of the coast concern; Ellihu Frost, its vice-president, and Lawrence Spear of New York be summoned.

Spear, according to the charges made by Representative Hobson, is the man who offered him a place on the naval affairs committee if he "stood right" on the question of submarines.

President Roosevelt, in a special message to the Senate, calls attention to the fact that the Senate committee has found that the charges of participation in the Brownsville riot, which caused him to dismiss Companies B, C and D of the Twenty-fifth Infantry, were substantiated, and asks the Senate to pass a special law extending for one year the time within which those who establish their innocence may be reinstated. Such a bill will be introduced.

Senator Heyburn has secured the passage through the Senate of his bill providing for the survey of all public land, reserved and unreserved, in Idaho, Oregon, Montana and California. Under the present system, the Government only surveys land upon request of actual settlers. Mr. Heyburn says this system tends to retard development, and also retards surveys, as settlers don't like to go on unsurveyed land.

He will confer with the Oregon, Montana and California Senators and have an amendment made to the sundry civil bill appropriating sufficient money to begin these surveys. He wants \$100,000 for Idaho.

The fortifications appropriation bill, which will soon be reported to the House, will make adequate provision for increasing the efficiency of the coast defenses along the Pacific Coast. It is stated that the entire appropriation, save what is necessary for maintenance of defenses on the Atlantic coast, will be devoted to the enlargement and improvement of the Pacific Coast and insular defenses, several million dollars in all. It is the intention of Congress to make the fortifications on the Pacific Coast in every way equal to the defenses of the harbors on the Atlantic.

An urgent plea for pure food in the household was made by Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, Chief of the Bureau of Chemistry of the Department of Agriculture in an address before the International Congress of the Welfare of the Child, which is being held under the auspices of the National Mothers' Congress.

Dr. Wiley emphasized the importance of the mothers of the country being eternally vigilant as to the source of food products that come into their homes, to see that they are fresh, uncontaminated, palatable and wholesome. Dr. Wiley said that the best way of executing the pure food law is in the household.

After deliberating 18 hours the jury in the criminal action against Edward Perdu, charged with larceny at Albany failed to agree and were discharged.

Safe crackers blew open a safe in Crane Brothers' mercantile store at Piolet Rock and escaped with \$109, some checks and a few articles from the stock in the store.

The jury in the case of M. J. Doyle vs. the Southern Pacific Company for \$100,000 damages for the loss of both legs, returned a verdict at Eugene for the plaintiff for \$45,000.
