Klamath County News.

Klamath Falls Republican:

H. S. Grigsby went to Dorris Saturday. His opponents in the race for the Republican nomination for sheriff say that he went into northern California for the purpose of urging voters into Klamath county for the primary election.

Mail Route Inspector Vail, arrived here Friday and spent Saturday going over records in the local post-office. He left Monday morning to make a thorough investigation of the proposed mail route via Weed. The establishment of this route will depend largely on Mr. Vail's report and judging from the way he has expressed himself, he is not strongly in favor of the new route until the one via Pokegama shall be discontinued.

The saw mill belonging to the Long Lake Lumber Company, located about one half mile from Keno, was burned to the ground at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning. Some of the men who were employed there visited the mill about 10 o'clock Tuesday evening, on their return from church. At that hour nothing unusual was in evidence and no sign of fire visible. When the fire was discovered the building was enveloped in flames and was soon burned to the ground. The origin of the fire is a mystery. There was no insurance.

Plans are now on foot, which if carried out, will add millions to the value of land in the Wood River country and especially along the river and marsh. It will in reality mean the development of the rich lands in the northern part of the county. It is reported that Mr. Weed, whose land extends a distance of about six miles along the river, will engage Frank Adams dredger to throw up a dyke along the west side of the river bordering on his property, to prevent it from overflowing. If the Adams dredger is brought to Wood River, it is stated that there will be work there for it for the next two years. All the big swamp land owners are anxious to use it to reclaim their overflooded land, and undoubtedly the people in the vicinity of Fort Klamath will raise enough money to have the river straightened out and opened to navigation. If the west side of the river is banked, it will force the Indian Department to do the same with the east side along the reservation lands. If this is done over 100,000 acres will be reclaimed and become valuable land.

Klamath Falls Express:
The Klamath Water Users Association board met yesterday afternoon but there was little doing other than routine business. The board discussed the advisability of postponing the election of officers from April 4, the regular date, to some time in June but no definite action was taken.

The "Dorris Booster," published by W. H. Bohannon, at Dorris, Siskiyou county, Calif., makes its initial appearance today. The "Booster" appears as a seven-column, four-page paper and besides being brim full of live Dorris and Northern Siskiyou county news it starts off with a whoop to live up to its name as a "Dorris Booster." Editor Bohannon takes hold like a veteran newspaper man and the Morning Express extends to him the glad hand of fellowship and bespeaks for him and the "Booster" great things in the coming metropolis of Northern Siskiyou.

Sam Walker and Otto Heidrich left yesterday morning for Rawhide, Nevada, the great new mining camp, to look over the ground with a view to locating there.

A fire alarm from the residence of Mr. Balnter, near the high school at 6:30 Thursday was promptly responded to by the hose company, but the fire had been extinguished by some of the men of the neighborhood by the time the boys had dragged the heavy cart up the hill. The fire originated in the kitchen by the wall paper near the cook stove becoming overheated. A few buckets of water were sufficient to subdue the flames. No damage was done to the building or contents.

The Washington sheepmen who brought their flocks into Oregon from Washington last season without complying with the Oregon laws concerning inspection and dipping, were fined \$100 in the Circuit Court at Pendleton last week.

STORM KING CREATES HAVOC IN NORTHWEST

WORST STORM OF THE WINTER
RAGED DURING FRIDAY
SATURDAY AND SUNDAY

Landslides, Block Trains, Rivers Become Raging Torrents, and Towns Are Plunged into Darkness

Portland, Ore., March 17.—The storm has spent its force, and while no rain fell on Monday, the streams throughout the Columbia River valley are still high and are gradually receding. The worst is now passed and no further damage is looked for other than the reports of flooded districts which appear below.

Portland, Ore., March 16.—While no serious property damage has been reported, the heavy storm of wind and rain that has been raging without let-up since Friday is by far the worst of the past year. The storm is general throughout this entire region.

Passenger traffic on the O. R. & N. has been completely tied up as the result of an enormous landslide at Wyech.

Hood River people sat in darkness Sunday night. Churches, hotels, and such homes as were provided were illuminated by kerosene lamps, lanterns and ancient tallow dips. The light and power plant was put out of business early in the storm, and no trains went east or west during Sunday.

The volume of water running down Hood river is greater than at any time since its power was harnessed.

Pendleton is also in a bad. It is not in a very serious way, for the Umatilla river raged like a torrent all day Sunday and is rising at the rate of four inches an hour, threatening the town with a flood as serious as that which devastated it two years ago. The new levees are holding well but unless the storm decreases the dikes will be dangerously weakened.

Dispatches from Eastern Washington and Idaho points indicate that much havoc is likely in that section before the worst has passed.

Willamette Valley points are apt to suffer considerably. The rainfall has been unusually heavy throughout the valley and all tributaries to the Willamette are leaping up their banks steadily.

A number of log booms in the Cowlitz river have been ripped loose from their moorings and are rushing down the river. Much valuable timber has already been carried away, but further than that no damage has been done.

Lewistown, Idaho, March 16.—What promises to be the worst flood in years is now rising in the Clearwater tributaries and already Lewistown is cut off from rail communication with the outside world. Hundreds of feet of track are washed out, several bridges are out of line and in danger of being swept away, and two heavy slides have covered the track along Potlatch creek, between Arrow Junction and Troy.

Snake River is slowly rising, but the great flood comes from the Clearwater, which is muddy as the Missouri at flood time.

Kendrick is cut off from all communication with the outside world, as the telephone wires are all silent, but Julietta, three miles distant, is in touch with the situation.

Lapwal creek, generally called Lazy brooklet, is on the rampage, and Culesac is threatened with floods. This morning the mill flume broke in several places and torrents of water flowed down through the streets. The lower end of town is now six inches under water.

Elms, Wash., March 16.—Heavy, continuous rain has prevailed in the Chehalis valley for several days past. The Chehalis river is still rising and the highest water in many years is now expected and being prepared for.

Not a log will be left in any of the creeks and rivers, every driving stream will be swept clean, so great is the flood.

Walla Walla, Wash., March 16.—Not for years has this city faced so serious a situation as it does from the floods which have come down from the Blue Mountains and have made Mill creek a roaring torrent. The Fourth street bridge has been washed out; part of the Third street bridge has been blasted out; the gas works have been flooded and are closed down; Main street, from above Sixth street to the O. R. & N. passenger depot is under water. In the business district the water is rapidly filling basements.
