Klamath Falls Express:

ATLANTIC FLEET BREAKS UP.

Battleships Start North Bound for Puget Sound.

San Francisco, May 18.—The Atlantic fleet of battleships, after 12 days of naval pageantry and merry-making in San Francisco, sailed today for Puget Sound. One-half of the ships will dock at Bremerton navy-yard while in the north, and the others will return here for repairs and painting beneath the water-line.

Orders call for the reassembling of the fleet in San Francisco harbor not later than July 3. On July 7 the fleet will sail for Honolulu, and after a week's stay there will go direct to Auckland.

TAFT CERTAIN TO HAVE A MAJORITY

ALL DELEGATES ELECTED AND TOTALS MADE—OPPOSITION TO WANE.

Fairbanks Is Only Favorite Son Who Has Own State Solid—Knox Is Second in Race.

Washington, D. C., May 16.—William H. Taft will be the choice of the Republican National Convention for the Presidency. His nomination is assured on the first ballot. It is within reason that all opposition will fade away before the balloting begins at the Coliseum in Chicago, and that the unanimous nomination of the Secretary of War immediately will follow.

The last delegates to the convention were elected this afternoon. The list of men who will represent the 46 states and the seven territories, whose delegates will gather in Chicago just one month from today, furnishes the basis for the forecast which is presented herewith. Careful compilation, honest allowance for conflicting claims, sifting and harmonizing of statements which have issued from the headquarters of all of the candidates for the chief place on the National ticket produce these results.

Their figures indicate confidence in the claim that practically two-thirds of the delegates will take their seats in the Chicago convention prepared to vote for the Ohio man. The compilation of the states and territories, as indicated above, shows that nothing but a dispensation of Providence will prevent the nomination of Mr. Taft on the first ballot.

Seize American Fishing Steamer.

Vancouver, B. C., May 17.—The American halibut fishing steamer Francis Cutting, seized last Tuesday on the northern end of Vancouver Island by the Canadian fisheries cruiser Kestrel, while she was fishing inside the three-mile limit, was today formally turned over by Commander Newcombe to the custody of Collector of Customs Bowell. Acting on instructions from Ottawa, Commander Newcombe today disposed of the 47,000 pounds of halibut found on the Francis Cutting when she was seized.

Gravestly Cause of Snield.

Oakland, Cal.—Tired of life, although he was only 14 years old, Harold Hardy, a pupil of the Grant school, committed suicide by drinking carbolic acid while lying on the banks of Cemetery creek. It is supposed that the lad had become despondent over the troubles of his father and mother, who have been divorced and remarried. Too persistent reading and study, including eye trouble and headache, is also assigned as a cause.

Congress Breaks Its Record.

Washington.—The present session of congress, to end this week, is a record breaker. The appropriations of this session so far authorized exceed those of the first session of the 59th congress by more than \$300,000,000. The total appropriations made up to this time aggregate approximately \$554,844,807. This amount will be increased by the general deficiency and omnibus public buildings bills and such other measures as may go through before adjournment.

Million-Dollar Fire Loss at Omaha.

South Omaha, May 17.—The Omaha Packing Company's plant here was destroyed by fire early this morning and a loss of \$1,250,000 inflicted. The flames spread to the plant of the Cudahy Packing Co. and a five-story building belonging to this concern, with a large amount of meat, was also destroyed, the loss being probably \$200,000. Five firemen were buried under a falling wall, but were rescued. All were seriously injured.

Cherries Sell at High Price.

Sacramento, Cal., May 18.—The California Fruit Distributors' organization received word of the sale of the fourth carload of cherries to leave California this season in Chicago last week. The sale was by auction and the car brought \$4325, or an average of 21 cents a pound, wholesale, for the fruit.

Oregon Teacher to Study Abroad.

Ashland, Or., May 19.—Miss Ida M. Chase, a teacher in the State Normal School here, has been notified of her nomination by the State Board of Normal Regents to take part in the American teachers' visit to European schools, and has been granted a year's leave of absence for that purpose. She will sail from Quebec in July, and remain abroad until September, 1920.

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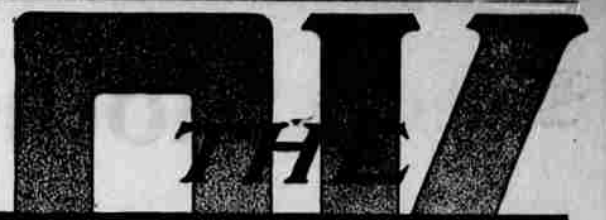
