GRANARIES OF WORLD EMPTY.

Outlook for Bumper Harvest—From Tilled Earth Comes Real Wealth.

(North American.)

There is one thing that Wall street and the trusts cannot control. That is the bounty of God. Of all the signs of returning prosperity, the bulletin of the crop-reporting board of the department of agriculture is the happiest portent.

Spring wheat shows a prospect better than the average for ten years past. The yield of winter wheat bids fair to be larger than any crop since that of 1901. Bad early prospects for corn have changed, so that now the outlook is for a bumper harvest. And the ratio of increase holds good with oats, rye and barley. It will be a fat year.

The special providence that seems to watch over this nation, pouring out upon us new stores of nature's wealth each season, is kinder this year than ever. There have been times, as in 1894, when the coming of great crops meant distress to the farmer; when the storehouses of the whole world were glutted with a surplus from the preceding year, and large harvests in all nations forced prices down to or below the cost of production.

There have been other years when scant crops brought big prices, so that consumers everywhere suffered. This year the granaries of the world are empty. The outlook for European harvests are not flattering. There will be a world demand that will keep prices at a profitable level for the 10,000,000 farmers of America. Yet the yield will be so bountiful that the consumer will not be penalized by exorbitant prices or a dearth of supply.

The gold that will glow over our ripened fields will be worth all and more of that we prayed for during last fall's panic. Ore digged from the mine leaves only a barren emptiness. All forms of trade make no real increase. Even manufacture means only a change in form and development of a value already existing. From the tilled earth comes the real new wealth, each year's bounty bearing promise of a new gift in the year after.

Once more the lesson is borne in upon us that our greatness comes out of the ground.

SCOTT FOR OREGON.

PORTLAND, June 22.—John M. Scott, assistant general passenger agent of the Harriman lines, returned yesterday from an extended visit in Chicago, where he attended sessions of the Transcontinental Passenger association. The weather in the middle west is a month behind the season, he said, and the crops are in a doubtful condition in the corn belt.

"It is expected that the weather will change and the heat will bring corn and other crops forward rapidly," he said. "There has been too much rain in some of the states, particularly in Nebraska. The same conditions exist in Iowa and Kansas. There has been cold, wet, unseasonable weather in many sections. At the same time the farmers are not feeling blue, and it is expected that things will come out all right. The railroads are doing a heavy passenger business both east and west. There is a very heavy passenger movement over the O. R. & N. and Union Pacific lines at the present time, owing to floods along the northern lines. All our trains are carrying extra sleeping cars.

"While Chicago is not a place that suits a man who has resided on the Pacific coast, it is nevertheless a wonderful city, and is growing steadily. The feeling in the east is extremely favorable toward the west. Every body seems to be well posted on Oregon and its political events. All intelligent men with whom I talked referred, with a surprising familiarity, to affairs in this state."

Mr. Scott returns to the coast with increased admiration and respect for the land of his adoption. Although he has a very large circle of friends in Chicago territory, he was glad to get back to Oregon, and is enthusiastic over the favorable conditions existing here for crops, business and immigration.

STATEHOOD.

Among the minor planks in the splendid platform adopted by the Republican convention is that which pledges the party to the "immediate admission of New Mexico and Arizona as separate states." That plank, while not expressing one of the distinctive "Roosevelt policies," is worthy of special notice for two great reasons—first, because it is right, and second, because it shows that the national Republican convention puts patriotism above partisanship. The plank was not inserted for the purpose of getting the votes of the two territories, for they have no vote in national elections. Their admission as states is morally certain to mean the admission of four new Democratic senators in congress, which it is not in human nature for Republicans to approve. But because those territories are now ripe for statehood; because their traditions and institutions are so diverse that they ought not to and would not accept statehood as one state; but because it would be unjust and tyrannical to longer condemn their inhabitants to political tutelage, a patriotic Republican convention pledges the party to their speedy admission to the Union, regardless of its effect on the Republican power in congress.

Nothing New Has Developed Regarding Eugene.

SALEM, Or., June 20.—No special developments were uncovered in the attempt to blow up the house occupied by the traveling Mormon elders on Washington street Wednesday night. It is clearly evident that there was no attempt to destroy life, as in the morning after daylight the following notice was found by the officers stuck up on a stick near the premises:

"This is a warning to your tribe. You have tormented the public enough. Move, or the next shot will do more. We mean of the MORMAN TRIBE."

The police have a pretty good idea who did the work, but have no direct evidence and hence cannot make an arrest on suspicion.

It is quite evident that there was some other motive for the act than simply prejudice against the Mormon religion, and there are a number of stories afloat which have not been as yet verified.

LUMBERMEN HAVE NEW CODE

Seventeen New Clauses Adopted at Meeting.

(Associated Press Dispatch.)

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., June 20.—Representatives of the retail and wholesale lumbermen today adopted a new code of ethics consisting of 17 clauses, governing the question of orders, claims for damages or failure to deliver, terms of sale and the matter of arbitration of difficulties between buyer and seller; also formed a new association to be known as the "Lumber Trade Congress." The temporary officers elected are:

GUTHRIE, Okla. June 19.—Oklahoma's flag, which will be broken from the flagstaff over Independence hall at Philadelphia on July Fourth, is now completed. Ninety-two women, chosen from different parts of the new state, sewed onto the new starry banner one star each, 46 on each side. Colonel T. M. Seward, of the Oklahoma flag committee, will deliver the principal address at the ceremonies at Philadelphia on Independence day, when the 16-star flag will be officially adopted by the government.
