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## A MODEL AMERICAN WOMAN.

It is out of the throng of American women it were necessary to select one in particular to serve as a model, we think no better selection could be made than that of Frances Folsom Cleveland. In the shadow of her great grief she stands out even more luminously than she did in her love-ly youth when, bright-eyed and light-stepping as the fawn, she entered the doors of the White House to become the first lady of the land.

Now that the passing years have made the college girl a wife, mother and widow, her life may be said to be fairly rounded out, and she may be regarded as a character formed and built to completion. That she has still many years of life before her to enjoy as far as the loss of her great husband will permit, is the hope of all her countrymen and countrywomen; but henceforward, though she is still comparatively young, her life will be more in the past than in the future.

When Frances Folsom became the first lady of the land she was in possession of all those gifts which go to make a woman proud and happy. She was young and exceptionally beautiful. She was cultured and trained as though she were foreordained to occupy the high place to which she ascended. The nation instantly fell in love with her and her popularity exceeded that of almost any American woman who had preceded her or who has since come after her.

If any woman ever had an excuse for allowing herself to be spoiled, it was this lovely, charming college girl who became the wife of the president of the United States. But from the first moment she held herself in perfect poise, bearing her honors with a modesty that amounted nearly to humility. She assumed her duties with a clear sense of what those duties meant, realizing to the full that she stood before all the daughters, wives and mothers of the nation as an example. She presided

with a wonderful grace at all the functions of state and bore herself as a queen might do, yet never forgetting that she was an American and that her country had the same concern for the humblest woman in the land that it has for the highest. When the responsibilities of motherhood came to her she proved a model mother; her home was her heaven; her fireside was her altar, as it still will be, though beside it now there stands the vacant chair that can be filled no more. She is a woman whose life has been so full, as to make impressive her profound belief that she who sanctifies her home is the woman who lives most after God's heart.

Mrs. Cleveland has never stepped a single foot from her pathway to gain the applause or to attract the attention of the people. Yet it is our conviction that there are in America today few women so well-loved by all the people. In the years to come the nation will regard her with particular affection and will cherish her with special care. It is said that republics are ungrateful, but this republic will never be ungrateful to Frances Folsom Cleveland for having given to it a model of womanhood. We trust that as she walks down the slanting shadows of the afternoon of life her days may be filled with peace and that time will bring its balm to the wounds from which her gentle heart suffers today.

## YARDS CURTAILED.

Lumberman Menz Argues for Curtailed Production on the Coast.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 26.—R. J. Menz, president of the Menz Lumber company, who has just returned from a four months' tour of Eastern markets, declares that the retailers in the East and Middle West have smaller stocks on hand than for 29 years past. He declares that unless the Pacific coast manufacturers do not force their lumber on the market now the retailers will buy heavily in the fall at good prices. He declared that the farmers were buying lumber in good quantities.

Lumber and shingle manufacturers of the Pacific coast are making a great mistake in forcing their product upon the market," Mr. Menz declared. "They could obtain at least \$100 a car more than they now get if they would cease manufacturing in advance of an actual realization of orders. The stock thus produced is crowded upon the market and buyers are deterred from making their usual fall purchases, believing that still lower values may prevail.

"Retailers of lumber and shingles soon will be obliged to purchase, regardless of their caution not to buy until absolute bottom is reached. The mills producing red cedar siding are receiving practically as high prices today as they were able to obtain during the times of high prosperity. This is not due to a heavy demand for red cedar siding, but to a limitation of production. This objection should not be ignored by lumber and shingle manufacturers of the Northwest and the Pacific coast."

## MORE ARRESTS.

Roseburg Citizens Arrested on Land-Fraud Charges.

ROSEBURG, Or., June 26.—Deputy United States Marshal W. B. Griffith of Portland today arrested three Roseburg citizens, Louis Kohlen, Joe Wip and L. S. Shipley, pursuant to indictments which were returned against the men in the government land-fraud cases. Bench warrants for the three men were issued out of the Federal court in Portland two days after the indictments were returned. In each case the amount of bonds was fixed at \$1000. These were furnished by the defendants upon arraignment this evening before United States Commissioner W. W. Calkins of Eugene, who came from Eugene this afternoon for that purpose. These arrests are the result of the rush for land which were filed upon at the land office in this city last April. It has later developed that nearly every claim has either a squatter or a minor contestant, and the result is that nearly all of those who filed upon the land at that time, some 20 in number, are liable to arrest on the charge of perjury, the charge upon which the above-mentioned men were arrested. Marshal Griffith admitted today that he has warrants of arrest for other persons in the land cases, but he declined to make known the names of the parties wanted or where they reside.

## MAKE OREGON SOIL SURVEYS.

SALEM, Or., July 30.—Congressman W. C. Hawley today received the following letter from the chief of the bureau of soils, relative to soil surveys which Mr. Hawley has been urgently requesting to have undertaken.

"On July 1 I am planning to send a soil survey party to Klamath Falls, Or., for the purpose of making a detailed soil survey of the Klamath Falls reclamation project. This work will be in charge of A. T. Sweet, and in case you find it convenient to visit Klamath Falls this summer, Mr. Sweet will be glad to show you the methods by which this work is carried on and the results which can be achieved by such a survey.

"I am also planning to survey a considerable portion of Coos county during the coming fiscal year, but it will not be possible to take up this survey before the spring of 1909."

## KIDNAPER CAUGHT.

FRESNO, Cal., June 30.—Using the body of a girl he had kidnaped from her father's house as a shield for his own body, Cleve Rogers held a posse that ran him down at bay for half an hour today before he surrendered himself and the girl. The girl is Edna Domingue, 16 years of age, the daughter of a wealthy stockman and oilman of Coalinga, who had just returned to her parents from college in Santa Cruz. The girl was taken from her home last night, clad only in her nightclothes, by Rogers and Tony Lovell. In default of the payment of \$5000 by her father, who did not have that sum of money in the house, an alarm was given at Coalinga and pursuit started. At 1:20 this afternoon Rogers was overtaken. He attempted to resist at first, but seeing the armed men in all directions, gave up. Lovell managed to escape and is still being pursued.

## NATURAL RESOURCES.

Interest aroused by the recent enforcement of governors with the president at the White House on the subject of the conservation of the natural resources of the country a lot to be allowed to lapse. At the conference the governors declared in favor of the appointment of a federal commission and the president quickly took action, appointing a large commission, of which he designated Gifford Pinchot, the national forester, as chairman.

This commission has already begun its inquiries looking toward the development of water transportation; the judicious development of forests; the control of streams, with a view to reducing soil waste, and permitting American farms to increase in fertility; the proper use of public lands and the judicious development of its mineral resources. Subdivisions, known as sections, are to be formed to more effectively secure information concerning the various topics. The president has directed that the federal departments shall give such help as they can. Each section has among its members two senators and three members of the house. Especially important phases of the conservation work are to be looked after by Andrew Carnegie, I. J. Hill, John Mitchell and John Hays Hammond, and all lines of the work will have the services of well-known experts. The present inland waterways commission, with two additional members, Senator Allison of Iowa and Representative Ransdell of Louisiana, will form the section of water in the new commission, with Representative Burton of Ohio at its head. Senator Smoot of Utah is the chairman of the section of forests; Senator Nelson of Minnesota is chairman of the section of lands, and Representative Dalzell of Pennsylvania is chairman of the mineral section.

A general meeting of the entire commission will not be held until next January. The executive committee, however, including Mr. Pinchot, Mr. Burton and Senators Nelson and Smoot, met recently in Chicago and mapped out a general scheme of work for the various sections. In view of its promoters no more important body of men exists in this country, from an economic standpoint, and it presents an inspiring exhibition of public spirit and patriotic feeling from the fact that the members serve without pay.
