## FIGHTING JOE CANNON.

An organized effort has been discovered to defeat "Uncle Joe" Cannon for speaker of the Sixty-first congress if the republicans carry the house. He has been targeted as an undesirable reactionary and must be eliminated, so the report goes.

Iowa is expected to lead the revolt against the Illinois congressman. In the first place, Iowa has wanted the speakership honors for years as a tribute to her old veteran, Colonel "Pee" Hepburn. In the second place, the state is not in sympathy with some of Cannon's policies.

The action of the republicans in Guthrie county, Iowa, adopted resolutions calling upon Rev. Walter I. Smith, one of the most influential men in the house and one who is generally regarded as needing no instructions, to vote against Joseph G. Cannon for speaker. It is said to be the first step in the campaign. Other Iowa organizations will follow suit, and it is predicted that many of the congressmen from that state will have the organizations, upon which they depend for election demanding the defeat of Cannon and the selection of Hepburn to succeed him.

Should Iowa lead off in this matter, most of the northwest states will follow her. It is calculated. Wisconsin is said to be up in arms against the drastic rules of the speaker that have squeezed the La Follette disciples so hard that they have been able to do nothing more effectively than make a futile protest. Not one solitary crumb of reform they have been able to bring forth to the hungry reformers in the Badger state, and they say it is all because "Uncle Joe" will not allow them to do anything to save the nation. Some of them have spoken their minds on the floor of the house, while others contented themselves with breaking over party lines when the speaker cracked the whip to carry out some of his plans.

Minnesota, Michigan, Nebraska, California and Kansas are counted on to vote for a change in affairs in the house, while scattering representatives, disgruntled by the way things have been run in the house during the last three congresses, are classed with those who will vote against the Illinois member.

It is said the organized labor will urge on the fight against Cannon. The speaker's opposition to the passage of legislation demanded by the American Federation of Labor in its fight against the anti-injunction plank in the republican platform has whetted the hatred of organized labor for him. If some of the republican representatives booked for the disapproval of American Federation of Labor are willing to pledge themselves to vote against Cannon they may effect a compromise with the Federation.

Colonel Hepburn is not the only man in the house who would like to see Cannon. There is Rep. Burton of Ohio, regarded as the most effective orator on the floor. Rep. Boutwell of Illinois is also said to be good timber.

Should the democrats by any chance regain control of the house, it is generally regarded as certain that Rep. Champ Clark of Missouri will be chosen speaker. In the last five years Clark has grown immensely in the house, and besides being level headed is a first-class orator.

## A GOOD MOVEMENT.

The department of commerce and labor has inaugurated a plan for the better distribution of labor throughout the United States. Four million return postal cards are to be printed, 1,230,000 having already been delivered, to be used throughout the rural delivery routes to locate farmers in need of laborers. The new movement may prove a great blessing to the workmen of the country who are really seeking employment, and will doubtless help the farmers materially in harvesting their crops. In Oregon, where the farm labor problem is most acute and peculiar, this plan will not succeed so easily as it should in the states devoted to plain farming. In gathering fruits the commonest work demands in a measure skilled labor. An awkward, careless, untrained crew would not be allowed to work five minutes picking pears under the new method of handling. But the idea originating with the department of commerce and labor is most excellent, and should in some measure equalize the labor supply and incidentally do something toward getting the strong, willing workers weaned away from the congested places. If this is the final result of the new plan, the present stringency among industrialists will be in that way a blessing to the country. How the farmers will take hold of the new scheme remains for demonstration, but they should give it hearty support.

## BE KIND.

The following from the Boston Transcript is a good thing to read with all the children who are old enough to understand it for an audience. The more we study or watch animals, the more we see that in their affections and emotions and their attachment to persons, or daily routine, they are startlingly human. The more they associate with us the more closely they come to resemble us, and therefore the more consideration of them should we be. The excerpt follows:

"About this time some people need to be reminded that dogs and cats have minds, memories and affections—can be lonely and homesick when deserted and when left behind, as well as loving, cuddling and polly, the life of the house, when their masters and mistresses are in the mood for that. Do not save your conscience with the notion that a 'good home' in a kennel and plenty of food make it up to them when you 'board' them during your absence. This food is almost the least of their life—the things of daily custom are of consequence to them, and you know it. So likewise is mere shelter from rain and cold and from danger—a very small item in the life of a dog or cat that is a member of a good family. All the concerns and activities of the family are participated in by them in their way. Sir Francis Channing, M. P. (a direct descendant of our own Channings) in presiding at an anti-vivisection meeting in England constantly in London a fortnight ago remarked: 'Now I put our case of total abolition of vivisection simply and plainly and absolutely on this one fact of our close relation, of common origin, physical similarity and still closer emotional, and, one might say, moral similarity; with those animals with whom we are most constantly and intimately associated. We live with some of the noblest creatures of the world; in some of the animals of whom we make lifelong friends we come across the same power of will, the same sense of duty and loyal devotion, the same power of brave endurance and risk in order to defend those whom they love; and I say these qualities in our humble friends ought, in all right minded men and women, to constitute not only a bond of sympathy, but to provide a solemn duty.' Among these duties is surely that of not allowing them to suffer long periods of dumb inquiry and hopeless waiting for the customary daily returns of the human beings who are to them what the gods were to the faithful of ancient times. Such innocent blind worship and faith as theirs ought certainly to have some worthy response in all claiming to be superior in soul to dogs and cats; noblesse oblige.

**Bryan's Name Makes Tumult.**  
DENVER, July 8.—When Senator Gore, the blind senator of Oklahoma, was called to the rostrum this afternoon to make an address during a lull, little did he realize that in a few minutes the entire hall would be in a state of bedlam broke loose through casual mention by him of Bryan's name. Speaking of the Oklahoma constitution and the criticism made of it by Roosevelt and the work of Taft in opposition to it, Gore

been followed. Immediately there was a cheer among the Bryan boosters. Then up from every section of the house, and almost in a moment the hall was in an uproar. Ten minutes, a half hour, flew by, and still no signs that the delegates and spectators were tired. The half hour grew into an hour, and still the clamor kept up. Marchers bearing banners paraded around the hall, bands played and hats and coats were thrown in the air in the wildness of the delegates to show their favor towards the Nebraskan. After one hour and twenty-seven minutes of unchecked joy and revel on the part of Bryan's friends, Chairman Bell finally secured order, and shortly after adjournment was made until tonight.

**KILLED BY FIREWORKS.**  
Seven Killed and Two Fatally Injured by Explosion.  
CLEVELAND, July 3.—Seven were killed and at least two others were fatally injured and fully thirty were hurt as the result of a fire in S. Kreg's five cent store on Ontario street today. The fire followed the explosion of fireworks on display in the store. Opinions differ as to the exact cause of the explosion. A woman who was at the fireworks counter says the stock ignited by sparks from a device which was being demonstrated by a clerk. Fire Chief Wallner and the store manager are of the opinion that the pieces were ignited by an arc light. In a panic hundreds of clerks and shoppers followed the explosion with a mad rush for the doors and windows. Many jumped from the second and third floors. Others sought to escape through doorways which became jammed by the struggling mass of frenzied people. Some of the windows were closed by iron bars, others offered easy egress but for the people jammed up against them. Some ran to the basement to be caught in a trap and sought refuge under a counter where one

smothered to death and one little boy knocked to the floor in the rush lay stunned and was overcome by smoke.

**BRYAN HELD UP.**  
Train Stalled and Bryan and Bell Held Up.  
LINCOLN, Neb., July 6.—Temporary Chairman Bell, who, together with W. J. Bryan, became almost hopeless about reaching Denver in time for the opening of the convention on account of high water which put the railroads leading into and out of Omaha out of business. They left the scene of the washout for Denver this afternoon. The Rock Island line by an unusual effort was able to arrange for a special train from the west side of the washout near Rocky, Neb. Bell and the representatives of the Associated Press crossed the swollen stream and boarded the waiting train, which will reach Belleville, Kan., in time to catch the Rock Island's fast Colorado express, which will be held for the purpose, and is due in Denver at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning.
