CORRECT GAME LAWS.

Open Season.
Buck deer, July 15 to November 1; female deer, September 1 to November 1. Limited to five deer to one person each season.
Elk, September 15 to October 15. Limit, one elk.
Duck, geese and swans, from September 1 to February 1. Limit, 50 ducks in one week.
Prairie chicken, grouse, native pheasants, ring-necked Mongolian pheasants, quail or partridges, October 1 to December 1. Limit, ten birds in one day.

Unlawful.
To kill spotted deer at any time.
To hunt or pursue deer with dogs.
To go within the enclosed property of another without permission.
Game warden has power to arrest or search without warrant.
