

EXPERT GIVES TALK ON DRUGS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Evils existing in adulterated and spurious drugs were disclosed in the address before the Association of Official Agricultural Chemists, of Dr. H. H. Rusby, United States drug expert, at the port of New York.

Dr. Rusby's address was not primarily to show that drugs are frequently adulterated. That was a mere incident to the talk which he illustrated at the Normandy Annex, with a series of microscopic photographs of plants, showing how chemists might distinguish adulterated from pure compounds. Ipecac, which generally is given to babies, and morphine he said, were extremely dangerous, because of their frequent poisonous adulterations. Dr. Rusby showed ipecac as a conspicuous article of adulteration.

Evidently there must be American as well as foreign manufacturers who are constantly devising schemes to make bogus drugs, or, at least, to adulterate with a material less expensive than the real article, and the government expert showed by enlarged photographs, taken with the aid of a microscope, how certain hairs, colors of certain spots, etc., would differentiate invariably the spurious from the genuine. The ability to make these discriminations, he said, could be acquired without a great deal of labor.

Dr. Rusby, who, in addition to his government position, is the dean of the School of Pharmacy at Columbia college, announced that he had just prepared a list of 125 standard drugs to be distributed to the laboratories throughout the United States where drugs are admitted from foreign countries. This list of standard drugs, together with many specimens of spurious and adulterated drugs, has been received at the bureau of chemistry.

Headache Powders Injurious.

The paper which led up to Dr. Rusby's address was read by I. F. Krebler of the department of agriculture, who showed imported drugs in crude form to illustrate how many of the foreign drugs reached this country adulterated, and failed to have the effect expected of them when compounded with other drugs. He referred especially to certain headache powders, which he said contained powerful heart depressants.

In the forenoon the chemists were addressed by Secretary Wilson of the department of agriculture, who praised the work of the society. He emphasized the effect of the chemists' activity in aiding the enforcement of the pure food and drug law.

Plan Bill for Congress.

The chemists took steps to draft proposed legislation for the sanitary production and distribution of food products, to supplement the national pure food and drug law, which deals only with the question of food adulteration. The bill, when drafted, will be presented to state legislatures as well as to congress.

During the day the association adopted an amendment to the constitution admitting Mexican and Canadian members to full membership. At a meeting of the executive committee L. M. Tolman, E. M. Chase and Dr. E. T. Allen were elected councilors.

The chemical society of Washington entertained the association last night at the Cosmos club, addresses being made by E. E. Free, W. O. Robinson and W. J. McCaughey of the bureau of soils, and E. C. Monroe of George Washington university.

The convention will continue into next week.

LAWYERS ROW WITH ACH.

Judge Lawlor Scolds Both Sides, Warning Against More of It.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 20.—F. J. Heney passed a comfortable night at the Lane hospital last night. His temperature remains normal, and there has been no interruption in his progress toward complete recovery from the effects of the wound inflicted by Morris Haas late Friday afternoon.

With the police-precantionary measures less rigid than on any day since the shooting of Special Prosecutor F. J. Heney by Morris Haas, the trial of Abraham Ruef proceeded before Judge William P. Lawlor today with ex-Supervisor James L. Gallagher still under cross-examination. So much has the excitement caused by the shooting of Mr. Heney abated

that there were even fewer spectators today than yesterday, and the public was allowed to come and go more freely. The apprehension of the court and the police that there would be crowds clamoring for admission into the courtroom because of the new interest aroused in the trial by the tragedy in the courtroom last Friday has not been realized. Captain Henry, who has charge of the police in and around the building, today withdrew several of his men from the streets in the vicinity of the building.

BONI WANTS KIDS.

Claims Right to Children. The Former Hubby of Anna Gould

PARIS, Nov. 20.—The hearing of the suit brought by Count Boni de Castellane against Prince Helle de Sagan for the custody of three children was today postponed until November 25. This action was taken at the request of Albert Clemenceau, counsel for the princess, who announced that he had just entered the case, and it was consequently impossible for him to proceed today.

Princess de Sagan was Anna Gould of New York before she married the Count de Castellane. She secured a divorce from him, after which she married Prince Helle de Sagan.

M. Bonnet, Count de Castellane's lawyer, did not oppose the request of M. Clemenceau for postponement, but he formally petitioned the court to place the children in the care of the Marquise de Castellane, mother of Count Boni, pending a settlement of the case, on the ground that they were uncomfortable and ill in the house of their mother, the princess, and because it was desirable that they should escape the atmosphere, unhealthy both morally and physically which, he alleged, pervaded the home of the mother. The court ruled that it could not pass upon the question today and the entire matter went over for one week.

Count de Castellane was present in court and listened attentively as M. Bonnet set forth that the count was unable to see his children on account of their illness and that the doctor had been forbidden to send him any news of them.

"The children have need of that calm and peace which they will find in the home of their grandmother," M. Bonnet declared. He then said that he had agreed to various propositions already because he understood that the princess had decided to seek a separation from her husband, but inasmuch as the princess had denied this report, he could see no reason why the suit should not proceed. The court, however, granted the postponement.

WILL MOURN EMPEROR.

Obsèques to Continue in China for Nearly a Month.

PEKIN, Nov. 20.—An edict issued today instructs Prince Pu Lun and Prince Pi to proceed to the western tombs and select a site for the grave of the emperor. There will be continuous obsèques at the palace for a period of 27 days. The obsèques began yesterday and the function was attended by Dowager Empress Yohene and representatives of the various governmental departments.

The local press is beginning to publish details of the occurrences of Saturday and Sunday. Up to the present time it has said virtually nothing of the events at the palace and the promulgation of the regency. The new Dowager Empress Yohene with great presence of mind arranged for the meetings of the grand council to be held in her private apartments. Here the plan that already has been discussed and decided upon was adopted, without loss of time.

The councilors warned the princess that the regency was final, and in terms that were not open to misinterpretation they expressed the opinion that any opposition thereto would be promptly met and punished.

RISKS DEATH; SAVES LIFE.

Spokane Man Rescues Suicide at the Brink of Falls.

SPOKANE, Wash., Nov. 20.—Risking his life to save a woman who says she wished to end hers, G. J. Heffner, member of the Spokane fire department, plunged into the Spokane river's deadliest pool, not 50 feet from the big falls, and brought the woman safely to land.

The limp person he deposited on the bank soon revived, although she had sunk twice, and told the men assisting her she is Mrs. Beattie Pjersted, wife of an employe of the county treasurer's office. Despondency arising from long-continued ill health was the cause of her attempt. Her husband is kind to her, a good provider and has kept a close watch on her heretofore, fearing she might try to end her life.

Mrs. Pjersted was crossing the Post-street bridge when the mania of self-destruction seized her. She climbed over the rail and made the leap of 50 or 60 feet to the river below. Heffner was walking across the bridge in company with his little daughter. He gave the child in keeping of another pedestrian, dashed down the rocky bank, shedding coat and vest as he went, and, measuring the distance, took a header far into the river.

The water is backed up by a dam of a power company, being diverted to huge iron pipes on the south side of the river, and the undertow is tremendous. Heffner's life was in danger every moment, and he knew it, but he grasped the nearly drowned woman, having dived again to find her, placed her body over his shoulder and made his way to the bank. Heffner was heartily congratulated and almost had to be torn away from the cheering crowd by the police.

HARTLOVE GOES TO JAIL.

Must Serve Sentence for Deserting to Mary Sear's Daughter.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.—Having been adjudged guilty of desertion from the navy by a court martial at Philadelphia, Secretary Metcalf today approved the sentence in the case of Charles J. Hartlove, musician, first-class (alias C. J. Magness), who left the service in order to marry the daughter of the late Senator Arthur P. Gorman, of Maryland.

The punishment is imprisonment for one year at the naval prison, Portsmouth, N. H., at the end of which he is to be dishonorably discharged. He is to perform police duty during his confinement and to forfeit all pay except a small sum for necessary prison expenses.

TAKES LAD'S EYES.

Sara Boy Makes Missile Up From His Father's Powder Horn.

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 19.—John Deako, aged 12 years, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Deako, of Sara, Wash., while playing with several children found his father's powder horn and taking it, poured a quantity into a newspaper, wrapped it tightly with a string and lighted it with a match. The newspaper bomb exploded while the lad was leaning over it, and his eyes were blown full of paper, leaves and sticks. His parents brought him to this city for treatment at St. Joseph's hospital, where the doctors say there is only slight hope of saving the sight of the little experimenter.

TOO MUCH FLIRTING.

Says Censor of Morals for Glasgow University.

GLASGOW, Scotland, Nov. 20.—Co-education has been passing through sharp criticisms here during the last few weeks. In this period the senate of the University of Glasgow several times has forcibly expressed opinion that co-education is not working well so far as the relationship of young men and young women students is concerned.

This relationship, it is asserted, gradually has become merely one of a "boy and girl flirtation" and the boasted advantages of co-education in the way of the achievement of a higher grade of common sense and seriousness have not yet appeared.

In order effectually to put a stop to the unwelcome ends one of the women lecturers has been appointed as a "censor of morals," and it is expected that she will at least bring to an end the "disgraceful whispering in corridors," which seems to be, according to the students themselves, the extent to which any of the flirting ever went. The censor position has been completely boycotted by the students.

HIGH-CLASS PAVING.

Some of the Rock Used for Paving the Streets Contains Gold.

Paving the streets with gold-bearing rock! Now, what do you know about that? But that is just what is being done in Medford right now.

Of course it isn't \$100 rock or anything like that, but there is gold in it, just the same.

KILLED BY A DERBY HAT.

Victim Fell and Headgear Jammed Over Face, Suffocating Him.

FALL RIVER, Mass., Nov. 18.—"Fell into his hat and suffocated." This is the indorsement on the death certificate of Alfred Parlow, who was found dead on the roadside in North Raynham by a neighbor.

The man was on his way to his home and tripped and fell. His derby hat slipped down over his eyes and his face was forced into it. The man never recovered sufficiently to extricate himself, dying of suffocation.
