**OPPOSED TO TOBACCO.**

Dr. Sperry Claims That Mrs. Longworth Smokes Many Cigarettes.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 23.—Congressman Nicholas Longworth claims to have worked a great reformation in the habits of his wife, formerly Alice Roosevelt, according to the statement of Dr. Lyman B. Sperry, whose address on "Human Conditions and Possibilities" is the topic of discussion in social circles.

"Congressman Longworth told a friend of mine recently," said Dr.

Sperry in his address before the Y. M. C. A., "that he had succeeded in reducing the number of cigarettes his wife smoked from 40 to 20 a day."

Dr. Sperry hurled invective against the increased use of tobacco, and declared that something should be done to abate the evil.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23.—When told of the accusations made concerning her sister smoking cigarettes, Miss Ethel Roosevelt stated that the claims of her sister's accusers were made of whole cloth, and done for spectacular effect. "My sister Alice does not smoke," said she, "and the only reason that I can see for the learned gentleman making the statement are that he may cause a sensation. Mr. Longworth will attend to him."

**THE NIGHT RIDERS.**

Woman Tells Many Secrets of Lawless Gang.

UNION CITY, Tenn., Nov. 22.—Stripped and beaten until she consented to become the secretary of Reelfoot Lake fisherman's organization, known as the Night Riders, Mrs. Ella Pride, a widow, 40 years old, was forced to don masculine clothing and accompany the riders on their raids.

Under a threat of death she acted as their secretary for years, handling their correspondence with similar organizations in other states and keeping careful minutes of their meetings.

She learned practically all their secrets, and in revenge for the humiliation to which she was subjected she says she will tell all these secrets to the grand jury, which is investigating the lynching of Captain Quentin Rankin, and the attempted murder of his law partner, Colonel Z. R. Taylor, at Walnut Log recently.

Mrs. Pride was arrested at her home on Reelfoot lake and brought to Union City yesterday by a posse of state militiamen. She announced her readiness to make a confession, but the details of her statement to the prosecuting attorney were not made known.

Promises Complete Confession. "I will tell all I know," she said to newspaper men. "The organization of which I was secretary is known as the 'Sons of Joy.' An old man named Byrd was president and

Garrett Johnson was captain." Both of these men are under arrest.

Mrs. Pride says the books she kept have been destroyed. She declared, however, that she would tell the grand jury what they contained.

In her statement to the militia officers Mrs. Pride said regular dues were paid for the maintenance of the organization and terrible oaths were exacted from the members to keep the secrets. She admitted that she had been in several raids with the men, sometimes on horseback and at other times on foot, but denied that she was with them on the night of Rankin's lynching.

**Aided by Tobacco Raiders.**

Mrs. Pride declared that subscriptions were received frequently from tobacco raisers in Kentucky and Tennessee to keep up the Reelfoot lake organization.

Rankin and Taylor were not involved in any tobacco warfare in Kentucky or Tennessee, but as attorneys for a land company they were trying to oust the squatters from their hunting and fishing grounds along Reelfoot lake. Both men have been warned that their lives were in danger.

On the night of the lynching the two men occupied a room in the hotel at Walnut Log, where they had gone to prepare legal papers to oust the squatters. They were taken from their room by a mob of masked men and Rankin was killed. Taylor escaped and notified the authorities. He did not mention the presence of a woman in the band.

**Habeas Corpus Writs Issued.**

Fifty prisoners were taken by the state militia, and the prosecuting authorities say that the evidence supplied by Mrs. Pride is sufficient to convict them. Writs of habeas corpus returnable Friday were issued today on the petitions of attorneys representing the 50 prisoners. Judge Joseph E. Jones announced that a special session of the Circuit court will convene the first week in December to try the defendants.

The Circuit court is now in session, but its legality will be questioned on the ground that the presiding judge failed to announce the session 30 days in advance, as required by statute. Should the present court be declared void, the indictments against the alleged night raiders would be recommitted to the December term.
