streets these days. More than 20
blocks will be paved if every prop-
erty owner is being urged by property

series of wing dams on Bear creek
so as to prevent future high waters
from striking the banks where the
recent washout near the city occur-
ed. This is to be a permanent work
and in connection with what is be-
ing done by the city engineer's force,
no fears of further damage at that
point need be feared. Mr. Liptrap
commenced work yesterday afternoon
with a small force. More men will
be put on and the work pushed be-
fore there is another raise of the
water.

Orchard Tract Sale.

roads in many places will necessarily
have to be repaired.

ling tea, coffee, extracts and baking
powder at the old stand. Mr. Flisk

ford and will invest in real estate.
His reason for selling the business
is poor health.

the field every day, comprising
eight men.

main line will be about seven miles
long and will run to the Sunnyside
mine, which was before the transfer
the property of the Pacific Coal Co.
