HOUSES MUST BE NUMBERED.

A conference was held yesterday which forbodes ill for those who refuse to put up their house numbers. Those who participated in the conference were: Mayor Canon, City Attorney Neff, Assistant Postmaster Ralph Woodford, City Engineer Harry E. Foster.

The postmaster wants free delivery service. To get it the houses must be numbered. To get free delivery this year the matter must be attended to at once, so that the local postoffice can make its application and have it acted on before July 1, the beginning of the fiscal year.

The city attorney at the last meeting drafted an ordinance providing a penalty for those who refuse to put up their signs. The matter will come up again at the next meeting of the council.

Mayor Canon stated that notices would be sent out to those who were delinquent in this matter in that part of the town which had been numbered.

City Engineer Harry E. Foster stated that the numbers for that part of the town above Jackson street would be ready in a few days, so that there would be no delay on that score.

Mayor Canon and City Attorney Neff were both positive in their declarations that no consideration would be shown those who failed to come across when they were notified and that the penalty clause of the ordinance would be enforced until every house in town was numbered. This looks like business.

CITIZENS' CO. WINS ELECTION

By a vote of 322 to 125 in the election held Friday the Citizens' Telephone company won the fight for its franchise. The vote was a light one as compared with the last city election, at which 926 votes were cast.

The fight for the franchise was characterized by hard fighting through the press by both the Citizens' Telephone company and the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company, but the public seemed to take absolutely no interest in the campaign.

In this respect the fight differed widely from that carried on in Grants Pass by the same companies. There the town has been split into factions and hard feelings have arisen between the supporters of the rival companies.

The city council of Grants Pass voted to give the Citizens' company a franchise; the mayor vetoed it and the council then sustained the veto. The next step was when the new company filed an affidavit to the effect that the vote sustaining the mayor in his veto was invalid for the reason that the question was not put to the council in the manner provided by the charter. There the matter rests.

It is surmised, now that the Home company has won in Medford, it will leave no stone unturned to secure a franchise in Grants Pass. If it fails to make stick the point that the vote on the sustaining of the mayor's veto was not properly put, it is believed that it will bring the matter to a referendum vote of the people.

In Medford the fight was won by the old company in every skirmish until the vote of the people was taken yesterday.

When the new company appeared before the council the matter was referred to the street committee, which recommended the granting of a franchise to the new company. When the matter came before the council the committee's report was not sustained, at least the new company feared that it would not be, and the petition for a franchise was withdrawn from the council and submitted to a vote of the people.

Following is the vote by wards: First ward, yes 82, no 46; second ward, yes 119, no 48; third ward, yes 131, no 31. Totals: Yes 322, no 125.

NEW FLYING MACHINE.

A pesky mess of sticks and strings, of whirling wheels and flapping wings, the invention of Louis Wagner of Newberg, Or., is now on exhibition in room 315, Oregonian building, in Portland, as the latest thing in aerial navigation. This fledgling craft of graceful lines and pretty form has never flitted from its easy poise upon the long broad table upon which its makers gave it being, but they swear by all the shifting strata of the capacious clouds that it will "clip the wings of eagles" in its fine assaults upon Empyrean's quivering wastes, when once the thrill of life goes coursing through its eager veins. What then will happen hides only the onward sweep of time, but hope eternal is one of inventor Wagner's assets.

The neat and trim little model of spruce and aluminum is seven feet long and five feet wide. The plane that is to keep the ship in the air is shaped like a canopy over the apparatus that serves the purpose of the propellers, which consist of rapidly-moving, flexible vanes, traveling in a horizontal path, and controlled by the engine which is operated in the carriage or cage of the machine.

The three essential features of aerial navigation which have not been used up to the present time are employed in this new model and consist of the following: First, safety; second, propulsion, and third, automatic balance.

Safety is secured by means of the concave surface of the plane of the machine, which serves as a parachute.

The manner of propelling the machine is altogether a new one. The engine is located in the carriage below the body of the machine and belts operated from this propel the flexible vanes at the top of the aeroplane. These vanes will be 8 by 10 feet, six in number.

The third feature of the machine is the automatic balance. This is arranged by means of a common center shaft upon which the carriage which holds the aviator and the engine is suspended and by which the control of the machine is effected. This automatic arrangement is made to take advantage of the force of gravity which keeps the carriage at all times in a horizontal position. From this carriage two levers are attached by which the machine is controlled; one is to raise and lower the machine and the other is for the purpose of guiding it from right to left.

The engine to be used is one of the new lightweight machines that have been invented recently and which supplies one horsepower to a little over two pounds of weight. In this way it will be possible to get an engine weighing 100 pounds to supply more than 40 horsepower.
