BIG HOIST IS HERE.

CANNOT SHARE GUARANTY.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Attorney General Wickersham, in an opinion submitted to the secretary of the treasury, holds that national banks of Kansas have no right to participate in the assessments and benefits of the bank depositors' guaranty fund under the provisions of a recently enacted law of the state, on the same terms and conditions as apply to the state banks.
