ORCHARDISTS IN ARMS

Inspectors Disagree at Grants Pass and Tangle Is Result

Over in Josephine county, in the neighborhood of Grants Pass, a small war has broken out among the fruit-growers, and it is hinted that when the final discharge of musketry has been heard and the powder stales have been washed away, either C. H. Carson, state horticultural inspector for the southern part of Oregon, or H. C. Bateham, county inspector for Josephine county, will have parted from his official badge and given way to a successor yet to be named. Meanwhile Professor P. J. O'Gara, connected with the United States department of horticulture, remains on neutral ground and is awaiting the display of the white flag before he will again enter Josephine county and attempt to make an inspection of the orchards of that section.

Hostilities have arisen, it is said, as a result of certain matters which failed to be viewed in the same light by Carson as they were by Bateham, the county inspector. Carson, it is alleged, does not approve of Bateham's method of inspecting orchards and has made the fact evident by holding up, through his power as a state officer, fees which Bateham has been accustomed to draw down from the county. Through a certain provision of the law it is necessary for Carson to approve Bateham's claim; before they are allowed by the county court, but recently Carson refused to approve any more claims presented by Bateham, and consequently the latter gentleman is now out and injured so far as obtaining money for his services is concerned. He continues, however, to make the required orchard inspection and is awaiting developments.

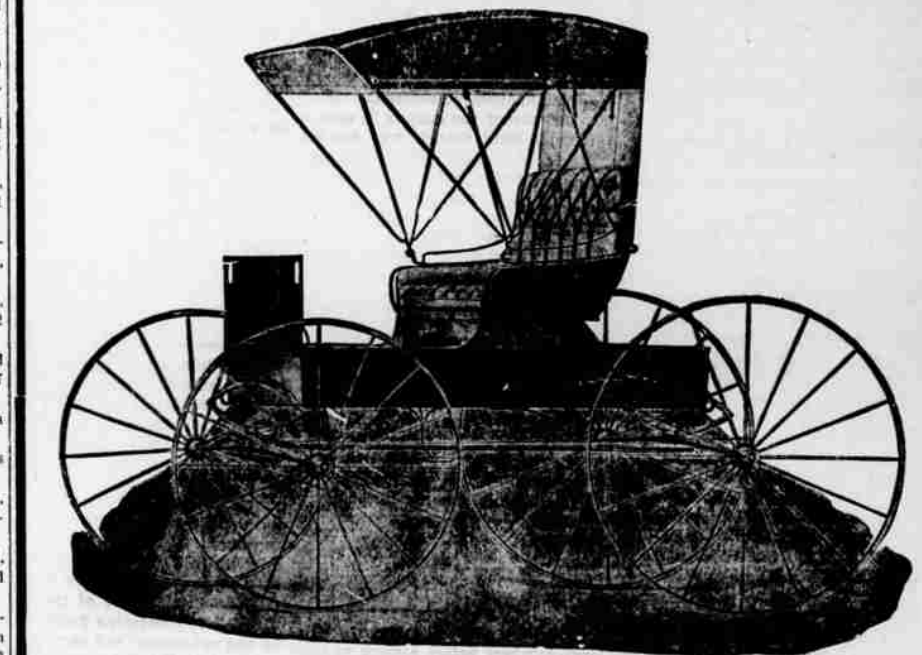
