REFORM TURKS ARE VICTORIOUS

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 24.—The constitutional forces are in complete control of the capitol tonight and the sultan is virtually a prisoner in the palace. His formal submission has not yet been given, but he and the troops with him are at the mercy of the army of occupation.

Mahamed Safekete Pasha, commander-in-chief of the invading forces, is desirous of finishing the work without bloodshed. He is in negotiation with the sultan's representatives and has extended the period of grace within which the sultan must make a final decision. The Yildiz Kiosk may be rushed during the night, for some 5000 infantry are disposed within a mile and a half of the palace. What disposition will be made of the sultan when he is in the hands of the constitutionalists is unknown to the embassy, although the opinion is held in authoritative quarters that he will continue as the normal constitutionalist's executive, largely responsible to the cabinet, who in turn will be responsible to parliament.

Complete tranquility prevails at present the serious feature of the situation being in the possible refusal of the garrison at the palace to submit. The Yildiz garrison in that neighborhood is mined. The constitutionalists improved their position during the day, garrison after garrison falling before their advance, until the invaders occupied all points of vantage.

He has been tried, it is true, and condemned in the committee of the union and progress, as untrustworthy, but it is stated authoritatively that he will be allowed to remain where he is for the present.

BEIRUT, Asiatic Turkey, April 24.—Conservative estimates now place the number killed in the Armenian massacre in the Dana Vilayet at from 20,000 to 30,000. At the town of Adena it is known more than a hundred girls are missing. It is known that 21 native pastors were killed. Fears are entertained that other American missionaries than those whose deaths were reported have been murdered. There are 15,000 refugees in Adena and Parus and 5000 at Mersina. Conditions at Alexandretta are unchanged. Appeal for help is sent from Latakia, as mobs are nearing that place and American property is threatened.

WASHINGTON, April 24.—Russia has responded promptly to the implied request of the American government that it military forces about to enter Persia and the vicinity of Tabriz safeguard the lives and interests of American citizens by giving assurances that she will take all possible measures for the protection of foreigners. The proposed expedition is about to start for the frontier.

BEIRUT, April 24.—The Mohammedans are coming into Beirut today to resist the expected vengeance of the Druses tribesmen, chief of which is the Arslan's father. These tribesmen come from Lebanon. They have now concentrated large forces.

CONSTANTINOPLE, April 24.—Ambassador Lelshman received a telegram today from the American consul at Beirut setting forth the danger of collision tomorrow between the Mohammedans and the Druses tribesmen. In reply, the ambassador submitted the message he sent to the father of the late Deputy Arslan, telling him of the success of the liberal forces and suggesting that vengeance be left to the government. The Loyalists resisted bravely, but could not hold their positions in the face of the onslaught of the enemy. The discipline, valor and friendly courtesy of the invading troops, particularly the gendarmes of the Salonica, was noticeable.

The number of casualties will probably never be known, but it is estimated that it is far into the thousands.

Private houses within the line of fire suffered greatly. The misuse of the white flag followed by a heavy fire after the insignia of surrender had been hoisted caused heavy losses. Ambassador Lelshman declared the conduct of the Americans during the fighting and while he was arranging to send them off on a steamer was splendid. They displayed the keenest interest in the strange battle and the women showed great pluck. There was no fainting and no hysterics. At noon the battle ceased and precautionary measures were taken immediately by the victors to insure the safety of the residents.

No disorders of any kind occurred during the afternoon, and no looting was permitted. General satisfaction seemed to be felt at the swift change from uncertainty to constitutional order. Should the sultan remain in office it will be merely in a normal way. His allowance will be greatly restricted and he will have no means for further agitation, should his mind turn again in this direction. It is credibly reported that the sultan had distributed within recent days 2,000,000 pounds (Turkish) sterling to the troops. The question of the sultan's disposition or his execution can hardly be anticipated.

ROAD IS COMING NORTH.

KLAMATH FALLS, Or., April 21.—Surveyors of the Southern Pacific have relocated the line through the town of Merrill for the projected cutoff from Alturas to a connection with the main line at Klamath Falls. The original survey missed the town of Merrill by about two miles and the people of that thriving young trade center immediately took up with the railroad officials the question of having a change made to bring the route through the town. The new survey was then ordered.

Evidence is accumulating that it is the intention of the railroad company to hasten construction work on the line from Alturas and that it is destined to become a link in the transcontinental route which will connect the Central Pacific to the Klamath Falls gateway.

Definite plans for building this line seem to prove conclusively that the line from Reno to Alturas, the Nevada-California-Oregon, has passed into control of the Harriman system. Although its ownership is still apparently vested in the New York banking house that took over the property under a mortgage several years ago, the fact that it is now to be made to connect in a through line seems to confirm its ownership by the Union Pacific interests. The N.-C.-O. road has been in the market for several years, and for a time it was believed that the Western Pacific had acquired it as an arm of the new transcontinental Gould line. This was probably the case, but if so, the road probably passed to the control of the wizard of Wall street when he came to the rescue of the treasury of the Gould system last year.

PARDONS GRANTED.

FRANKFORT, April 23.—Governor Willson late this afternoon granted pardons to ex-Governor W. S. Taylor and ex-Secretary of State Charles Finley, both refugees in Indiana, charged with complicity in the murder of William Goebel in 1909.

FRANKFORT, April 23.—Pardons were also granted to John Powers, brother of Caleb Powers, who is believed to be in Honduras; to Holland Whitaker, John Davis and Zach Steele, under indictment, but who did not flee from the state. Those over whom indictments are left hanging are Wharton Golden, now in Colorado; Frank Ceell, railroad detective in St. Louis, and William H. Culton, said to have died in the West a few months ago.

These cases, with the possible exception of that of Ceell, will be dismissed, leaving Henry E. Youtsey, now serving life sentence in the state penitentiary, the only person to suffer for the killing of Goebel.

Reiterating his belief expressed when he pardoned Caleb Powers and James B. Howard, Willson expressed the belief that there was no conspiracy and only Youtsey had a part in the killing. Willson said that to pardon Taylor was a "sacred duty which I must no longer delay to carry into effect."

ATLANTA, Ga., April 22.—"There are 7000 students in the colleges of California, and there is not enough religion in the whole to save a rat. If a rat was a subject for salvation." CASTRO TALKS.

ST. NAZAIRE, April 23.—An ex-President Castro of Venezuela was leaving on the train for Paris today he said he had been expelled from Martinique at the instance of the United States and that Europe and the powers would regret the action taken against him. He declared the United States had already taken Cuba and Panama and had now committed its first act against the sovereignty of Venezuela.

CHICAGO, April 24.—Dr. Roller of Seattle defeated Kirk Victor of St. Louis in a wrestling match here tonight, downing him twice in a short time.
