SAM'S VALLEY BUYS PHONE.

(Gold Hill News.)

The people of Sam's Valley, aided by some of the public-spirited citizens of Gold Hill, have purchased the telephone line from this place to Moonville and will hereafter operate it as an independent system, connecting, however, with the Pacific States Telephone system at Gold Hill for long-distance telephoning. It is the intention of the new company to extend the line throughout the whole upper valley, thus bringing that territory into direct communication with Gold Hill and through the long-distance system, with the outer world. This move means more to the merchants and business men of Gold Hill than appears upon the surface. It means quick and easy communication with a prosperous and growing community and the diversion of a great amount of trade to this city which might otherwise go elsewhere. It is the beginning of a series of local telephone lines running out of Gold Hill to surrounding sections, which will eventually make this place what it should be—the trading point for every locality on this side of the river not touched by the railroad.

PLANS REFORESTATION.

(Ashland Tidings.)

T. T. Mungers, forest expert, is now at Rosland and is ready to begin experiments in reforestation in that vicinity. Mr. Mungers expects to lay off three plots of about one acre each and try three methods, one to scatter pine seeds broadcast, another to plant seeds with a corn planter and a third to plant some yellow pine seedlings from the government nursery stock. Mr. Mungers says it will probably take four or five years before anything can be told as to what the outcome of the experiment will be. If it is a success the government will reforest the vast barren region about Crescent Lake, out in Northern Klamath county. After completing his work at Rosland, Mr. Mungers will go to Lakeview.

PHOENIX BRUSHES UP.

Phoenix seems to have taken on new life and does not propose to be a laggard in the present day era of progress and improvement in the Rogue River valley. Recently the town was incorporated and the inhabitants are thoroughly incited with the public spirit virus, judging by the enthusiasm displayed yesterday, which was set apart as a municipal clean-up day. 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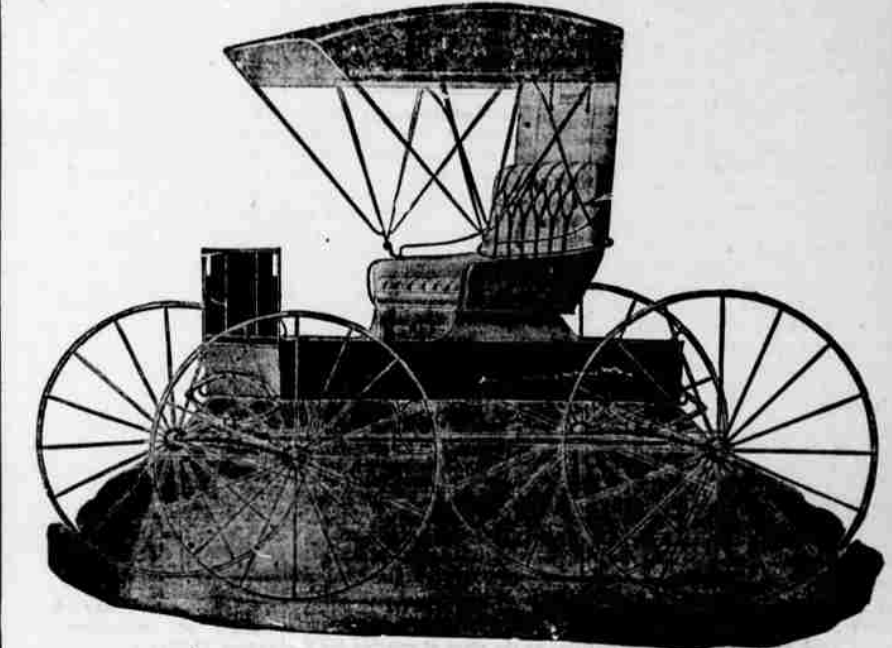

MRS. MERLEY WINS OUT.

(Central Point Herald.)

The land contest case of the government vs. Rev. Josiah Merley, deceased, which was defended by the widow, has been decided in favor of Mrs. Merley. Judge Pentz was so notified by the Roseburg land office, who inclosed their decision in the case.

This ends another of the cases which were brought against homesteaders in the Big Butte district and said to have been caused by the outgrowth of a spirit savoring more or less of persecution and malice. All of the cases tried so far have been won by the defendants.

JACKSONVILLE'S WATER WORKS

Work on the new water works system at Jacksonville has been progressing rapidly lately. It was the

original intention of the town to cross-section the creek at angles, digging the pit down to a sufficient depth to reach the water that seeps through the bed of the river during the dry months of the summer. However, the pit had hardly been started when a flow of water was struck that more than supplies the demand by a great deal, and it is thought perhaps that it will not be necessary to cross-section the entire width of the creek bottom.

At the pit just completed a four-inch centrifugal pump is being installed to pump the water a quarter of a mile up on Britt hill, where a reservoir will be built. From there a sufficient pressure will be obtained to supply the entire town for all purposes.

WILL USE MOTOR CARS.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., May 7.—To forestall any competition which might arise in the event of an early

completion of some of the proposed electric roads to be constructed in this valley and to compete on an equal basis with the company now operating lines between this city and Milton, it was announced today that the O. R. & N. railroad will, within the next 60 days, put on two more cars, one to run from here to Milton, and the other on the Dayton branch of the Harriman system.

The move on the part of the railroad officials to furnish direct and quick service to its patrons is regarded with significance in this locality, as it is rumored that a rate war will be inaugurated as soon as the gasoline cars arrive.

U. S. MARSHAL KILLED. — HUGO, Okla., May 7.—A battle occurred between a posse and a band of moonshiners near Turkey Creek today. United States Deputy Marshal Leonard was killed. The band was routed. Three moonshiners were captured.
