The peddlers' bill passed by the legislature, and which becomes a law today, will probably afford the lawyers a chance to exercise their wit, as fruit trees and farm products are about the only commodities that can be peddled without paying a license. Whether the law can be made to cover the cases of delivery wagons taking orders, book agents, wholesale businesses operated in another state and various other lines, now conducted by a canvassing system, believed to be desirable and necessary, will be watched with some degree of interest.

LIQUOR DEALERS IN COURT.

Paul and John Goodwin and Ellis Reynolds of Medford were arrested this week on a warrant sworn out in Justice Cox's court at Jacksonville, charging them with giving liquor to a minor. On being arraigned they waived an examination and each was placed under a bond in the sum of \$200 for appearance before the Circuit court for trial.

MAKING BREAD FROM ALFALFA

(Evening Telegram.) According to a story that comes from Omaha, we are in a fair way to realize a new substitute for wheat. A college club at Creighton university has demonstrated that alfalfa may be made into palatable and nutritious bread by grinding the leaves and a portion of the stalks into fine meal.

It is not probable that this announcement will have much, or indeed, any immediate effect upon the wheat market; yet it suggests the possibility of our having overlooked material that is fit for food.

Of course, the thought of eating hay is rather repellent. It suggests getting back to the beasts of the field, and brings to mind the punishment of Nebuchadnezzar. Nevertheless, if we can make delicacies out of sea moss, grape food out of potatoes, and nut butter out of corn husks; if we can produce near-food out of almost any old flotsam and jetsam that comes to hand, why should it not be feasible to feed the multitude with alfalfa?

Moreover, if Mr. Patten and the wheat famine advocates keep their grip on affairs; and if the Farmers' Union joins hands with these forces to the everlasting assurance of dollar wheat and upwards, we'll need to have recourse to the alfalfa patch. We may yet have reason to believe that this discovery by the Omaha students is timely and of economic value.

LICENSE LAW FOR PEDDLERS

At the time of the regular session of the state legislature many bills are passed, the announcement and reading of which excites but a transitory and fleeting impression upon the public mind. The 1909 session at Salem closed on February 23, and now that the 90 days in which the referendum might be invoked is about to elapse these bills will soon be in full force and effect.

One, the passage of which gives great satisfaction to the great majority of merchants throughout the state, which represents a victory after a hard fight and repeated failure, which promises to be somewhat far-reaching in its effect and which in a measure touches the interests of all who either buy or sell goods, is the peddler bill, which provides that a license from the county court must be secured by peddlers before plying their trade.

The law states that "peddler" shall mean, "a person going from place to place or from house to house selling or offering for sale goods, wares or merchandise." An exception is made of fruit trees and farm products and the law shall not apply in the case of incorporate cities or towns having a license law.

In three or four previous legislatures an earnest attempt has been made to pass a bill of similar import. In 1905 a bill was passed imposing a tax on peddlers selling bicycles, stoves, fanning mills, wagons, etc. A decision rendered in the Supreme court by Judge Bean, March 23, 1909, in a test case of the State vs. Wright, is most interesting. It seems that Wright had sold a buggy for an eastern house and lost the case under the statute of 1905. He pled not guilty, and in reversing the decision the judge held that the law was unconstitutional, as a violation of the principle of equal rights to all. That it was a manifest example of class legislation, as it was not directed against peddlers as a class, but against those selling certain wares. A man might sell lightning rods, dynamite, fruit trees or patent medicines and be within the law without regard to the utility of the articles, but if he sold so useful an article as a stove, a buggy or a wagon he would be in violation of the law. The injustice of the bill was apparent.

During the session of 1909 much pressure was brought to bear through the Retail Merchants' association and through the individual efforts of the merchants of the state, and the present bill was framed, which is believed to meet the objectionable features of the previous bill.

The fee fixed by law is \$50 for a peddler on foot; if he has one horse, \$100 will be demanded, while if he has two horses \$150 is the price of exploiting his wares. The license is not transferable, but must be taken out in each county where the peddler operates. In the case of large stove manufacturers, who usually send out a force of ten or more men to work one field, a "blanket license" could probably not be taken out, but each individual would need to be equipped with a license. Whether the laws regulating interstate business would exempt such cases is another question for the courts.

When the present law passed the house the license fixed was nearly twice the amount now given out, but the senate reduced the sums to those given.

Included are the nine members of the conservation commission, four members of the state committee for the treatment of tuberculosis, seven members of the Crater Lake highway commission, three members of the Lynn County Fair association, three members Yamhill County Fair association, two for the Crook County association and a Circuit judge for the fifth judicial district.
