EDEN PRECINCT ITEMS.

Your Eden Precinct correspondent on Monday visited the W. E. Carlock place to see the big well which Mr. Carlock had sunk for irrigation purposes this spring. The well is 24 feet 10 inches deep by eight feet wide, with one tunnel of eight feet. The flow is so strong that the water rises to within about five feet of the top, and gives at least 5000 gallons per day. Mr. Carlock has a two-horsepower gasoline engine pumping. Mr. Carlock says he can operate his pump at a cost of only 25 cents per day, and that he can irrigate 20 acres. He has all kinds of small garden truck growing on his place. The place is that known formerly as the Hunter place, one mile north of Phoenix, and is an ideal place for the growing of strawberries, grapes and peaches. As it is the same kind of soil as that of the well-known Wilder strawberry patch. Mr. Carlock has only been on the place a short time and has made several substantial improvements already.

P. & O. 101 MILES LONG

The following, taken from the Timberman of May, apparently coming from good authority, will be of interest at the present time when much is being said about railroad extension through Medford to the ocean. The Timberman says:

"The Pacific & Oregon Southern railway, which is projected from Central Point, Or., to a point near Wilderville, thence southwest to Elma, thence up the Illinois river valley to a point northeast of Decer, thence southwest through the Chetco river valley and Mill Creek Flats to Crescent City, Cal. Chetco, Or., 25 miles north of Crescent City, will probably be on the route of the new road and Gold Beach, in Curry county, Oregon, lying 50 miles to the south, may also be tapped by the road. The projected road will be 101 miles long and will open up a rich farming, timber and mining section."

of this year's crop with interest.

Mr. Rainsford may be said to have a model ranch. Irrigation is supplied by two wells, one of them being 25 feet in depth and 7 feet in diameter. A pump two inches in diameter and operated by a one and one-half-horsepower gasoline engine from 5 o'clock in the morning till 6 in the evening fails to lower the water an inch.

Another well, 17 feet deep and five feet in diameter, has a flow of water of such a capacity that the gasoline engine is unable to keep it from flowing over. Mr. Rainsford undoubtedly has one of the best irrigating plants in the valley.

Mr. Rainsford makes a specialty of raising strawberries, and his crop of that fruit this year is above the average. He recently marketed several crates in this city, which brought him the price of \$4 the crate.

VETERAN REMEMBERED

Judge F. M. Stewart Gets Back Pay for War Services

On the 14th of next July there will have elapsed just 44 years since Judge F. M. Stewart, a resident of this city and employed on the editorial staff of The Morning Mail, was mustered out of the army service at Louisville, Kentucky.

At the time Mr. Stewart thought he had all that was coming to him from Uncle Sam, but from recent advices from Washington it appears he did not get it all.

The substance of the Washington communication is that \$4.98 is due him from the government and will be sent him at once. The above amount is due him for services rendered from July 14 to 20, 1865, and for clothing allowance for the same period.

Mr. Stewart's company was mustered out of service at Louisville, Kentucky, on July 14, 1865, but because of congested transportation facilities at that time he did not reach Springfield, Illinois, where he was formally discharged, until four days later, and it is for this period that the payment is made.

Mr. Stewart says he didn't care a whoop then whether he ever drew a dollar of government money—he, like thousands of other boys, just wanted to get home. Some of the soldiers, he says, did not even wait for their formal discharge, and their name stands on the records today with the word "deserter" written after it.

A couple of years ago Mr. Stewart received a communication from a Washington attorney asking for permission to look up his war record as to his money allowance. The permission was granted and this \$4.98 voucher is the result.

MAKES GOOD SHOWING

Hart Mine at Eagle Point Interests California Capitalists

Great excitement prevails at Eagle Point, the terminus of the Pacific & Eastern, and the town is simply wild over the showing made at the Hart mine. The property is located two miles north and east of Eagle Point and two and one-half miles from the Pacific & Eastern railroad, on Nichols mountain. The entry now extends 130 feet beyond the outcrop and the showing is so good that California capitalists have been interested. A company is now organizing to take over the property. Hart, Parker et al., now own 246 acres and are buying options on all lands surrounding the development.

The opening of this mine means much to Eagle Point and Medford, as its location is such that with but a trifling cost a spur may be run from the Pacific & Eastern to the mouth of the mine, giving Medford access to cheap fuel and guaranteeing enough traffic to the Pacific & Eastern that its new purchasers will be insured sufficient income to complete the extension of the road into the Big Butte country.

MINING AROUND GOLD HILL

Nearly Every Property in Sardinia District is Operating

GOLD HILL, May 21.—There has been much activity of late in mining matters, especially in the Sardinia creek district. Nearly every mine in that section is in operation and others are expected to start up soon.

Patrik & Huntington have leased the Corporal G mine of Mrs. Naina Smith, and the former are making extensive preparations for active work. These gentlemen are miners of experience and good results are expected from them.

The ore at the Morning Glory mine is showing up well and the Gray Eagle company is preparing to erect a ten-stamp mill there.

The outlook at the Bertha mine on Foothills creek is very encouraging. The mine is operated by E. Ray & Son, who have leased it from C. F. Young.

A tunnel is being run in the Clima mine to open a new vein. These claims are owned by C. F. Carter, J. H. Hamerly and others, and are opened in several places.

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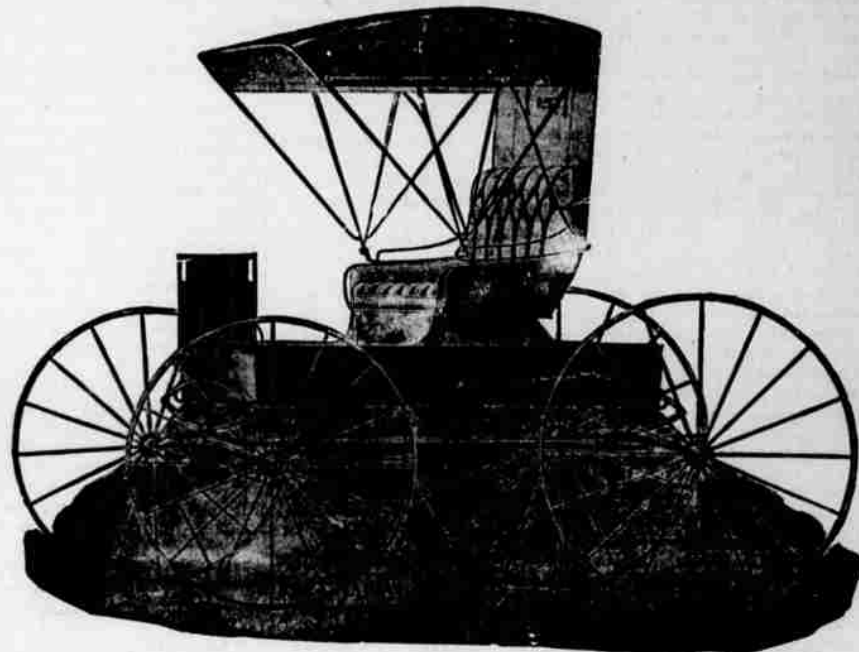

CHANGE THE DATE

Fourth of July Celebration to Be Held Monday Instead of Saturday

After the meeting of the firemen was held last Tuesday night wherein they had set the date of the celebration at Saturday, July 3, there was a great cry of protest sent up by the business men of the city. They stated that Saturday was always their busiest day, and accordingly made a request that the date be changed. Accordingly a meeting was again held last night and it was decided to change the date from Saturday, July 3, to Monday, July 5. Another reason for making this change is to give the business men more time to prepare their floats for the parade and to decorate their places of business for the occasion. The various committees have not made any definite report yet, but it is expected that among other things, instead of the usual evening fireworks, which are generally quite expensive and are a time-worn fad, an open-air show will be put on, in which the best of local talent will participate. This will undoubtedly prove quite an attractive feature of the celebration.

The team which was selected at a previous meeting to compete in a race with a visiting team of firemen, will meet to practice next Tuesday night. Another meeting of the firemen will be held next Wednesday night,

at which many of the committees are expected to make their reports.

CALIFORNIANS TO PURCHASE.

KLAMATH FALLS, May 22.—A deal was consummated Tuesday evening which is of great importance to this city. Moore Bros. entered into a contract with John J. Fitzpatrick of San Diego for the purchase of nearly 500 acres on the west side of the river and adjoining the town. Mr. Fitzpatrick is representing other San Diego capitalists and has returned to that city to conclude with them. It is expected that the deal will be closed within three weeks, as a good sum was paid for the limited option.

It is the purpose of the parties to spend a large amount in building terraces, boulevards, streets and improving the property for residence purposes. The property included in the deal covers nearly the entire hill

facing the city on the west side and could be made into fine residence property. The sale price is not made public, but it is understood to be not less than \$40,000.

WILL TRY NAVY TREATMENT.

Word comes from Ashland that a party of young boys broke into the cellar of the Catholic parsonage in that city recently and took therefrom considerable wine that was stored there to be used for sacramental purposes. The two ringleaders were arraigned in the justice court and pleaded guilty to the charge. Sentence was suspended on them by the judge on the promise of the parents to enlist the boys in the United States navy, and soon they will be in the service of Uncle Sam, where they will find the discipline such that the desire on their part to be mischievous will be taken care of by them.
