FOR THE FAIR.

A Selection of Rogue River Fish Taken There Yesterday.

In addition to the many other things from the Rogue River valley which can be seen by the visitors to the fair at Seattle will be a selection of fish by H. S. Kell of the Elkie Creek hatchery. In the lot are steelheads, cutthroats and rainbow trout. The trout are of various sizes from the smallest up to three pounds in weight. It is doubtful if a better selection of fish could be found in any waters of the state.

HAS FISH EXHIBIT.

J. W. Bertram, formerly in charge of the government fish hatchery on Elk creek, is in charge of the Oregon fish exhibit at the Seattle fair. PURCHASED LAND HERE.

BOUGHT TWENTY ACRES.

Petitions Are Being Circulated Asking President Taft to Do It.

The petition recites in substance that while it may be true that Nickel erred and may have been guilty of the offense for which he was sentenced, it sets forth that in the petitioners' opinion he has already been sufficiently punished. The petition was signed by city officials and by nearly 200 other citizens.

A like petition is being circulated in other parts of the state. Nickel is living with his family on a farm in the Applegate country, west of Medford.

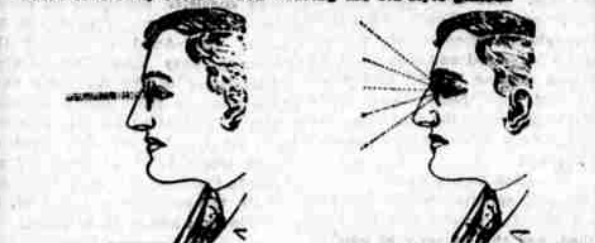
