fishing on the reservation in a manner directly contrary to the regulations. Jeff Riddle, an intelligent halfbreed Modoc, spoke yesterday of the action tending toward Wilson's removal. He endeavored to make it plain that it was solely for altruistic reasons and purely for the good of the tribe that he was taking an active part in circulating and forwarding the petition. He is assisted by H. E. Mann, a white man in the government service, and Henry Hoover, an Indian justice of the peace.

Jeff C. Riddle, an intelligent halfbreed Modoc, and held in high esteem by members of the two tribes by reason of his efforts to encourage their advancement along civilized lines, was outspoken in his denunciation of Agent Wilson's administration of affairs on the reservation, and in this expression of dissatisfaction he was joined by H. E. Mann, a white man now in the government service at Chemawa Indian school, who married into the Klamath tribe, besides Henry Hoover, an Indian justice of the peace on the Klamath reservation, and Thomas Barkley, brother to William Barkley, who was complaining that H. G. Wilson, Indian agent for the Klamath reservation, is opposed to the best interests of the Indians and has made no effort to advance the tribes educationally or otherwise, a petition has been forwarded to the secretary of the interior asking for his removal. It is asserted that Wilson's administration has been unusually offensive to the Indians—so much so that the tribe is said to have ceased to progress and is experiencing a retrograde movement.

Wilson is charged with leasing the Indian lands to stockraisers without receiving permission from the owners. The claim is made that the petition is not brought from any personal reasons, and that the Modocs and Klamaths, the tribes concerned on the reservations, are in perfect agreement regarding Wilson's removal. Among the Indians there was a desire to be represented by a float and brass band at the rose festival, and it is stated that Wilson by his prohibitory mandates prevented this redmen's display.

Illegal transfers of land and transfers made without obtaining the permission of the Indian proprietors are a further complaint made. It is said that Wilson has not made adequate attempts to enforce the liquor laws, and has permitted hunting and accused of killing Sid Jacobs, in addition to others who are known to have the best interests of the two tribes at heart. In discussing the situation immediately prior to his return to the reservation yesterday, Riddle said:

The petition claims further that Superintendent Wilson is careless in his duties, and does not look after the general welfare of the reservation, this laxness having a tendency to cause trouble among the Indians and damaging the whole reservation. Particular reference is made to his lack of alertness in enforcement of the laws regarding the sale of intoxicating liquors on the reservation, as a result of which the petitioners say there has been considerable drunkenness, and one white man was found dead near Yainix. The agent is also accused of permitting hunting, trapping and fishing on the reservation, in violation of the laws governing it.

### MEASURE SNOWFALL.

G. W. Frey Has Been Appointed to Do So From His Place to Mt. Pitt.

G. W. Frey was in Medford yesterday and explained to The Morning Mail something about the appointment he recently received from the United States weather bureau to take the depth of the snowfall from where his ranch is situated to the base of Mount Pitt during the coming winter.

Posts will be placed the whole distance during the present summer, a mile apart, for the whole distance. They will be marked for each foot and will be ten feet long. Two feet will be in the ground, leaving eight feet above. It will be the duty of Mr. Frey to take the records and send the results to the department at Washington.

### WAS IN MEDFORD

Mind With Feeble Mind Looking for Home of Son

The following dispatch from Albany, Or., will call to the minds of a number of people in Medford and vicinity that the party referred to, G. W. Hake, of Lyons, Neb., was for some time around this city. The dispatch, as will be noticed, states "Ashland." He might have been in this city, too, but he certainly was here for some time.

"Albany, Or., June 10.—With his mind failing and unable to remember the address of his son, G. W. Hake, of Lyons, Neb., reached Albany today and remains here not knowing where to go. He lost his son's address while en route and cannot remember the name of the town where he lives, though he knows it is in Western Oregon. He thought, however, it was 80 miles

south of Portland, and as Albany is exactly that distance, trainmen advised him to get off here. His son's name is also G. W. Hake, but no one of that name can be located here.

"Hake is 81 years old and his memory is very poor. He hurt his hand and arm severely by falling from the steps of the train at a station while en route to the Pacific Coast, and the constant pain of this injury has aggravated his mental condition. Hake carries letters of credit from Lyons, Neb., showing him to have plenty of money, but his mind has become so shattered he cannot find his relatives.

"After reaching Albany he described to Captain C. B. Winn of the local Wells-Fargo office, a town in Oregon where he visited his son two years ago. From his description Captain Winn believes the town is Ashland, and word has been sent there in an effort to locate the old man's son if possible.

### FROM FAR-OFF EGYPT

Comes an Order for Land in Rogue River Valley

Surely the fame of Medford and the Rogue River valley is spreading over all the civilized world. A few days ago Secretary John M. Sweeney of the Glen Rogue Orchard company received an order from a man living in Port Said, Egypt, subscribing for stock in the company. The following is a copy of the letter:

"Port Said, Egypt, February 14, 1909.—The Glen Rogue Orchard Co., Detroit. Gentlemen: I am willing to buy five shares or six acres of your company at \$100 per share on the following terms: Twenty per cent cash and the rest, \$600, payable in ten equal monthly payments of \$60 each. You may send your receipts monthly to the Anglo-Egyptian Bank of our city, where I shall pay \$60 monthly for ten months. Trusting to hear from you, I remain, yours truly,

"E. Z. SCHIND.

"Port Said, Egypt."

The company referred to owns a very large tract of land beginning at a point about two miles beyond Jacksonville and extending from there for several miles. The headquarters of the company is in Detroit, Mich., and, as announced in The Morning Mail a few days ago, Secretary Sweeney is now in Medford on business connected with the company at this end of the line.

In addition to the letter referred to, Mr. Sweeney has received hundreds of other letters and orders from distant places. This, of course, has been owing to a large extent to the advertising which has been already done.

### SCHOOL EXHIBIT

Medford's Display at Exposition Makes Fine Showing

The following extract is taken from a letter received from the manager of the educational department of the exposition, R. F. Robinson, at Seattle yesterday by Professor U. G. Smith. It refers to the Medford school exhibit at the fair:

"I will say that your new cabinet was received and placed in position. I transferred your exhibit from the old cabinet to the new one. The number of swing leaves were the same as you had a complete cabinet. I gained two pages, however, by mounting one card on the back of the door and one in the back of the cabinet. The others I placed in the base.

"Your exhibit makes an excellent showing and I want to thank you for your good work. I trust that I may yet have time to write each member of your faculty a personal letter and express my appreciation of what they did for our work."

### BETTER POSTAL CARDS.

The Government Is Preparing to Make a New Issue.

The postoffice department is preparing to issue a new postal card. Postmaster-General Hitchcock has called in the expert chemists of the department of agriculture and has instructed them to work out a formula that will give a much better paper than can be made under the contract now in force.

He says the postal cards issued by this government are inferior to the product of almost every other country and that it is contemplated to make improvements in the general style of printing and arrangement for the type and design. It may be decided to change also the color of ink and the tint of the paper.

The government issues 75,000,000 postal cards a month. The fiscal year contract expires December 31.

### HENEY IS NOMINATED BY DEMOCRATIC CLUB

SAN FRANCISCO, June 11.—Francis J. Heney has been nominated for district attorney by the San Francisco Democratic club, representing one faction of the local Democracy. In expressing his appreciation of the honor conferred, Mr. Heney stated that he would accept the nomination, though in politics he was a Roosevelt Republican. The nomination of Heney for the same office is now under consideration by the Municipal League of Independent Republican Clubs.

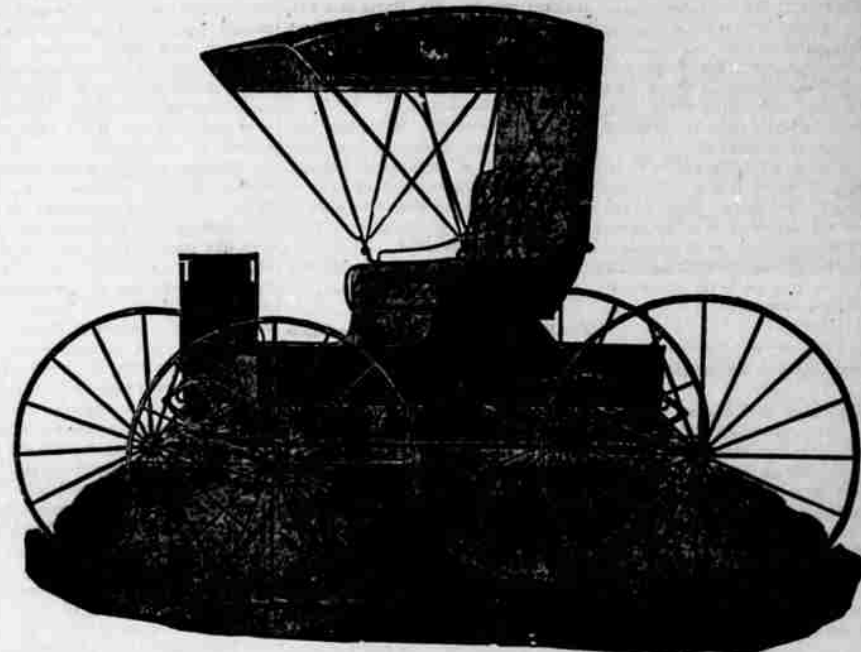
