MANY KILLED BY EARTHQUAKE

MARSEILLES, June 12.—From 75 to 100 are dead and 100 injured in tonight's estimated casualties as a result of the earthquake which devastated several towns in the southern part of France, particularly the departments of Herault and Bouches du Rhone.

Great suffering is reported, owing to the lack of bread and other necessities of life. The casualties may be greatly increased, as the ruins have not yet been entirely searched. The villages of St. Cannat and Rogues were completely demolished and Lambs, which is 12 miles from Aix, suffered heavily.

According to advices, a number of wounded are still in the ruins and soldiers are working desperately to rescue them.

Survivors are finding shelter in tents. Many of the places in the streets are torn up and encumbered with masses of rocks, making them impassable. Houses and public buildings have crumbled to pieces.

MADRID, June 12.—Light earthquake shocks were felt today at Barcelona and Bardeona, six miles to the northeast of Barcelona.

TOULON, June 12.—Fearing new shocks tonight, a large number of the residents left the city and camped in the country. The mayor opened the schoolhouse for those who were walking the streets.

Among other villages seriously damaged were Venelles, Vauvenargues, Pellissanne, Puy St. Repard and Argulles.

HILLAH CHARTER GRANTED.

Telegrams Received Yesterday of Action of Imperial Council of Shrines

(From Ashland Tidings.)
Hillah Temple, Ancient Arabic Order of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine of Ashland, was chartered yesterday by the Imperial Council in session at Louisville, Ky. The good news came in a message to Potentate E. A. Sherwin from Nobles E. T. Staples and E. D. Briggs of this city, who are in attendance at the national gathering at Louisville, which ends today. H. C. Garnett of Medford and John Butterworth, the railway mail clerk, are other members of Hillah Temple who expected to be present at the Imperial Council.

The news of the granting of the charter, while not unexpected, was still joyful news to the local Shrines, for it assures to Ashland for some time at least (unless the city grows faster than the dreams of the most optimistic) the unique distinction of being the smallest city extant with a temple of the Mystic Shrine.

"BUNCO" KELLY IS MILD.

Just Says "Hello, Bill," and Fails to Shoot His Sworn Enemy.

SEATTLE, Wash., June 11.—For the first time in 15 years since he arrested him on a charge of murder, for which crime he was sentenced to serve a life term in the Oregon penitentiary at Salem, Or., William Welsh, now chief of the Canadian detective bureau, and working in the city here, today met Joseph Kelly, alias "Bunco" Kelly, at police headquarters. Kelly was not arrested, but went to police headquarters himself to sell his book, a work he wrote while in the penitentiary.

Although Kelly swore while in prison that he would kill Welsh whenever he was released, he merely said, "Hello, Bill," and Welsh said, "Hello, Joe."

Kelly was arrested for the murder of George W. Sears on September 26, 1894. He was subsequently convicted in Portland, when he was sentenced to serve a life term. After 13 years in prison he was pardoned. Since his release he has been making a living selling his book.

WOMEN MUSTN'T MARRY.

That's the Advice of Spinster Who Has Lived 100 Years.

NEW YORK, June 11.—A novel recipe for longevity is given by Miss Mary Cummings, who is facing death at Bellevue hospital here at the age of 100 years.

"If you are a woman, never marry and never for a moment lost your independence."

These, she claims, were her two rules of living, and she never let an opportunity pass of expressing her belief in their efficacy.

SAGE MILLIONS HALF GONE.

Widow Spends \$25,000 a Day Where Husband Earned \$3500 a Day.

NEW YORK, June 10.—In less than three years Mrs. Russell Sage has spent more than \$25,000,000 for public purposes and the benefit of mankind. The recent investigation abroad of the question of workingmen's insurance and the establishment of a gigantic employment bureau called attention anew to her prolific bounty.

It took Russell Sage 50 years to get \$65,000,000. This great sum

amounted to \$3500 a day for the lifetime of the financier. Mrs. Sage is now giving away the fortune at the rate of \$25,000 a day. If the widow continues her charities at the pace she has set, all will be gone in five years.

Comparison of the financier's power to make money with Mrs. Sage's faculty of giving it away shows that the widow is giving away \$2 in the same time that it took Mr. Sage to accumulate the proverbial 30 cents.

BOY KILLS HIS TEACHER.

Accidentally Fires Fatal Shot at Sunday School Leader.

TRINIDAD, Colo., June 11.—B. C. Briggs, building contractor and superintendent of a Sunday school, was accidentally shot and killed today by Walter Harris, 11 years old. Briggs had taken the children of his Sunday school to the mountains for an outing. The boy aimed a rifle at Briggs. It was discharged, the bullet entering Briggs' head.

THRASHED IN COURT.

Four Small Howlers Got What Was Coming to Them.

NEW YORK, June 9.—Four boys, charged with rowdism on subway trains on Sunday, were whipped by their parents in the children's court, having been given a choice between fines and the rod.

Three parents at once accepted the whipping proposal. Instead of paying \$1 fine for their boys, but one hesitated, presenting a certificate alleged to have been given by a physician, testifying to the boy's physical condition and prohibiting corporal punishment. This was the father of Morris Dublin, aged 15. Justice Olmstead looked at the boy and, noting that he was robust and apparently healthy, said to the father: "You can whip the able-bodied boy or pay a fine of \$25 for him." Soon Lieutenant Ward reported, approving of the father's ability with the rod.

SET FOR JUNE 16.

Crater Lake Road Merits Will Be Threshed Out.

SALEM, Or., June 10.—The Crater Lake road case came up in the Circuit court before Judge Galloway today. The demurrer previously filed by Attorney-General Crawford was overruled and a reply filed. The case was then set for trial Wednesday, June 16, at 1 p. m., when it will be tried out on its merits.

It is expected considerable evidence will be introduced by the Crater Lake people to show the value of the road and also in an effort to prove it is a part of a continuous state highway from the ocean to the Idaho line. Attorney Mears of Medford appeared for the Crater Lake people and Attorney McMahan of this city for the complainant. Sears of McCoy, Polk county, who contends the state law appropriating \$100,000 to aid the proposed highway is unconstitutional.

WALLA WALLA, June 10.—Cactus candy, cactus pie, cactus pudding and cactus tea were a portion of an elaborate menu served last night at the initial meeting of the Pasco Cactus club. Twenty members attended. Cactus even furnished the table decorations. Discovery by Mrs. M. C. Jones of Pasco that cactus could be prepared as a food product and her proposal to form a cactus club met with the approval of vegetarians and a formal organization was last night perfected.

The cactus used in the manufacture of different food products is shipped to Mrs. Jones from Arizona. The hitherto supposedly useless thorny cactus of the desert, if plans of Pasco vegetarians are realized, will become one of the most sought-for plants.

NEW MARRIAGE LAW.

It Is Said That Many Washington Couples Will Go to Canada.

SEATTLE, June 10.—The new state law providing that applicants for marriage licenses must undergo a medical examination, except women over 15 years old, went into effect today. Ten couples appeared at the license clerk's office this morning with physicians' certificates and two couples, when informed of the new law, said they would go to British Columbia to marry.

The county officials say the law will result in many Americans marrying in Canada.

SOUTH HONORS SON OF GRANT

MEMPHIS, Tenn., June 12.—A frenzied demonstration of welcome by the men in gray for the son of the man who defeated them marked the final scene of the annual reunion of the United Confederate Veterans in this city. It took place during the parade.

On the reviewing stand stood General Frederick Dent Grant, of the U. S. A. A cavalry division approached and its commanding officer, old and arthritic, peered steadily at General Grant a moment. Then he turned in his saddle and yelled:

"Come on, you kids, here's General Grant come to life again in his son."

Rush to Shake Grant's Hand.

With one of the old-time rebel yells, the division charged upon the stand and jostled one another for an opportunity to shake the hand of the son of their old-time enemy. From that moment, every gray-clad veteran who could reach the stand rushed up to shake hands with General Grant. The stocky army officer's gray eyes filled with tears and his shoulders shook with emotion as he murmured:

"God bless you all, boys. God bless you."

Clad in rough gray homespun, such as they wore in the '60s, and carrying their ancient rifles, 10,000 Confederate veterans took part in the parade, which will probably be their last. The heat was intense and the line of march was cut down to one mile. Commanders of the divisions and brigades directed that the older and feeble members of their commands should drop out, but officers reported that they could find no men old enough or feeble enough to take advantage of the indulgence.

Had Great Parade.

The parade was led by Major-General John McDowell, grand marshal, and the veterans, marching by the divisions in which they served, followed behind. At the head of each division rode the sponsors and maids of honor, southern girls wearing the huge crimson shoulder knots that told of their position. Following the regular divisions came the survivors of Forrest's famous cavalry corps. The Sons of Confederate Veterans, several thousand strong, closed the parade.

SUING FOR DAMAGES.

Suit Brought at Portland to Recover Damages for Killing of Fancher.

PORTLAND, June 11.—Seven thousand five hundred dollars' damages from the Portland Railway company for the death of Scott V. Fancher are sought in a case the trial of which was commenced before a jury in Judge Morrow's department of the Circuit court this morning. The suit was begun by Lloyd W. Fancher, administrator of the estate of the deceased youth. The accident occurred at Second and Main streets, when the boy was run down and killed by a streetcar.

The young man referred to above was a son of the missing L. W. Fancher of Medford. His mother still resides here.

MERCHANTS GATHER.

Plans Under Way to Stop Railways Favoring Coast Cities.

OGDEN, Utah, June 12.—A call will be issued within a few days for a convention of wholesale and retail merchants and other freight shippers in what is designated as the "Inland Empire." The object is to bring about a co-operation of interior cities in a demand that railroads shall not discriminate in favor of coast cities in the moving of freight from eastern points.

Delegates are expected from as far north as Spokane and east to Denver, which includes the territory affected by the Interstate commerce commission decision in what is known as the Spokane rate case.

WRIGHTS GET MEDALS.

They Were Presented to Them by President Taft.

WASHINGTON, June 12.—The famous east room of the White House was the scene of a most unusual and notable event this afternoon, when President Taft presented to Wilbur and Orville Wright the gold medals awarded by the Aero club of America to the famous aeronauts for their record-breaking flights made last September. The presentation ceremonies were witnessed by famous diplomats and the officers of the state, army and navy departments. There were also many ladies present.

The Wrights were entertained with a luncheon and reception at the Cosmos club. Miss Katherine Wright, their sister, accompanied them, and was present at the presentation of the medals.

FIRST ON RECORD.

ROME, Ga., June 11.—The little town of Seney, near here, has declared war on automobiles. At a meeting of the town council recently after a spirited discussion, an ordinance was adopted prohibiting the

use of automobiles within the city limits, and the town marshal was authorized to arrest any one passing through Seney with "such engines of destruction."

This is said to be the first town record to declare war against the automobile in toto.
