WILL START NEW WELL.

Colonel Mundy Will Drive Another Hole in the Desert.

After going down nearly 1500 feet with his oil well, Colonel Mundy has been compelled to abandon this hole and is now preparing to put down another one, not far distant from the original undertaking. The first hole was found to be too small for the depth to which it was necessary to go and there was more water than it was expected would be found, all these conditions combining to make it impracticable to further prosecute the work at this particular point.

The well, as is pretty generally known, is north and east of Medford a few miles and is on what is termed the "desert." The new well will be put down 300 feet west and 1000 feet north of the old one. It will be a ten-inch hole and work will commence on it Monday. The casing used in the old well has nearly all been taken out, but none of this will be used in the new one.

Mr. Mundy is very optimistic with regard to the prospects for finding that for which he is in search—oil. This fact need hardly be mentioned, however, because of the fact that no pessimist would have undertaken the project in the first place, and surely would not take it up on a larger scale after having failed in one attempt. The showing, however, in the abandoned well was so good that nothing short of a second attempt would satisfy the colonel.

CANADA ALSO SEES THINGS.

According to reliable reports, Canada has also been drawn into the ranks of the nations hysterically engaged in "seeing" things at night.

Dispatches from the Dominion indicate that the government is contemplating putting out a "mosquito fleet" of war vessels as a supplement to those of England, with the intention in reserve to create a few "dreadnaughts," should it be decided that the finances of the country permit that luxury.

It is to be hoped that the navy-building fever of our northern neighbor will find an antidote before reaching the acute stage.

Armaments breed suspicion, and preparations for war foster distrust and antagonism.

It is conceivable that should the Dominion see fit to create a fighting force on the sea, our own enthusiastic militarists, who need little provocation to make them "see red," would insist on multiplying the already staggering naval expenditures of the United States.

So far, moreover, as the relations of America and Canada are concerned, such precautions appear superfluous. Never were two nations more friendly disposed, with fewer possibilities of a quarrel appearing even in the remote and distant future.

NEW USE FOR DICTIONARY.

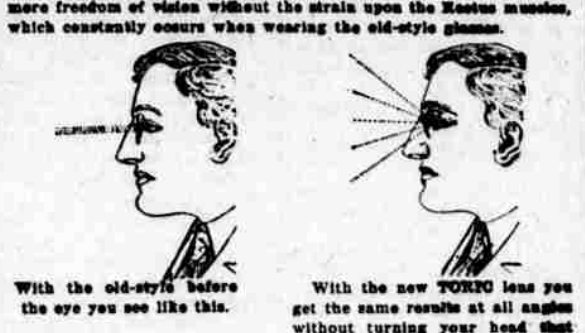
